Mesons can provide physicists with important clues in the search for understanding of the basic quark structure and the gluons which provide the forces that bind quarks together. Mesons are extremely short-lived particles that can only be studied with huge accelerators and enormously complicated spectrometers. One of the most important present theoretical concepts is that the forces that hold quarks together (gluons) in mesons derive from a so-called local gauge symmetry principle for the color quantum numbers of the mesons. This theory requires glueballs (states consisting of two or more gluons); but for many years glueballs were not discovered. The discovery of states that are believed to be glueballs was made at the AGS with MPSII by a BNL/CCNY team last year. These striking results were reported at the Seventh International Conference on Experimental Meson Spectroscopy held at BNL, April 14-15. Many other interesting new results in meson spectroscopy were also presented to the attendees — 128 physicists from a dozen countries. "This basic field appears vital and promising for future activities in particle physics," said Sam Lindenbaum, BNL/CCNY, who arranged the conference with the help of the Organizing Committee and associated staff. Nuclear models are used to calculate the neutron cross sections for a large variety of nuclei of materials used in such applications as fission and fusion reactors, neutron shielding and spallation neutron sources. One of the most important parameters in these calculations, nuclear level density, was the main topic of discussion at an Advisory Group Meeting of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) held April 11-15 at Brookhaven. Over 50 physicists from 12 IAEA-member countries visited BNL to discuss "Basic and Applied Problems of Nuclear Level Densities." Among those who attended the conference were (from left) Steve Grimes, Ohio University; Mulki Bhat, BNL; Vladimir Pronyaev, IAEA; Enzo Menapace, CNEN Laboratory, Bologna, Italy; Bob Haight, Lawrence Livermore Laboratory; Herbert Vonach, Radium Research Institute, Vienna, Austria; and Eric Lynn, Harwell, U.K. The meeting was sponsored by the IAEA and the National Nuclear Data Center at Brookhaven.

Palmer Named Assoc. Director

Robert B. Palmer has been appointed to the position of Associate Director for High Energy Physics, effective May 1. Palmer will report to the Director and be responsible for the high energy physics program at the AGS and the CBA, including the development, construction and operation of experimental detectors.

In making the announcement, Director Nicholas P. Samios said that "Dr. Palmer will bring a varied experience and an inventive mind to this position and will, I am sure, fill it with distinction."

Palmer will chair the High Energy Advisory Committee on the research program. The high energy part of the Physics Department will report to him as will the Instrumentation Division and Central Shops.

He will continue to lead a task force on advanced accelerator design and development, which is under the overall supervision of Paul Reardon, Associate Director for High Energy Facilities.

After obtaining his Ph.D. from, and doing a year's postdoctoral study at, Imperial College, London, Palmer came to the Laboratory in 1960. He has worked in a wide variety of problems and fields: bubble chamber design, neutrino physics, accelerator theory, counter experiments at the CERN ISR and, more recently, in

superconducting magnets. He played important roles in the discovery of charmed baryons, neutral currents and direct single photons. He contributed many of the concepts for the large bubble chambers. He invented multiple horn focussing, momentum stochastic cooling, the inverse free electron laser and the grating accelerator. His work on superconducting magnets has brought him world-wide acclaim.


Urban Dwellers Burn More Wood

With uncertain oil supplies and steep price increases for petroleum and natural gas, homeowners have increasingly turned to alternate fuels for home heating. Frederick Lipfert, DEE, and Jennifer Dungan, now at the Marine Biological Laboratory in Woods Hole, report in an article recently published by Science that in the United States, about 9-11% of the fuel used for space heating is firewood. Surprisingly, this usage is concentrated in urbanized areas of the Northeast and north central states.

With wood-burning concentrated in more densely populated areas, Lipfert and Dungan raise the question of how this might affect air quality. They point out that although wood smoke is generally regarded as benign by the public, there is concern about effects on ambient air quality and health that might result from widespread use of wood fuel and about accidents from harvesting wood.

To determine residential firewood use, Lipfert and Dungan surveyed U.S. Department of Agriculture data from 64 counties in New England. They developed an equation for wood usage which was then applied to all counties in the United States, except for Alaska and Hawaii (see map). To check on the validity of this extrapolation of New England data to the rest of the country, state totals were compared to survey data from twelve other states. In general, the states surveyed used firewood in the same manner as New England.

Demographic data on users of wood fuel, where available, indicate that use of wood for space heating is no longer concentrated among the rural poor. For example, in a wood-scarce state like Kansas, nearly 31% of households in the five largest cities used some wood for heating, as compared

with 33% of the households in rural farm and rural suburban households in three counties in upstate New York.

Rosen Bottles Flash For Better Pix

Some years ago, BNL photographer Mort Rosen developed a lighting technique to use for candid photography. Lighting is tricky in photography, and setting up proper lighting is a time-consuming art. How to take quick candids and still light the subject properly?

Rosen came up with an ingenious idea. He took an ordinary plastic bottle, the polyethylene, translucent kind that is readily available from the stockroom. Then he cut a hole in the side of the bottle and stuck it over a flash unit. Says Rosen, "You can really see the difference when you use it. The bottle acts as a diffuser, which can also be used in conjunction with other lights in multiple-lighting. It permits greater control of lighting ratios — the relative intensity of one light compared to another."

Other BNL photographers have picked up the idea, and it never fails to arouse curiosity in those who see it for the first time. One such curious person was Leonard Newman, in the Department of Energy and Environment, who copied it for his own flash attachment.

Newman made sure to take along a bottle on a recent trip to the People's Republic of China. On past trips to China, he had used his regular flash unit to take close-up pictures of food, but the harsh flash light always

spoiled its appetizing appearance. So on this trip, he used Rosen's bottle trick, and the food looked yummy.

Newman was in China for a month, traveling all over the country. By the time he left, he spotted numerous photographers popping their flashes through plastic bottles. The Chinese knew a good idea when they saw one!

Safety Alert

Now and then a story gets into circulation that is frightening — but entirely false. The Safety & Environmental Protection Division advises employees of one such "scare story" now going around which describes two alleged incidents of employee blindness resulting from an electric arc flash. An article in the March issue of the "Occupational Safety & Health Reporter" reported that these allegations are completely erroneous and "that no such accident ever has occurred."

The article explained that the story was perpetuated when Genstar Stone Products Company sent out a bulletin to its plants which described how two men, one working for United Parcel Service and the other for Duquesne Electric, lost their eyesight as a result of an electric arc flash bonding the contact lens to the cornea of the eye. The story claimed that both men were wearing contact lenses, and when they removed the contacts, the cornea of the eye was removed along with the lens, resulting in permanent blindness. According to Genstar's corporate safety director, the information was copied directly from a flyer circulated by a Pennsylvania mining com-

pany, and no attempt was made to verify the two incidents.

Having learned that the allegations are completely false, Genstar has withdrawn the bulletin. The article also quoted Dennis Hirschfelder of the National Society to Prevent Blindness as saying that it is "totally impossible" for the claimed eye hazards to occur.

Inside Info

Robert T. Drew, director of inhalation toxicology in the Medical Department, was recently elected to the American Board of Toxicology. He will serve for a term of three years. The Board's main purposes are to encourage the study of the science of toxicology and to certify by means of examination members of the profession.




PSI News
