

## Dots Make Sense

Almost everywhere you look today, in labs and offices, you will see yellow or orange dots. These dots, each color representing a specific year, are on all types of "capital equipment" and signify that the items have been inventoried by a Property Representative.

Because of the quantity of equipment on the Lab site this is no easy job and involves a tremendous effort. The effort is further complicated by the movement of equipment without notifying the departmental Property Representative and, in some cases, by the lack of familiarity with procedures for the control and movement of "capital equipment" within the laboratory.

The total dollar value investment in "capital equipment" at Brookhaven National Laboratory is \$112,055,502.46. There are approximately 26,527 individual pieces of equipment, generally with a unit value of \$300 or more.

Exceptions to this unit value are sensitive items such as office machines, vacuum cleaners, communication equipment and cameras. Items such as stores materials, office furnishings, and hand tools are also not classified in "capital equipment."

In order to comply with the ERDA contract, BNL must account for all 26,527 items by conducting a physical inventory every two years. The entire Capital Equipment Program, headed by Grace Fales, is a complicated difficult program to maintain properly and its success depends heavily on the active participation of laboratory personnel.

Although the majority of BNL employees are aware of and adhere to the procedures for the control and movement of "capital equipment," some are not, which is evi-

denced by the number of items reported as "unlocated" in each inventory. The primary reason for this is the movement, loan or cannibalization of equipment without obtaining the required approvals and processing the necessary paperwork to maintain accurate records.

Although the physical inventory for "capital equipment" is conducted every two years, it takes a long time to complete because of unlocated items. Adherence to the established procedures could drastically reduce the time and the man days required to complete them.

The Property Representatives assigned to each department do a commendable job in carrying out their responsibilities, but they cannot be expected to carry out the entire program on their own.

There are a number of "do's" and "don't's" governing "capital equipment," which are explained in detail in the Supply & Materiel Standard Operating Procedure Manual. Since it is not practical to furnish every user on site with a manual, several articles will be published in the *Brookhaven Bulletin* on the various aspects of the program. In addition, Supply & Materiel is developing a publication for general distribution which will explain the procedures regulating "capital equipment."

## Keeping Track Of Things

The members are elected by the Senior Scientific Staff of the departments they represent. An exception is the member-at-large, who is elected by the Council and may be from any department. They are elected to three-year terms, and each year the Council selects one member to serve as Chairman.

## A Successful Clothing Drive For Marshallese

Thanks to the generosity of BNL employees, several large trunks of clothing, toys and children's books will accompany the BNL Medical Team to the Marshall Islands this year.

The team, headed by Dr. Robert Conard, will leave for the Marshall Islands this weekend to conduct their 21st annual survey. They will deliver the clothing and toys to the people living on the remote outer islands of Rongelap and Utirik. "We appreciated very much the large response to our clothing drive and we know the Marshallese will be very grateful," said Dr. Conard.

Each year a medical team from BNL goes to the Marshall Islands to monitor individuals who were accidentally exposed to radioactive fallout during a 1954 Pacific bomb test. Besides Dr. Conard, the team this year includes Bill Scott, Medical; Peter Heotis, Medical and Doug Clareus, Instrumentation.

Another group from BNL, headed by Nat Greenhouse, Health Physics and Safety, will join the medical team in April and conduct radiological studies on the island of Bikini. Accompanying Greenhouse from BNL will be Rich Williams, Health Physics and Safety, and Frank Haughey, at BNL on sabbatical from Rutgers University. They will be checking background radiation levels on Bikini and will bring samples of soil, plants and animals back to BNL for radiological analysis.

The BNL Medical Team will conduct hematologic and thyroid studies on five islands: Utirik, Rongelap, Bikini, Kwajalein and Majuro. They will travel from island to island and live aboard an overhauled landing craft utility (LCU) provided for them by the U.S. Army. The LCU is equipped with a sleeping trailer and a medical trailer with a doctor's office and X-ray unit.

Due to the prevalence of diabetes in the Marshall Islands, 25 percent of the population, the team will also be assisting local health officials with a diabetic survey.

**1975 Car Drivers Beware**

In a bulletin issued by the General Services Administration (GSA), individuals are warned of the potential fire hazard and the increased danger of contact burns due to the heat retention capacity of catalytic converters.

Most 1975 model passenger-carrying vehicles and light trucks (under 6000 pounds GVWR) are equipped with catalytic converters as part of their engine exhaust systems. These converters operate with internal temperatures reaching 1200-1300° F, approximately twice that of exhaust systems on prior year models, and do not cool rapidly after operation.

Because converter units are usually mounted at or below the vehicle frame level, thus close to the ground, a converter-equipped vehicle driven over or parked on a surface of easily combustible material such as dry grass could cause a fire. The installation of protective shielding on catalytic converters can reduce this danger. This shielding is not available from vehicle manufacturers for all models, however, and in many cases would have to be fabricated.

**If Every . . . Facts From the Federal Energy Administration**

If every household in the United States lowered heating temperatures six degrees, the demand for fuel would drop by more than 570,000 barrels of oil per day (enough to heat over nine million homes during the winter season).

If every household were caulked and weather-stripped, the equivalent of 580,000 barrels of home heating fuel could be saved each winter day.

If every home had storm windows and doors or plastic film protection, the Nation's fuel demand would drop the equivalent of 200,000 barrels each day of the winter season.

If every dishwasher user in the country cut out just one load a week, the country could save the equivalent of about 9000 barrels of oil each day (enough to heat 140,000 homes in winter).

If everybody washed clothes in warm or

cold water, national fuel savings would amount to the equivalent of about 100,000 barrels of oil a day. That is 2½ percent of the total demand for residential heating (enough to heat 1.6 million homes in winter).

If every household cut the use of clothes washers and dryers by 25 percent, the Nation would save the equivalent of 35,000 barrels of oil per day (enough to heat over 400 billion gallons of water a day).

If every automobile consumed just one less gallon of gasoline a week (an average of about 13 miles of driving), the Nation would save about 5.2 billion gallons a year, or about seven percent of the total passenger car demand for gasoline.

While the United States comprises only six percent of the world's population, we consume more than one-third of the energy used in the world.





**Hospitality News**
