All About Mesons

Over 200 experimental and theoretical physicists from the U.S. and the international scientific community came to Brookhaven April 25-26 to attend the Sixth International Conference on Experimental Meson Spectroscopy. The presentations featured the latest experimental results in meson spectroscopy and their theoretical interpretation.

The known mesons are very short-lived particles made up of a quark – the basic building block of nuclear matter – and an anti-matter quark. The combination allows complete symmetry between matter and anti-matter. This symmetry property makes them the most important tools in searching for new quarks and the

dynamical interactions of quarks.

Just as in atomic and nuclear spectroscopy, studying the characteristics of the production and decay of mesonic excited states reveals the basic quark structure of the mesons and the properties of the very strong elastic chains which bind them together, the so-called gluons. The energies involved in these interactions are enormous compared to the usual man-made nuclear interactions.

The lifetime of the mesons is very short ranging from one hundred millionth of a second to a million billion times shorter than that. Therefore, huge particle accelerators and enormously complicated electronic and computerized meson spectrometers are required to study them. These include the Brookhaven proton AGS, the CERN proton PS and SPS, the Fermilab accelerator, the Stanford electron Linac and electron-proton colliding beam machine called SPEAR, the DESY (Hamburg) storage ring electron accelerators called DORIS and PETRA, and their detector systems.

Some of the exciting results presented at the Conference included reports on the latest experiments by various groups at PETRA, including the group headed by Prof. Sam Ting of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. (Prof. Ting discovered the so-called J meson in 1974 at the Brookhaven AGS. This particle, also found independently at SLAC by Prof. Richter's group, is known as the J/ψ particle and was the original discovery of the charmed quark, anti-charmed quark meson state. Profs. Ting and Richter shared the 1976 Nobel Prize for their discoveries.)

Another quark called the bottom quark was discovered after the charmed quark to yield a total of five quarks. It was generally expected by theorists that a sixth quark, called "top," would be found at PETRA, which reached a total center-of-mass energy of close to 36 billion electron volts. None of the PETRA groups found any evidence for this quark, and hence many concluded that we may remain "topless."

Recently a great deal of excitement was generated by a discovery at the CERN Omega Spectrometer of a new form of meson which consists of at least two quark-antiquark pairs instead of the usual one. This type of meson was called "baryonium" which is analogous to a long sought quark molecule.

The large, more sensitive BNL Multiparticle Spectrometer at the AGS was recently used to search for baryonium by two groups. One of these, a BNL/CMU/SMU/FNAL collaboration, searched in a different but related reaction to that of the CERN group and reported the conclusion that the baryonium they expected to see on the basis of the CERN result did not exist. Hughes Named AUI President

Robert E. Hughes, Professor of Chemistry at Cornell University and former Assistant Director of the National Science Foundation, has accepted the position of President of Associated Universities, Inc. (AUI), it has been announced by W. Donald Cooke, Chairman of AUI's Board of Trustees.

Dr. Hughes will join AUI on July 1, 1980, as President-Elect, and will become President on October 1, 1980. He succeeds Dr. Gerald F. Tape, who requested retirement from the full-time duties of President.

"We are extremely pleased that Dr. Hughes has accepted the position of President," said Dr. Cooke. "This appointment is the culmination of a national search begun by AUI in 1978. Dr. Hughes' distinguished scientific background, and his experience in helping to set national science policy, make him eminently well-qualified for this important position."

Hughes has had a distinguished career as a university professor and a government official. He has been a Professor of Chemistry at the University of Pennsylvania and at Cornell University. He served as Assistant Director of the National Science Foundation for Astronomical, Atmospheric, Earth and Ocean Sciences, and has assisted the government as a consultant. Most recently he has been associated with the Cornell program on Science, Technology and Society.

Robert E. Hughes was born in New York City in 1924. Following his military service, he attended Lehigh University, where he was awarded a B.S. in engineering chemistry in 1949. He received his Ph.D. in chemistry from Cornell University in 1952 and continued as an Instructor in Chemistry for one year.

In 1953, Hughes joined the Chemistry Department of the University of Pennsylvania as Assistant Professor, rising later to the rank of full Professor. At Pennsylvania, he was one of the organizers of, and served on the Executive Committee of the Labora-

tory for Research on the Structure of Matter, a major interdisciplinary materials research laboratory supported by the Advanced Research Projects Agency.

Hughes returned to Cornell as Professor of Chemistry in 1964. He served as Director of the Cornell Materials Science Center from 1968 until 1974.

In 1974, President Ford appointed him Assistant Director for National and International Programs of the National Science Foundation (NSF). With the reorganization of NSF in 1975, he became Assistant Director for Astronomical, Atmospheric, Earth and Ocean Sciences, his primary responsibility until he returned to Cornell in January 1977. The National Science Board recognized his many contributions, noting that Dr. Hughes "...contributed immeasurably to the development and advancement of the National Science Foundation programs under his direction and to the welfare of science in the Nation. ..."

His research interests include X-ray crystallography, crystal and mo-


New Man At ISABELLE

He was a co-founder and an editor of the Journal of Solid State Chemistry, and an associate editor of Materials Science and Engineering. He has been on the editorial advisory boards of the Journal of Polymer Science and the Journal of Non-Metals.

Dr. Hughes and his wife Lou now reside in Ithaca, New York. They have one son, Jeffrey, who will be enrolling in graduate school at Stanford University.

From E To EE

The Treasury Department is withdrawing series E savings bonds from sale and replacing them with series EE. Here are some of the differences between the old and new series:

- EE bonds mature in 11 years; the E's in 5 years.

- Interest rate is 6.5% for the EE; 6% for the E series.

- The \$25 bond has been discontinued, but all other denominations are the same as for the E's.

- The cost of the EE is now 50% of face value, compared with 75% on the old series. This means that a \$50 bond will now cost \$25 instead of \$37.50. The difference reflects the longer maturing period.

Although the change-over has been in effect since January 2, the Treasury Department has granted a six-month grace period to June 30, 1980 to make the switch. During this time Payroll will continue to apply bond deductions towards the purchase of series E up to the payroll periods ending June 22 for weekly and June 30 for monthly employees. Thereafter, all deductions will be applied to the purchase of the EE series.

In the next few days, employees who are currently enrolled in the bond savings plan will receive a new bond card and information pamphlet. Return the completed card to Payroll, Bldg. 134 at least two weeks before the applicable due date in June.

Employees who are not currently enrolled, but wish to sign up, should call Payroll at extension 2470 for the authorization forms.

conference, results of the second group, a BNL/Brandeis/CCNY/U. Mass/SMU collaboration, reported for the first time their search in the same reaction that CERN used and clearly contradicted the earlier claim for baryonium.

SLAC groups reported discovering the long sought partner to the J/ψ particle, the η_c , which has antiparallel quark spins instead of the parallel quark spins which the J/ψ has.

There was a great deal of clarification of overall meson spectroscopy both by reports of new results and their theoretical interpretation.

The concluding talk was presented by Prof. Sheldon Glashow of Harvard, who reviewed past and future meson spectroscopy. Prof. Glashow was one of the winners of the most recent Nobel Prize for Physics.

The chairman of the Organizing Committee was Prof. S.J. Lindenbaum of BNL and the City College of New York. He said that Brookhaven plans to organize and host the next International Conference on Experimental Meson Spectroscopy in about two years.


