

## Semester Program Is 10 Years Old

Ten years ago, six students from predominantly black colleges in the South arrived at Brookhaven to participate in 16 weeks of study and research. That was the beginning of the Brookhaven Semester Program, a program which has continued throughout the years to be a rewarding experience for 141 students and the BNL staff who worked with them.

Last week, 45 graduates of the program returned to the BNL campus for a two-day reunion, hosted by the Laboratory, to mark the 10th anniversary of this unique educational effort. During their stay, the grads learned about new research at the Lab, shared information with their former advisors and renewed old acquaintances.

Two of the 1968 group of semester students managed to get back here for the reunion. Gloria Kennedy, was a physics major at Grambling College and is now a senior associate with American Cybernetic Corporation in Maryland. Casandra Jackson Gilliam, a graduate of Tougaloo College is now Deputy Manager of Employment and Training for the National Urban League, Inc., in Manhattan.

According to a recent survey, some of the former students went on to graduate schools in medicine, dentistry, math and science, others became teachers and many are working as researchers, engineers and computer specialists for major corporations. Some continue to live in the South and the others have moved to California, the Midwest, New England and New York.

But wherever they may be now, they all agree that their semester at Brookhaven was a significant assist in their academic training and in helping them to decide on a career. Many of the students present at the reunion voiced the hope that the program would continue so that other students might have the benefit of this experience.

Over the past ten years, a considerable number of BNL scientists have been active as instructors and advisors. They have guided the students through 20 semesters of study and research in biology, chemistry, mathematics and physics.

One of the scientists who has been active both professionally and personally in contributing to the success of the program is John Denes, Manager of the Computer Service Division in Applied Mathematics. He spoke for many of the BNL instructors when he said, "as a teacher, I get a lot of satisfaction from seeing how well the students have turned out, and I am glad the program was a help to them." He also said that a number of the students told him that the program not only taught them about science, but also "what the world was like." For many, the semester at Brookhaven was their first trip away from home.

The reunion also gave many people here an opportunity to welcome back some former BNL staff members who were intimately involved with the program.

Isaac Cole, once of the Physics Department and, later, Personnel, was known as

Coleman of DOE, and Gerhart Friedlander who serves as Executive Secretary. Martin Blume is the Brookhaven representative on the Panel. The next meeting is scheduled for December 4-5 at Oak Ridge.

## Science Means Business

Not only is Brookhaven one of the largest employers on Long Island, but, as a thriving scientific research laboratory, it spends many millions of dollars each year for the purchase of equipment materials, supplies and services. In the current fiscal year, approximately \$40 million is expected to be disbursed to a wide spectrum of businesses which will provide the Laboratory with everything from safety shoes to major experimental equipment.

Last Friday, the first Business Opportunity Seminar was held at Brookhaven to acquaint local firms with the anticipated materiel needs of the Laboratory in the immediate future.

About 200 representatives of companies based mainly on Long Island came to find out where they might fit in Brookhaven's purchasing picture. They indicated that they stand ready to bid on electrical supplies, plastics, office equipment, uniforms, castings, cleaning services, computer components, and scores of other equipment and services.

In his welcoming remarks to the representatives, Laboratory Director George Vineyard said that the seminar was being held "for the mutual advantage of local Long Island businesses and the Laboratory. We want you to know of our sales potential and how to do business with us." Dr. Vineyard also stressed that the Laboratory was "very interested in encouraging small businesses and minority-owned firms."

The morning session was devoted to presentations by BNL staff members on the Laboratory's projects and requirements. Although purchasing for ISABELLE will not begin until later this year, Julius Spiro, Assistant Project Head, and Paul Mohn, Facilities Engineer, gave the representa-

tives further details about the much-publicized project. Supplying the construction and equipment requirements of the \$275 million accelerator is expected to give a major boost to the Long Island economy during the next seven years.

Some contracts have already been let for the National Synchrotron Light Source and, currently, \$2,480,000 is available for the procurement and fabrication of various synchrotron components. Jules Godel, Assistant Project Head for the NSLS, discussed design plans for this facility now targeted for completion in 1981.

## Schlesinger Names DOE Regional Reps

DOE Secretary, James R. Schlesinger, announced recently that Robert H. Bauer, Manager of the Chicago Operations Office, will assume the dual role of Regional Representative and Operations Office head for DOE in Region V. This region includes Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio and Wisconsin.

The announcement also indicated that Bauer will continue as Manager of the Chicago Operations Office, a post he has held since 1972.

At the same time, Robert A. Low, formerly Commissioner of Environmental Protection for New York City and Director of the Energy Office under Mayor Beame, was named the senior spokesman for Region II. Region II includes New York, New Jersey, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Within their respective areas, Regional Representatives represent the DOE Secretary in dealings with the general public, state and local officials, business and labor, and other groups concerned with energy policy and planning. They are also responsible for administering DOE's grant programs and coordinating energy planning activities in their regions.

BNL is under the jurisdiction of the Chicago Operations Office, and is included in Region II.

## Atkins Named To Board

Harold L. Atkins, M.D., Head of the Nuclear Medicine Division, Medical Department, has been named to the board of directors of the American Lung Association of Nassau-Suffolk. Dr. Atkins is also president of the Greater New York Chapter, Society of Nuclear Medicine.

The American Lung Association seeks the prevention and control of diseases such as asthma, emphysema, tuberculosis and man-made lung irritants such as tobacco smoking, air pollution and exposure to hazardous substances in the workplace.

# Ripe For The Picking

It's been a long, hard winter for strawberry lovers, with a discouraging selection of shipped-in fruit bringing high prices in the supermarkets. If you have a passion for fresh, ripe berries, you'll be glad to know that Long Island's strawberry season is here at last.

Local experts report that the annual Mattituck Lions Club Strawberry Festival is the major social event of the berry season. This year's festival will be held on Saturday, June 17, from noon to 5 p.m., at the Mattituck school grounds. (Follow Route 25 onto the North Fork and through Mattituck - the school grounds are located on 25, just east of the village.)

There will be booths, games and entertainment for the whole family, but the highlight of the festival, according to connoisseurs, is the outstanding homemade strawberry shortcake. Other local delicacies will also be available (including clams on the half shell), and those who prefer to make their own shortcake at home will be able to buy berries by the quart. Admission to the festival is \$.50 per person, and shortcake is \$1.50 a serving.

Strawberries are an excellent choice for dieters - they are low in calories (40 for three-quarters of a cup of fresh berries) and high in vitamin C (59 mg in the same size serving). Keep in mind, though, that the calorie count rises rapidly during the shortcake-making process. If you add sugar (16 calories per teaspoon), a biscuit (129) or a piece of spongecake (149), and a few dollops of whipped cream (at 52 calories each), the total calorie count can easily run to several hundred.

For those who want to work off the cal-

ories before they're consumed, there are at least 20 Suffolk farms that feature pick-your-own strawberries. The following list (courtesy of the Cooperative Extension Association of Suffolk County) gives names, locations, phone numbers and other pertinent information. Hours and dates for picking vary from farm to farm and are subject to change, so be sure to phone ahead before starting off on a berry-picking expedition. Some of the farms have age restrictions for children, and at some you must bring your own berry containers, so ask about these things when you call.
