


## Watson Wins Hume-Rothery Metallurgy Prize

Richard Watson, senior physicist in the Physics Department, has been given the 1985 William Hume-Rothery Award by the Metallurgical Society of AIME (American Institute of Mining, Metallurgical and Petroleum Engineers). Watson was recognized for his outstanding scholarly contributions to the science of alloys. The award was presented on February 25 at the 114th Annual Meeting of AIME in

New York City. At the meeting, Watson gave the Hume-Rothery Lecture which was part of a symposium on the properties of noble metal alloys.

Watson, a solid state theorist, obtained his Ph.D. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has been at the Lab since 1965 and his principal research has been on the electronic properties of atoms and alloys. This involves theoretical calculations on the way in which electrons are distributed when two metals are combined to make an alloy, and how this bonding is manifested in experiment and in the energetics of alloy formation.

Watson's publication list is impressive and, among his BNL collaborators, the name of Morris Perlman is frequently cited. In fact, one of the lines of research which led to the award involved the collaboration of Watson, Perlman and Jerome Hudis, in 1971, on photoemission and Mössbauer isomer shift studies of alloys.

With Perlman and Fred Mills, Watson started the ball rolling on the acquisition and early design of the National Synchrotron Light Source. In particular, he was active in building design, machine specifications, radiation safety and beam line instrumentation. In 1976, he was a member of the National Academy Panel on "An Assessment of the National Need for Facilities Dedicated to the Production of Synchrotron Radiation."

Watson has also had a long-standing consultancy with the Metallurgy Division, National Bureau of Standards, and continues to collaborate with them.

William Hume-Rothery was an eminent metallurgical physicist, and it is in his name that the award was established, in 1972, by the Institute of Metals Division of the Metallurgical Society of AIME. The award is given annually.

## WIS Scholarship Fund Drive

To encourage women to continue their studies, Brookhaven Women in Science (WIS) has established the Renate W. Chasman Scholarship. WIS will make one-time awards of \$1,000 to Long Island women undergraduates in their last two years, or women graduate students who have returned to college full-time to resume their studies in the sciences or technical fields.

WIS officers say that Chasman was selected because she was prominent in her field and a Brookhaven woman scientist who should be recognized for her contribution to science and this Laboratory. The scholarship was established to honor her memory and keep her spirit alive.

In an interview with the Bulletin in 1971, Chasman commented that she was used to working in a man's world, and she did not feel that there was any problem with how her colleagues treated her. "Possibly there has been a real change in more women getting out of the house and working, though I think the change is very, very far from being complete."

The six members of the scholarship committee, currently headed by Eva Bozoki, have begun approaching the largest technical corporations on the Island for contributions. These appeals are being made because the companies have expressed concern that there are not enough technical people on Long Island to meet industry's need. After the largest firms respond, the scholarship committee will ask for donations from Long Island's approximately 250 smaller

high tech firms. In addition, WIS will solicit contributions from BNL employees.

WIS plans to raise funds just once, over a year or two, and hopes to raise enough money to utilize the interest as a stipend. If what they raise is not enough for a perpetual scholarship, they will use the principal until it is exhausted.

The scholarship is another example of how WIS is attempting to fulfill their charter as an educational organization aimed at providing a forum for the exchange of professional and technical information for the benefit of women, and to promote the advancement of women in the scientific professions.

WIS is a not-for-profit organization incorporated under the Education Laws of New York State and was the brainchild of WIS founder and Group Coordinator Harriet Martin. WIS began as a speakers bureau whereby women scientists from the Lab spoke at high school or college career days, panels on careers for women and seminars on women in non-traditional fields. The aim of this "One Mind" program was to encourage girls and young women to consider science, mathematics and engineering as possible careers and to provide role models.

"As a by-product of educating the public, raising their consciousness and acting as role models, we discovered that we enjoyed talking to other women in science," explains Victoria McLane, a WIS founder and trustee. (Continued on page 2)

## Renate W. Chasman

Renate W. Chasman (1932-77) came to BNL in 1963 after a three-year postdoc at Columbia University. She had received an M.Sc. in 1955 and a Ph.D. in 1959 in experimental nuclear physics from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. At Brookhaven, she moved from experimentation to theory after becoming interested in the design of particle accelerators and became the only female physicist in the Accelerator Department. Chasman was chief theorist of the group that designed and built the 200-MeV AGS linac injector. From linear accelerators, she turned her attention to storage rings, particularly the design of electron storage rings to be used in the production of synchrotron light. Chasman devised a new design of an electron storage ring that was optimized for synchrotron radiation production. It was different from the component arrangement used for a high energy physics storage ring. The design of the storage rings at the NSLS are based upon her work, as are the storage rings for the light sources proposed for Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory and for laboratories in Europe. Five years after she was diagnosed as having cancer, Chasman died in October of 1977.



## Davis Named Special Assistant

M. Sue Davis, deputy head of the Waste Management Division of the Department of Nuclear Energy, is on leave from that post to be Special Assistant to the Associate Director for Applied Programs, Seymour Baron.

Baron says Davis was selected for this management training spot because she is "mature and knows her business. I needed someone who really knew the departments of Applied Science and Nuclear Energy." Davis started her new job on March 4 and will use her scientific expertise to assist Baron in technical matters and in the administration of the programs under his jurisdiction.

So far, research has predominated in Davis' career. She came to Brookhaven in February 1974 as a research

associate in the Porphyrin Chemistry group, Chemical Sciences Division of the Department of Applied Science. She received her Ph.D. in physical chemistry from the University of Rochester in 1975. For six years she worked on various aspects of photosynthesis and was promoted to Associate Chemist. In 1980, she moved to the Department of Nuclear Energy where she has been concerned with the technical evaluation of problems associated with the management of radioactive wastes. She was made deputy head of the Nuclear Waste Management Division in 1982 and now has the rank of chemist.

In the next two years Davis expects to learn a lot about the ins and outs of science administration and this could well determine her future career path.

## Warning System Upgraded

BNL'sers are accustomed to hearing the wail of sirens every Monday at noon and know that it's a test of the Lab's emergency warning system. This past Monday, however, you may have noticed a few changes.

The sirens sound louder because two new sirens have been added to the original contingent of three. In addition to the old sirens located near police headquarters, fire headquarters and Bldg. 911, sirens have been installed atop Buildings 463 and 555.

Another difference is a change in signals, as follows:

- A *continuous sounding* of the sirens signals a *Laboratory-wide alert*.
- The *intermittent sounding* of the sirens signals a *Laboratory-wide evacuation*.

Now that the new sirens are operational, the two-toned warbling air horns, formerly used to signal a Laboratory-wide alert, have been discontinued. Frank Crifasi, the Laboratory's Emergency Planning Coordinator in the Safeguards & Emergency Services Division, explained that the signal change was necessary because the sirens are now serving double-duty, sounding for both an alert and an evacuation. Copies of the new site emergency signals have been printed on press-apply material suitable for posting or for covering the emergency signals information on the inside front cover of the 1984 BNL phone directory. For a supply of the stickers, contact your department's Safety Coordinator.

"We realized that when we were talking with other women, we gave each other more information and could talk more freely." So McLane and Martin organized WIS, which is supported by the Office of Scientific Personnel.

WIS currently has over 100 members, including three men, and offers monthly meetings for a general audience and a lecture series on technical topics by leading women scientists. "I enjoy meeting women scientists who have really made it in their fields," says McLane. "When I started in science, almost all the role models were men, so it is nice to have women heroes as well."

In the past, WIS has supported establishing a day care center convenient for employees and an on-site credit union, and coordinating medical insurance benefits for husband and wife teams employed at the Lab. "We expect fund-raising for the Renate Chasman Scholarship to take all of our efforts for a while," says Martin, "but it will be worthwhile if we can help women re-enter college, complete their studies, and pursue scientific and technical careers."

changed to help acquaint the Laboratory population with the new site emergency signals," Crifasi said. The test now consists of a brief steady siren (Lab-wide alert), followed by a brief intermittent siren (Lab-wide evacuation).

Every Monday at 11:55 a.m., just before the sirens are tested, the 60 Plectron receivers now located around site are also tested. The receivers were installed in January in order to improve the site-wide warning system. At this time, Crifasi noted, "Since not all buildings contain Plectrons, the system is designed to initiate the emergency telephone notification system. Individual departments will continue to make further telephone notifications."

From the transmission panel in Police Headquarters, alerts can be sent around the site in three modes: a general call, which activates all 60 receivers; a zone call, where only the receivers situated in one of the site's 20 geographic zones will receive the transmission; and a selective call, which would only be transmitted to designated receivers.

The first two tests of the new receivers took place on January 7 and 14. "Between the second and third tests," Crifasi said, "we had two actual implementations of the system." During the snowstorm on Thursday, January 17, the system was used Lab-wide to announce an early closing. On Friday, January 18, employees were notified via Plectron that there was no outgoing telephone service from the Laboratory. The outage was caused by damage to phone lines off site and was repaired over the following weekend.
