## A.H. Sparrow Dies

Arnold H. Sparrow, senior radiobiologist in the Biology Department, died Thursday, June 24, at the age of 61 of a heart attack.

Sparrow joined the scientific staff July 7, 1947, following a two-year postdoctoral fellowship at Harvard University. Born in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada, he received his B.Sc. and M.Sc. degrees from the University of Saskatchewan and was awarded a Ph.D. degree in cytology from McGill University in 1941.

In addition to cytology Sparrow's research interests included general and cellular radiobiology, radiation genetics, space radiobiology and, most recently, the biological effects of environmental chemical mutagens. His research at Harvard led to early investigation of the effect of radiation on DNA which, in turn, led to a fundamental principle of radiobiology that states: the radiosensitivity of an organism is a function of its chromosomal DNA content.

Sparrow was the author of many scientific papers and was Editor-in-Chief of the international journal *Radiation Botany*, now known as *Environmental and Experimental Botany*.

He belonged to numerous scientific societies, among them the Genetics Society of America, Radiation Research Society (of which he was President from 1968-69) and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He was a Member of the Executive Committee of the Division of Biology and Agriculture of the National Research Council, and a Member of the Committee on International Exchange of Per-





sons Conference Board of Associated Research Councils from 1962-67.

He is survived by his wife, Rhoda, a researcher in his laboratory at Brookhaven and by four sons: Carl and Paul of Bellport; Alan of Syracuse, N.Y.; and David of Boulder, Colorado.

In lieu of flowers, the family would prefer that contributions be sent to the A.H. An award will be given to a Bellport High School senior who has displayed a genuine love and devotion for the field of biology and the selection will not be based on grades.

*It was recently publicized that the officially appointed committee working on the location of the Solar Energy Research Institute was disbanded. One of the main reasons for their dissolving the committee was their inability to obtain a Director for the new Institute.*

*I find this rather difficult to understand; but that is not my question.*

*Why was the Laboratory not represented on this committee? Surely we should have enough interest to at least be aware of the workings of this group of men. Should not the Laboratory been included? Why, after the news of the break-up of this committee, hasn't the Lab spoken? I thought, as I am sure many of the employees did, that we are interested in obtaining this Research Institute in our immediate area. Have we lost interest in the project — and wouldn't it be for the better to have such an installation adjacent to us. Of course, as most things do, we would be associated with SUNY — but is that bad?*

**Answer:**

The Laboratory was interested in the activities of the L.I. SERICOM, and we had Laboratory staff at nearly all meetings of the Committee. We were not officially represented on the Committee because active participation by the Laboratory in any such group would be contrary to ERDA guidelines to all the National Laboratories. These guidelines specified that Laboratory funds and facilities could not be used in support of the efforts of any individual group seeking SERI. Such support would be unfair to groups who were proposing sites not associated with an existing federally supported facility. We did respond to requests from the L.I. SERICOM for data about Brookhaven. Since we were not represented on the Committee, we saw no reason to comment on their decision to withdraw from the competition.
