




Season's Greetings



A 20th Century Chimney Sweep

"Are you a magician?"

Tots who see Mike Paquette in his black top hat and tails frequently ask that question. And Paquette often responds by pulling a quarter out of his hat. But when the kids press him to produce a rabbit, Paquette is forced to admit that he isn't a magician after all. He is a chimney sweep wearing the traditional uniform of his trade.

At work at BNL, Mike Paquette wears another uniform — that of a BNL Police Officer. BNL Police work 12-hour rotating shifts. They are also on call to cover emergencies and must be available as necessary for training. When Paquette considered taking on a second, part-time job to earn some extra money, he knew it would have to be something flexible, that wouldn't interfere with his first priority.

"I figured I'd have to start some kind of part-time business, but I didn't know what," he explained. "Then I read an article in 'Mother Earth News' about being your own chimney sweep. It mentioned a company in Connecticut that sold chimney cleaning equipment, so Bill Byrnes and I went up for a demonstration."

Bill Byrnes is also a BNL Police Officer. He and Paquette became partners, sharing the initial investment of about \$3,500 to purchase the

tools of their trade. The partnership ended amicably last month when Paquette bought out Byrnes' half of the business and became the sole owner of Fireside Chimney Sweeps.

Why did Byrnes and Paquette become chimney sweeps? "Coal and wood stoves were becoming big and people were becoming energy conscious and safety conscious," Paquette said. "At that time, there were only about eight chimney sweeps in all of Suffolk and we decided there were a lot more chimneys than they could handle."


Once they had their rods and brushes, the new sweeps had to learn how to use them. "We did about 20 free jobs for our friends," said Paquette. "Then we tried to generate business by advertising at low prices. I'd say it took almost six months before we were really confident of our ability. After the first year we had plenty of referral customers, and it has just about doubled every year since." Paquette estimates that about 30% of his business is from Lab people who have seen his ad in the Bulletin. The service normally costs \$45, but Lab employees are charged \$40.

For their money, Paquette's customers receive a thorough cleaning of their chimneys and stovepipes — with no mess. After donning a filtering mask to protect him from soot, Paquette lays out canvas to protect the floor and turns on a huge vacuum that inhales falling soot. Then, from the rooftop and on the ground, he uses long rods and brushes to scrape the creosote that builds up from fireplaces and wood stoves and the ash that accumulates from coal stoves.

Although he can keep the soot out of a home, Paquette cannot keep it off himself. "It's a pretty dirty job and there's not that much profit," he said. "That's why only a handful of people keep at it after three or four years. But I've been doing it for three years now and I really enjoy it. I meet a lot of people. My costume is a novelty to many of them and I often have my picture taken."

Chimney sweeps have worn top hats and tails almost since the profession came into existence. That happened around 1800 in England, when people began to realize that chimney fires, which were relatively common, were caused by dirty chimneys. The black top hats and tails hid some of the soot while giving the sweeps a certain elegance. Some of this finery apparently came from undertakers, while some came as payment from customers. Some chimney sweeps believe that wearing a top hat will save them from falling off a roof. Another superstition that evolved early on said that if a sweep cleaned your chimney, you would have good luck for a year — or at least no fires.

No fires — that's really the whole point of Mike Paquette's enterprise. In addition to the safety measures compiled on this page, Paquette suggests that a chimney from a fireplace

or wood stove should at least be looked at after a cord of wood has been burned. Coal stoves, Paquette said, "should be cleaned every year, right at the end of the heating season." If ash is left in the pipes through the summer, and mixes with moisture, a chemical reaction can create an acid capable of eroding the pipes in just a year.

When chimneys are cleaned regularly, Paquette said, the average job should take less than an hour. But the build up in some of the chimneys he has done was so bad, the job took more than three hours.

In his work, Paquette gets to see more than dirty chimneys. Among his favorites was a Setauket mansion with a mantle made in 1657 that was imported from a French castle. "The houses I remember most are the old houses," he said, "and the ones I like to do are those right on the water. When I get up on the roof, I have a beautiful view."

With his ability to see the beauty instead of the soot, it may be that chimney sweep Mike Paquette is something of a magician after all.

Tips On Preventing A Chimney Fire

Creosote is a by-product of wood combustion. In fireplaces or wood burning stoves, creosote condenses out of the flue gases onto cooler surfaces, as a dark, sticky substance with an unpleasant odor. At very hot temperatures, creosote can ignite easily causing a chimney fire, the symptoms of which include dense, light gray smoke pouring from the chimney and a roaring sound inside of it. The intense flames generated can not only damage the masonry of the chimney, but can also threaten the rest of the house and the surrounding area. These tips on preventing a chimney fire were compiled from literature provided by chimney sweep Mike Paquette.

1. Don't burn trash in a fireplace, wood stove or furnace.
2. Never start a fire in a wood heat unit that is filled with kindling.
3. Don't stuff a dried-out Christmas tree into a wood heat unit.
4. Never put full draft on a large, restacked fire.
5. Check stove pipes and chimney flues periodically for creosote build up. Tap on the exterior of a stove pipe with a metal object. A metal ping indicates build up.
6. Inspect chimney regularly, either from the roof or using a mirror to look up through the chimney flue.
7. Hire a professional chimney sweep to clean and inspect your chimney once a year as recommended by the National Fire Protection Association (every six months if a wood burning stove is used regularly).

The Perfect Tree

If you're about to choose your Christmas tree, the Cooperative Extension Association of Suffolk County suggests three simple tests for selecting a tree that will stay green and fresh throughout the holiday season:

- Bend a needle on the tree to see if it is resilient.
- Bump the base of the tree on the ground. In most cases, if the needles do not fall, the tree is fresh.
- Feel the bottom of the stump for a sappy moistness.

Tree Safety

Your Christmas tree should be beautiful, but it should also be safe. Without proper care, the lights that make your tree lovely could also make it a hazard. To prevent electrical shock, or a fire from electrical failure or a short circuit, the Cooperative Extension Association of Suffolk County suggests checking to be sure all tree lights and extension cords have an Underwriters label and are in good condition:

- Place lights on the floor and straighten out all kinks in the wiring. Then check for broken insulation or damaged bulb sockets. Discard any damaged strings, but save the bulbs. Do not attempt repairs with tape.
- Plug into an outlet and check for faulty connections.
- Unplug the string before placing it on the tree. Work down from the top of the tree.

In keeping with the Affirmative Action plan, selection decisions are made without regard to age, race, color, religion, national origin, sex, handicap or veteran status.
