







## The Buy of the Season!

Hurricane Gloria was the start of something big here at Brookhaven — a group buy of 2,000 generators.

Organizing the effort was a committee of four: Tim Drawbridge, DOE; Andrew Feldman, Contracts and Procurement; Ray Lo Presti, Central Shops at the Tandem; and George Sintchak, Instrumentation. They, along with others, volunteered their time for the benefit of everyone on site. For all the evening and weekend hours, no pay involved, mind you, they deserve a rousing cheer.

About 800 people made double purchases, and another 400 bought one apiece. Already, half the generators have been distributed. The second thousand will arrive in January, to be distributed on the 18th and 25th.

Here's how it all happened. After the hurricane, Lo Presti, who arranged a group buy of coal a few years ago, decided to try the same thing with generators. "I made a few calls and found I could get a price break on ten generators. On 20, they said I wouldn't have to pay shipping." While Lo Presti was checking this out, the others were too.

When they discovered each other (Lo Presti placed a Bulletin ad and Feldman posted flyers), they decided to pool their talents: Lo Presti specializes in engines; Sintchak, electrical matters; Feldman, pricing, purchasing and delivery; and Drawbridge, scheduling and management.

Says Drawbridge, "One thing this project did was to bring together a number of people from all parts of the Lab, at all levels, to work together on a common problem." In total, close to 60 people have volunteered to handle tasks like order taking, data entry, programming, bookkeeping and distribution. Among the key volunteers is Bill Kollmer, High Energy Facilities (HEF), who is handling computer scheduling for distribution, and Doug Pope, (HEF), who is researching the muffler, multi-fuel adapter, and gas tank options.

Lo Presti says the project may have been the committee's idea in the first place, but without the many volunteers, it would have remained just an idea. Adds Feldman, "Most people don't realize the amount of work that went into this."

That kind of work and organization has paid off repeatedly. On the final night that people could order a gen-

erator, for example, 842 orders were processed in one hour and 45 minutes. And this past Saturday, 456 generators were distributed at a rate of 120 an hour.

The committee's main goal was to find a generator for less than \$500 and get delivery in reasonable time. After extensive research, what they finally settled on was a Generac 4,000-watt generator, capable of simultaneously running all the necessities such as an oil furnace, water pump and refrigerator. The final price was \$430 including sales tax, about a third of what the unit would sell for retail.

Actually, the particular Generac ordered is not available locally, says Feldman. It's sold in the Midwest as an industrial-grade model, although the manufacturer does sell other models to retailers that put their own names on the units.

With an order of 2,000 generators, the group collected a considerable amount of money, which earned interest. "We discussed for a long time what to do with the interest. One thought was to give everyone a turkey for Thanksgiving," says Drawbridge. "Well, there wasn't enough for that. It finally came down to plugs."

The committee was able to make a good buy. Every generator will be entitled to a free, 240-volt, four-prong,

twist lock plug, which can be used by a qualified electrician to hook up the unit. The plugs will be distributed at the BERA Sales Office in January.

The consensus of the group is that people bought generators because they didn't want to repeat what they went through after Gloria. "People felt like prisoners in their own homes. They were helpless," says Lo Presti. "The generator was a cheap way of getting insurance."

Employees at other organizations, including Grumman, SUNY at Stony Brook and Suffolk County Police, have arranged group buys, too. And the committee hopes that future group buys can be organized to further benefit Lab employees.

If you missed ordering a generator, call Blanche Laskee, Personnel, Ext. 2873, who is maintaining a list of "standbys." A few extra generators were ordered, and they will be sold to people whose names are pulled in a drawing.

One final word: More volunteers are needed to help with the January distribution. If you bought a generator, here's a way you can show your appreciation for all the work the committee has done on your behalf. Call Lo Presti, Ext. 5042.

## Generator Safety

Be sure to read the manufacturer's instruction manual before using your generator. As a start, Herb Schulman, Safety and Environmental Protection, prepared the following list of precautions.

- If you want to connect your generator directly to your house wiring through the electrical panel, a qualified electrician should do the job to make sure it meets National Electric Code requirements.
- Generators are a source of dangerously high voltages. Use care to avoid contact with bare wires, terminals, etc.
- Never handle any kind of electrical equipment while standing in water, on wet or damp ground, or while hands or feet are wet. Dangerous electrical shock will result.
- Maintain electrical wiring and cord sets in good condition. Damaged wiring or cord sets may cause electrical shock or damage to equipment or property.
- Generators driven by internal combustion engines give off carbon monoxide gas through their exhaust systems. If breathed in sufficient concentration, this gas can cause unconsciousness or even death. Operate the equipment only in well-ventilated areas.
- Stop the engine when refueling and check the oil level periodically, according to the manufacturer's recommendations. Do not permit smoking, open flame, or sparks in the vicinity while handling gasoline. Avoid spillage of gasoline on a hot engine. Comply with all rules governing the storage and handling of gasoline, e.g., use of safety containers, storage in well-ventilated areas.
