


Season's Greetings

Standing under a genuine holly-wood star, Harriet the rubber tree plant has been dressed up by Janice Lamb to decorate the Directors Office.






The Composition Group in Photography & Graphic Arts reproduced some of the symbols available on their type fonts to create their tree decorations.

From Personnel

Dental/Medical

Employees who elected the AUI Dental Assistance Plan are reminded that effective January 1, 1984, they and their eligible dependents will be subject to a major medical calendar year deductible of \$200 per individual (\$500 per family) under the AUI Medical Insurance Plan.

Also effective January 1, 1984, employees enrolled in the Blue Cross/Blue Shield HMO Plan (CHPS) will be charged a premium of \$2.08 a month (48¢ weekly) for employee only coverage, and \$5.20 a month (\$1.20 weekly) for family coverage. These premiums are the amounts equal to the difference between the cost of the current \$100 a year deductible and the new \$200 a year deductible from the AUI Medical Insurance Plan.

Retirement

Employees currently making voluntary contributions to the regular TIAA-CREF retirement plan are reminded that December 30, 1983, is the deadline for changing their contributions to another TIAA-CREF account, or to one of several Mutual Fund options.

If a new salary reduction agreement or payroll deduction form is not received in payroll by December 30, the employee's contribution to the regular TIAA-CREF retirement plan will be automatically cancelled and included in the next paycheck. TIAA-CREF and Mutual fund applications and other necessary forms are available in Personnel. For further information, call Personnel services, Ext. 7516.

A Good Deed Is Its Own Reward

Most people operate by the "finders keepers" rule. However, Wilbur Bailey of Staff Services is an exceptional exception. Within December, Bailey happened upon over \$11,000. Rather than pocket the money, Bailey chose to find the owners, and return it to them. Instead of weeping over their losses, two people can be thankful that, as one of them put it, we still have people like Wilbur Bailey in this world.

On Friday December 2 while at his bank in Coram, Bailey saw a wallet "just lying on the counter. I picked it up, and noticed it was full of bills. I counted the money -- there was over \$500 in cash. I asked a teller if anyone had reported that they had lost their wallet. She said yes, another teller had. She called him over to her window, and I handed the wallet over to the gentleman. I didn't even get a hand shake."

Undaunted by the lack of appreciation, Bailey repeated his good deed by returning a \$10,573 check the following Friday. On December 9, he was walking from his car to a Middle Island stationery store when he spotted a white letter sized envelope in the parking lot. "I almost didn't pick it up, but I changed my mind because I tend to pick up things," says Bailey. "I put it in my pants pocket, and forgot all about it until I was cleaning out my pockets at home." Inside the envelope was the big check.

Not trusting his eyes, Bailey asked his wife Daisy to look at the check, and she confirmed that the amount he thought he saw was the actual amount printed on the check. The check was drawn on the account of Elite Liquors. Since Bailey was going to his bank in Coram, he stopped in Middle Island to return the check.

"When I went into the store, I

showed him the envelope, but he didn't recognize it. So I showed him the check, and was he surprised. He said that his boss lost it that afternoon."

"We appreciated Bailey's returning the check to us," says Joseph Chaikel, owner of the liquor store. "Though no one could have cashed it since it was made out to a corporation, we would have had to go through the trouble of stopping the check and would never have known what happened to it."

Bailey, an employee of the Lab for 24 years on December 12, says his conscience is clear, and that he feels proud. "I've found a lot of things here at the Lab, expensive jewelry and large bills, and I've always tried to find the owners."

Living Trees

The Cooperative Extension Association of Suffolk County offers these tips for having a living tree at Christmas time and planting it later outdoors:

- When selecting a tree, check the root ball for firmness around the tree trunk and for unbroken soil. Choose one that can withstand the warm, dry air inside for a short time. Recommended species are Colorado blue spruce, Black Hills spruce, Norway spruce, Douglas fir and Fraser fir; not recommended are evergreens with delicate needles or those that require a cold damp climate (Canadian hemlock, white cedar, white and black spruce, white pine and balsam fir).
- Wrap the root ball in plastic while in the house to keep it moist and prevent floor damage. Put the tree in a tub-like container.
- Keep the tree indoors as short a time as possible.
- After the holidays, put the tree in a garage or unheated room for a week to ten days to acclimate it to the cold outdoor temperatures before setting it out.
- A few weeks before planting, dig the hole or cover the area with a heavy mulch to prevent freezing. Keep dug up soil at above freezing temperatures.
- After proper acclimation, plant the tree, water it well, fill in the soil, water it again, then mulch it heavily over the winter. Or put the tree and tub in a protected place (a garage or sheltered corner of a porch away from sun and wind), and plant in late March.
