Scholarships Awarded For '79

AUI Trustee Scholarships in the amount of \$1,250 per year, for up to four years, have been awarded to 12 children of Laboratory employees. The winners were selected by an independent committee reporting to the College Scholarship Service which administers the program for AUI. The successful applicants will enter college this fall and the scholarships will be paid directly to the college to defray the students' expenses, such as tuition, lodging and board. Leland Haworth:

"He Was A Good Man"

Friends and colleagues of Leland J. Haworth gathered in Berkner Hall on April 19, in a simple and moving memorial service, to share their remembrances of this distinguished scientist and extraordinary public servant. The speakers recalled him as a close friend, and as they knew him at various stages of his long career: at the MIT Radiation Lab, as Director of BNL, as an Atomic Energy Commissioner, and as Director of the National Science Foundation.

"We are here to celebrate the life of a great man," said Maurice Goldhaber, AUI Distinguished Scientist and a former director of Brookhaven, "who was responsible, more than anyone else, for the success of the Laboratory." Dr. Haworth's success was due, not only to his scientific ability, but to his personal qualities, said Goldhaber, and he noted particularly his modesty, perseverance and scrupulous honesty. "He was a good man," he said.

Dr. Haworth's reputation as a man of integrity was recognized by all the speakers. Henry David, educator and labor specialist, was head of the Office of Scientific Resources Planning at the NSF when Haworth was director, and remained a close friend. "Leland was a moral being in every dimension of his life," he said, "there was high congruence between what he professed and what he did." "He knew the difference between being authoritative and authoritarian," said David, "and so nourished a feeling of comradeship among the staff."

Jerrold C. Zacharias, Emeritus Professor of Physics at MIT, spoke of their work together during World War II at the Radiation Laboratories. He said that Haworth was able to manage the human and technical aspects of their work with superb skill and without promoting himself. The current low state of affairs in technology credibility, remarked Zacharias, cries out for someone like Leland Haworth, "a person who has full-bodied technical competence and, at the same time, clearly has no personal axes to grind."

R. Christian Anderson, Assistant Director of the Laboratory, spoke of Haworth's Quaker upbringing, his roots in the Midwest and his love of American history, all of which, he said, were reflected in his strength and character. He then read The 23rd Psalm, a passage which had been important to Haworth.

Philip Handler, President of the National Academy of Sciences, who served on the National Science Board at the time Haworth was NSF Director, said that "integrity characterized his stewardship of the

NSF." It inspired confidence, not only in the NSF staff, but in the Congress, and carried the Foundation through troubled times. "It is the peculiar genius of our country," said Handler, "that it raises now and again a Leland Haworth."

Nobel Laureate I.I. Rabi spoke of Haworth as a great physicist, engineer and administrator, who had guided the Laboratory through the difficult early years and period of expansion. He said that as a concrete form of appreciation, he hoped to suggest to the trustees that the AGS be named after Haworth. Rabi noted that "Leland's speeches were of enormous breadth and profundity and his address to broad problems was one which I like to consider as fundamentally American. . . he was one of the finest representatives of an American."


AUI President, Gerald F. Tape, said the AUI Board of Trustees expressed Haworth's contributions to BNL best when they adopted a resolution shortly after his death that "he, more than any other single individual, gave character to Brookhaven National Laboratory as it developed from an idea to a center of excellence." Those who followed in his footsteps, said Tape, were both challenged and inspired by the standards he set. To the AEC, he brought a much needed spirit of analysis and the Haworth logic. Tape noted that it was Haworth's technical input and persistence that led to the Limited Test Ban Treaty. Another notable Haworth accomplishment was the 1962 AEC Report to the President which Congress considered a "masterpiece." "His legacy to BNL and AUI," concluded Tape, "is credibility, a commodity that must not be destroyed."

At various times during the service, Elisabeth Palmedo, accompanied by Anne Hartzell, sang some of Dr. Haworth's favorite songs, and the memorial ended with the traditional New Orleans funeral parade music, "The Saints Go Marching In."

APS Honors Goudsmit

At its April 24 meeting, the American Physical Society held a memorial session for Samuel A. Goudsmit in Washington, D.C. Dr. Maurice Goldhaber, AUI Distinguished Scientist and former Lab director, presided. Speakers included George E. Uhlenbeck, Rockefeller University, Robert F. Bacher, California Institute of Technology, W.W. Havens, Columbia University and The American Physical Society, and Lab Director George Vineyard who spoke of Goudsmit's years at Brookhaven.

Technetium Workshop

Electric Will Replace Some Gas Vehicles

Fifteen electric vehicles of various types are expected to be operating on site by late summer. They will be used for the delivery of mail and other activities for which such vehicles would be appropriate, and will replace conventional vehicles currently in use.

Electric vehicles are limited in performance. They require 15 seconds to accelerate to 30 mph, have a top speed of 40-50 mph, and have a range of 30-50 miles per battery charge. A charge takes from six to 15 hours, dependent on 110 vs. 220 volts. Factors such as road grades, speeds and the climate in which they operate account for the fluctuations in performance and driving distance. The vehicles available range from half ton cargo and passenger vans down to two-passenger sedan delivery trucks.

The Laboratory will obtain these vehicles under the Federal Agency Electric and Hybrid Vehicle Demonstration Project, which is administered by DOE under mandate by Congress. The eight-year project was established to "demonstrate the economic and technical practicability" of using these vehicles on the nation's roadways.

As a participant in the research project, the Laboratory will share in the costs and maintain the vehicles. They will also collect data on the performance of the vehicles and the problems encountered. The private sector will also engage in the project as part of the effort to stimulate technology in this area which has been in decline since the 1920's.

Which Way To Porchog?

From a history book first published in 1896 come these pre-Revolutionary names for places with which most of us are probably very familiar. How many old or Indian names mentioned in the paragraphs below can you identify from context and associate with names in use today?

Bounded by T Groodt Baie to the north, the island of Seawanhancky was home to many even 200 years ago. Inhabitants travelled between towns such as Occombomock to the south, Drown Meadow to the north and, on a fork of land on Seawanhancky's northeast coast, to Sterling Harbor. To the west, Hard Scrabble was to become home to one of the branches of the State's university while Five Islands, a string of islands off Seawanhancky's south shore, had yet to be discovered by vacationers escaping crowds at Scheyer's Island and the heat from the city further west.

The Brush Plains, a county which includes the towns of Merogies and Manotasoquat to the south and Wapowoag and Panquacumsuck to the north, is divided into a north and south fork by T Cromme Gouwe. And, at the easternmost tip of Seawanhancky's south fork is Montaukett, future site of an historic lighthouse.
