Hennessy Heads Site Division

John J. (Jack) Hennessy has been appointed Superintendent of the Site Division, effective as of February 11. He replaces Herman Haller who has moved to Arizona.

Hennessy, a graduate of SUNY's Maritime College, is a Registered Professional Engineer and has been active in many projects since he joined the Lab in 1960. His first seven years at Brookhaven were spent as a staff engineer at the Cosmotron. In 1967, he transferred to the Plant Engineering Division (PE) where he was charged with providing engineering technical support for waste water treatment, potable water treatment, ground water monitoring and water supply.

Hennessy also has served as project engineer on two important PE undertakings - the Upland Recharge Project and the Alternate Liquid Fuel and Micronized Coal-Oil Blending project for the central steam plant. In addition, he was a technical advisor for the BNL/Town of Brookhaven solid-waste-to-energy study.

Before coming to Brookhaven, Hennessy spent five years as an engi-

A Window Into The Brain

Mysteries of the mind are being probed by a team of BNL scientists from Chemistry and Medical. They are looking into the living human brain with a technique called positron emission transaxial tomography (PETT).

The brain gets its energy by burning glucose. When you move an arm, the part of the brain controlling arm movement burns more glucose. When you look at something, the part of the brain involving sight burns more glucose, and so on. A PETT scanner can quantitatively measure regional glucose metabolism and other brain functions.

The Lab currently owns a PETT III machine, which has been doing brain scans since 1977 on a collaborative basis with the University of Pennsylvania. Based on promising research with that machine, the Chemistry and Medical Departments and New York University Medical Center were jointly awarded a three-year grant in September 1979 by the National Institute of Neurological and Communicative Disorders and Stroke, one of the National Institutes of Health, for investigations on metabolism and neuroscience.

According to chemist Alfred P. Wolf, principal investigator and program project director, the research is divided into specific biomedical areas. Some of these are: 1) measurement of glucose metabolism in people with mental disorders such as schizophrenia, 2) measurement of glucose utilization in senile dementia (a disease of the aged who have lost cognitive ability), and 3) study of opiate and dopaminergic receptors in the brain (which facilitate transmission of pain, sensory and motor signals and are involved in other functions).

New York University Medical Center, in its collaboration with BNL, is providing patient populations for the newly funded studies. In partial collaboration with the University of Pennsylvania, studies have been done with audio, visual, and sensory stimulation, comparing right ear to left ear, right eye to left eye, and right hand to left hand. To date, a total of 57 patients have been scanned, covering also the areas of schizophrenia, senile dementia, and manic depression.

Scanning Method

This is the procedure for doing a PETT scan. A short-lived radioactive tracer, commonly 2-fluoro-2-deoxyglucose (labeled with ^{18}F and having a half-life of 110 minutes) is administered to the subject and is taken up

by the brain. The tracer behaves essentially the same as glucose in the first metabolic step (at that point the deoxy compound is blocked from further metabolism). Radiation emitted by the tracer within the brain is recorded externally by a ring of detectors encircling the head. Data are fed into a computer, which then reconstructs three-dimensional pictures of brain function.

The pictures are black and white, white areas indicating higher brain activity. The brighter an area, the more activity. For example, in one of the first series of scans, a collaborative effort between BNL and the University of Pennsylvania in 1977, the subject was flexing his right arm as his brain was being scanned. Since the left side of the brain controls the right side of the body, the scans were brighter on the left side, indicating increased brain activity there.

Brain metabolism, receptor site distribution, and blood flow can all be studied, depending on the radioactive tracer used. Thus, a PETT scan captures and quantitates dynamic processes in the brain, helping to reveal biochemical pathways of brain function.

PETT vs. CAT

PETT scanners are significantly different from CAT scanners, which are perhaps more familiar to the general public (the 1979 Nobel prize in medicine was jointly awarded to the developers of the CAT scanner). A CAT scanner uses an external radiation source; radiation passes through the brain and is detected on the other side. Although a CAT scan is a very sophisticated X-ray, it is a static picture and does not show the function of an organ the way a PETT scan does.

PETT VI

A new, state-of-the-art PETT VI machine will be built for Brookhaven. Modeled after one at Washington University in St. Louis, it will be five to ten times more sensitive than PETT III. David Christman, Chemistry, explains that PETT III can actually be used to scan any part of the body. PETT VI will be built only for brain scans. So, in addition to being simply better, the improved PETT VI detectors will also be positioned closer in, around an aperture only big enough for a head scan. Versatility is sacrificed for more sensitivity.



PETT VI will also be able to take seven "slices" or cross-sections of the brain at one time, an improvement over PETT III, which can only visualize one slice at a time. PETT VI will be able to do cross sections of an entire brain in a total time of as little as one minute.

Future Application

Although now used only in research, PETT scanners may eventually become diagnostic tools for physicians. Bertrand Brill, Medical, points out that mental illnesses are treated mostly on the basis of observable symptoms. Using PETT scanners, doctors may be able to see how the brain actually functions and more precisely characterize various patients because of differences in their brain biochemistry.

For example, the basis of schizophrenia is not really known. In early BNL studies of one or two schizophrenic patients, brain scans showed abnormal distributions of glucose metabolism. Under the long term project, studies are being done to explore further these earlier findings.

The scan on the right was taken of another subject while Hungarian was read to him in the right ear only. Since the subject could not understand Hungarian, English words were periodically inserted to keep his interest. He was asked to push a button every time he heard an English word (and promised financial reward for every correct identification). The scan of this subject shows more brain activity on the left side of his brain, indicated by the brighter left side. In fact, numerical data compiled in the scan show a 25% increase in brain activity on the left side as compared to the right side.

Researchers hope that biochemical analyses of brain function will provide clues leading to successful treatment of schizophrenia and other brain disorders.

Says Wolf, "This is a new field of research. Our project is a large-scale multidisciplinary, interdisciplinary effort. Brookhaven and a few other institutions in the U.S. have started a world-wide explosion in this area."

neer with the General Electric Company, and two years as an Engineering Officer in the U.S. Navy.

The Site Division, which currently has 172 employees, takes care of the operation and maintenance of roads and grounds, the sewage treatment plant, heavy mobile equipment, and includes riggers and custodians. As to how he sees his new job, Hennessy says "the Division will continue to provide these essential services to the Laboratory in an efficient manner, but we will always be looking for ways to do them better."

Auto Advice

When you have to make a "pit stop" on site or elsewhere, don't leave the car running. In general, every 20 seconds, an idling vehicle burns enough gas for a restart. Whether you are driving a government vehicle or your own car, prolonged idling wastes fuel, shortens engine life, plug life, and increases sludge production in the crankcase. In fact, a rule in SPI 5-05 states that drivers should not leave a parked vehicle with the ignition keys in it.

The SPI also states that all persons who operate a government vehicle at any time, either on-site or off-site, must possess both a valid state driver's license and a current Government Motor Vehicle Operator's Identification Card. And drivers should operate only those models or types of vehicles for which they are licensed.




Cooking Exchange
