

Summer Student Program On Line

Fresh from final exams and adieus to family and friends, 69 summer research students trickled into Brookhaven Sunday and Monday to begin their eleven weeks of inquiry, camaraderie and relaxation.

This year's class comes from 48 schools, ranging from tiny Bard College to the immense University of Michigan; from Reed College in distant Oregon to the State University of New York in nearby Stony Brook. Nineteen are recent graduates, 50 will be seniors in the fall. A little less than a third are women, and about a quarter are minorities.

Getting in Gear

The first few days were marked by mild confusion as students adjusted to their surroundings and began getting clearer ideas of their tasks.

A few had the advantage of familiarity. Back for his second summer, Ryan Rohm noted he's prepared to concentrate his energy on physics. "Last summer I spent a lot of time getting acquainted with the computer," he said, "Now I'm ready to spend more time on physics." A graduate of North Carolina State University, Rohm will be working with Alfred Saulys, Physics Dept., on resonance in neutral strange particles that decay very rapidly. He plans graduate studies in physics next fall at Princeton.

By contrast, this summer at BNL will be John Selker's first stay on the East Coast. A native of Portland, Oregon, he is studying physics at Reed College and is currently working with William Walker at ISA-

BELLE on the assembly of a high-voltage end calibration board, a part of the interphase between the neutrino detector and the computer.

Also from the West coast is Malina Hills from Piedmont, California. She's taking a break from her chemical engineering studies at Yale to work on several areas of advanced coal technology with Morris Beller, DEE.

Kristy Bennett will not spend the summer in a lab. With a background in chemistry from Illinois State University, she'll be honing different research and writing skills, at the National Center for Analysis of Energy Systems studying how long utility industries take to implement new technology.

Like most women in science, she's used to being in the minority. "I take it humorously," she said with a smile, "and as an opportunity to show the men we know just as much as they know."

The Great Horizon

Asked where they see themselves in five or ten years, most students grin benignly and their eyes glaze over for a moment. But quick to rebound, most say they plan to be in graduate school or industry, applying skills they're exercising now, or ones closely related.

"I may pursue architecture," John Selker mused, "but I'd also like to work in something related to electronics. That's one reason I came to Brookhaven - I wanted to see how large experiments are done, and be

A Look Into The Briny Deep —by 31st Biology Symposium

About 150 ecologists, biochemists and physiologists from the U.S. and abroad met last week at the 31st Brookhaven Symposium in Biology to exchange information on "Primary Productivity in the Sea." It was the first time that such an exchange has taken place among these specialists.

Over the past 20 years, increasing efforts have been made to understand the interactions between aquatic plants and the physical environment in which they live. Although data gathering capabilities have mushroomed, scientists have become much more specialized, and are not familiar with each other's problems. The symposium was convened to bring the specialists together, and to discuss the many biochemical and physiological tools available, as well as the oceanographic problems ecologists face.

Most plant biomass is terrestrial, but the small amount of plant biomass in aquatic systems is responsible for 30-50% of the annual primary productivity in the world. One of the numerous problems is to accurately determine plant biomass in the sea. Developments in the area of remote sensing by satellites and aircraft are promising, but unproven in field conditions. According to Paul Falkowski, oceanographer in DEE and chairman of the Symposium Committee, the conference also brought together

scientists in this field to discuss future research goals and formulate new concepts.

The symposium also examined the problem of carbon dioxide released from the combustion of fossil fuels. Each year, about 40% of the CO₂ is lost in the atmosphere, and the question is, where does it go? The current thought is that some is stored in the ocean as a result of primary production. According to the latest estimates, Falkowski said it is believed that 20x10¹² kilograms of carbon per year are produced by phytoplankton, 4x10¹² kilograms per square meter by seaweeds, and 2x10¹² kilograms on coral reefs.

The program for the symposium was developed by the Departments of Biology, Energy and Environment, and an External Advisory Committee. Serving on the committee with Falkowski were Geoffrey Hind (Biology), H.W. Siegelman (Biology), and John Walsh (DEE). They also served as session chairmen, together with R.W. Eppley, Scripps Institute of Oceanography, and C.S. Yentsch, Bigelow Laboratory for Ocean Sciences.

The symposium was sponsored by the Department of Energy, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration.

DNI Lecture: Breaking Away

Four years ago the International Energy Agency (IEA) initiated a systems analysis study to evaluate new energy technologies. The objective was to develop a cooperative RD&D strategy for the member nations which could lead eventually to a reduction in oil dependence.

In the last Brookhaven Lecture of the current season, Vance Sailor, Project Director, will describe these studies. His lecture, "Breaking Away" will be given on Wednesday, June 18, at 8 p.m. in Berkner Hall.

To try and get out from under the oil yoke, more than a hundred new technologies have been evaluated for a variety of assumed future world situations. Included were supply, con-


version, end-use, and conservation technologies.

In the IEA assessment, new and existing technologies were described in terms of quantitative data based on a standard set of ground rules. How these technologies would compete for market shares over a 45-year period was shown by a computer model (MARKAL). The competition was governed by scenarios which reflected various sets of assumptions about future world situations.

Representatives from 16 nations and the Commission of European Communities shared in the studies at BNL and Kernforschungsanlage Julich (KFA), host institutions for the project. The results of the studies will be used by IEA policy-makers in preparing strategic guidelines for future energy technology research and development.

Vance Sailor, a senior physicist, has headed the IEA Energy Systems Analysis Project since its inception in 1976. For six years prior to that post, he was engaged in a variety of studies, including a survey of energy resources, environmental impacts of energy production, nuclear power plant safety, and conservation opportunities. Sailor came to Brookhaven in 1949, after receiving his Ph.D. in physics from Yale, and until 1970 conducted experimental research in nuclear physics.

involved in construction on the electronics end."

Lisa Olson hopes to follow through with work related to her current biophysics project at the Safety & Environmental Protection Division: detection of trends of total radiation received by different groups of Scientific researchers over a period of years. She commented on being impressed with the Lab's relaxed atmosphere and is pleased to find "more a sense of cooperation than competition among workers."

Applications Decline

Dr. Glenn Price, Head of the Office of Academic Relations, noted the 460 applications received this year show a significant drop from last year's 647. As a probable cause, he cited an increasing number of industries developing their own summer student programs.

"Places like Bell Labs and Procter and Gamble can pay more," he said. "We don't believe they offer better jobs, just better paying jobs."

Students in BNL's program receive a \$135/week stipend, which is up \$10 from last year.

Selection and Distribution

According to Edith Thornhill of the Office of Academic Relations, applications are initially screened and separated into disciplines by the Office. Scientists in each department then select students they think are best suited for their work, and notify the Office of their decision.

The Department of Energy and Environment carries seventeen students, by far the largest single contingent. Physics follows next with twelve men, and Accelerator third with nine students. The Medical Department has eight students, Safety & Environmental Protection Division, five; Nuclear Energy, six; Chemistry, five; Biology, three; Director's Office, two; Applied Mathematics, Instrumentation Division and the National Synchrotron Light Source, one each.

It's Inventory Time

A physical inventory of all capital equipment, sensitive property and equipment purchased for other agencies, will begin on June 16, and is scheduled for completion by September 15. Taking a property inventory every two years is required by DOE regulations.

The inventory calls for locating and tagging 28,900 items, valued at \$142,900,000. Property representatives from each department and division, along with additional assigned personnel, are responsible for finding and tagging each piece of equipment assigned to their organizations.

This is an enormous task, and Laboratory employees who have equipment assigned directly to them, or to their groups, are asked to give the inventory teams every assistance in locating the equipment.
