

## Spotlight on NSLS Research Probing Catalysts

Crude oil, also known as black gold, shines because of catalysts. Oil refiners use catalysts to transform black gold from a thick mineral into refined fuel and lubricants. In speeding reactions, catalysts break chemical bonds and form new ones.

That catalysts work is well known, but how they do their job is not. To understand what happens at the surface of catalysts, a participating research team (PRT) of Exxon and National Synchrotron Light Source (NSLS) scientists are using low energy, soft x-rays to probe the catalysis of carbon bond-breaking reactions in the presence of reactive gases.

Working on the vacuum ultraviolet (VUV) beam line U-1, John Gland, a physical chemist from Exxon's Corporate Science Research Laboratory, heads the catalysis studies. Other PRT members are NSLS Physics Associate Dan Fischer, a solid state physicist; NSLS Assistant Scientist Francisco Zaera, a surface chemist; and Shikong Shen, a catalytic chemist from the Chinese Academy of Sciences, People's Republic of China, who is visiting Exxon and stationed at the NSLS.

The Exxon-NSLS team has for the first time utilized this new probe to examine the steps in a surface chemical reaction occurring under pressure of hydrogen gas, a condition similar to that found in industrial refining.

This experiment could only be performed at the NSLS, as no other syn-


chrotron in the world has the high intensity light that is necessary. Using a monochromator to select the energy of x-ray light they want, the Exxon-NSLS team can look at one specific element, such as carbon, of the molecule they are studying.

Before starting their research, they had to develop a system to transmit enough intense soft x-rays from the VUV ring to do the experiments. Yet this "window" system had to be strong enough to withstand the pressure from the gas inside the reaction chamber.

For this experiment, the U-1 team scanned the soft x-ray energy through 283 electron volts energy, which is known as the carbon edge. This is the energy threshold necessary to excite one of the two electrons closest to the carbon nucleus to a higher, unoccupied level outside the atom. "As much of organic chemistry involves carbon atoms, this is a really important edge for us," explains Gland.

The atom gives off the energy it absorbed in one of two ways. It usually emits what is called an Auger electron, or the atom may fluoresce an x-ray of characteristic energy.

"Though it is a low probability occurrence, fluorescence is key," says Gland. "It is the only way we can detect the absorption of x-rays by carbon in an atmosphere of gas. Auger electrons can't get through the gas to be detected." The U-1 team had to develop a high efficiency, soft x-ray proportional counter to detect the

fluorescent x-rays emitted from the carbon atoms at the surface of a catalyst under study.

"Devices have been built before for the detection of soft x-rays at this energy," says Fischer. "But in making our detector, we had to merge the technology for these devices to the technology of ultra-high vacuum." Not only does this detector have to operate with one torr pressure of hydrogen gas inside the reaction chamber, but it is used under ultra-high vacuum (UHV),  $10^{-10}$  torr, which is one tenth of a trillionth of an atmosphere, as well.


Explains Fischer, "This technological advance allows the experimenter to bridge the gap between traditional UHV surface science and reaction studies at high pressure."

In the presence of one torr of hydrogen gas, the first x-ray absorption fluorescence experiment was per-

formed by the Exxon-NSLS team in June. Looking at the carbon-to-carbon bonds of a molecule called ethylidyne, which was on the surface of a platinum single crystal, they found substantial changes in soft x-ray absorption in the presence of hydrogen gas. This indicates that a surface reaction had occurred.

After another experimental run, the research team will spend a couple of months to determine the bonding and orientation of ethylidyne's carbon and hydrogen atoms during the reaction catalyzed by platinum.

Says Gland, "Ethylidyne is a model — the simplest molecule you can study that has a carbon-carbon bond. After we figure out this model reaction for carbon-carbon bond breaking, we'll go on to work on more complicated molecules." — Marsha Belford

## The Monitoring of Monitors

Hans Geiger would have been proud of BNL's Calibration Group. Whether you have radiation monitoring equipment problems or just need a routine calibration for your instrument, you can count on Calibration. Tucked away in the woods past the new firehouse, Calibration provides quality assurance for portable radiation detectors on site.

Joe Balsamo, head of the Instrumentation, Engineering and Calibration Group of Safety and Environmental Protection (S&EP), notes that there are 650 portable radiation instruments at BNL. Calibration checks these devices for accuracy and services them annually. Some specialized instruments and those which are used extensively are serviced by Calibration more frequently. In addition to checking BNL instruments, Calibration does outside contracting work for the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and other government agencies.

To test the accuracy of portable radiation instruments, Calibration uses known radiation fields with sources having known rates of radioactive emission. These sources emit alpha, beta, gamma or neutron radiation. To insure the quality of the dose measurements, Calibration uses a "transfer standard," a radiation detection device calibrated by the National Bureau of Standards, to establish the

dose rates from BNL sources.

When a dosimeter is tested, a source is pulled up from a basement storage area by negative air pressure into a lucite column in the testing area. The dosimeter sits on a trolley which is

located at a predetermined distance from the source. Taking the distance from the source and the strength of the source into account, Calibration compares that dosimeter's reading with an ideal value. They are able to

monitor the readings on the dosimeter using a remote TV camera.

If the actual readings on the dosimeter differ from the calculated values, Calibration corrects the discrepancy. George Hughes, manager of the facility, and Frank Stepnoski, who conduct the testing, make any necessary repairs on the instruments. All testing procedures are performed in accordance with protocol set by the American National Standards Institute.

Procedures for testing the 56 different types of monitoring instruments currently in use at BNL vary slightly. The Calibration group is designing a program to guide technicians through the tests, calculate deviations from the proper readings and record the results of those tests. This program will facilitate the evaluation of problems in the calibration of a group of instruments.

The Calibration facility also houses equipment for the Department of Energy's Radiological Assistance Program (RAP) which provides emergency response to radiation incidents in the northeast area of the United States. The Calibration group services the equipment and makes sure it is ready for immediate use.

Calibration is also responsible for testing batches of film badges that the Lab uses for radiation detection.

## Patent Awarded

U.S. Patent #4,556,068 was awarded to David Vartsky, a former BNL employee; Lucian Wielopolski, Anthony F. LoMonte and Kenneth J. Ellis, all of Medical; and Stanton Cohn, a former BNL employee, for developing a method to measure lithium in the brain and other organs.

Prescribing lithium salts is a standard treatment for manic depression, but the mechanism of action is not known. Moreover, long term use does have side effects. In view of the importance of clinical lithium use, it is desirable to study its distribution and dynamics *in vivo*.

In this invention, the lithium in the body is irradiated with thermal neutrons to produce tritium atoms. The tritium atoms are transformed in part in the surrounding aqueous solution to form gaseous tritiated hydrogen, which has small solubility in body tissues and liquids and thus appears quickly in the breath. A special counter then measures the amount of tritium, which is related to the amount of lithium present in the irradiation zone.

## Calibration (Cont'd)

They expose the badges to predetermined amounts of radiation to confirm that the badges detect such radiation accurately. All badges can detect beta, neutron and gamma radiation; therefore, to evaluate the performance of the badges, testers must provide exposures for each type of radiation and for mixtures of radiations.

Currently, Calibration is planning a campaign to register all portable radiation detection equipment with their office. "Instruments that were purchased by private individuals, other departments, or brought from other sites and in use at BNL, still need to be tested at Calibration," Balsamo stressed. To insure accuracy and conform to regulations, he asks that those instruments be registered. Employees can call Balsamo at Ext. 7727 for information about radiation instrument or dosimeter testing.

Balsamo also urges that scientists planning to change their instruments or use them in a different radiation field should contact their S&EP representative to assure they have the appropriate equipment.

## Sol Pearlstein Is Honored by BOCES

On July 22, Sol Pearlstein, head of the National Nuclear Data Center, was presented a plaque from Joel Berg, Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES), in appreciation of Pearlstein's support of the BOCES 2 Summer Institute for Gifted and Talented Youth.

Since 1978, on even-numbered years, youngsters enrolled in Berg's summer course on mathematical decision-making have made field trips to the Nuclear Data Center. There, Pearlstein shows them how researchers use computers to make decisions.

In particular, he talks about the 109 elements and the 2300 different isotopes of those elements. "They all have different nuclear properties," says Pearlstein, "and I describe how the computer helps us display this information. To show these properties in graph form, one has to make innumerable individual decisions . . . for example, where to put the legend so that it does not interfere with the dis-

play of data. If, instead, a computer program is written intelligently, then the computer can make a lot of those decisions."

According to Berg, the BOCES program offers the students material they cannot get in their home schools. His math course, for example, shows the students how statistics, logic, probability theory and game theory can help them make decisions throughout their lives.

While Pearlstein has been hosting the math students on even-numbered years, another BNLER, Keith Thompson, has been hosting them on the odd-numbered years. Thompson, a statistician in the Biology Department, was given a plaque last year. Actually, Pearlstein was to receive his plaque last year, too, but was out of town the day of the ceremony.

Both Pearlstein and Thompson have had children enrolled in the summer program and have volunteered their time because of that involvement.

## The Sale of the Century

In its first incarnation as Camp Upton, from 1917 to 1920, the BNL site was a bustling World War I training camp. Hundreds of buildings had been built and equipped to accommodate the 40,000 soldiers that typically populated the camp at any one time. When the war was over, the soldiers went home, but the buildings and equipment remained — for a while.

On August 15, 1921, thousands of prospective purchasers, toting half-inch-thick catalogues, flocked to Camp Upton for a Public Auction Sale. Held by order of the Secretary of War, the auction featured "1660 buildings, utilities and improvements" and would continue daily until they were all sold.

The buildings for sale included any number of barracks, mess halls, garages, shacks, tool sheds, dormitories and office buildings, as well as a few post offices, post exchanges, infirmaries, guard houses, administration buildings, laundries and headquarters. Apparently, most of these were expected to be sold for any remaining value they might have as lumber, windows, door, etc., as this item indicates:

- Base Hospital, Officers' Quarters — 150x200 ft., three wings, 167 windows, 66 doors, about 130,000 ft. lumber.

A few structures were somewhat unique:

- Stable, 30x40 ft.
- Five wood latrines, each 6x6 ft.
- Shoe repair shop.
- Typewriter repair shop.
- Smith shop.
- Two grain elevators, 42 ft. diameter.
- Chicken house.
- Theatre, 120x179 ft.
- Band stand.
- Powder magazine.
- Ice Cream shack, 12x30 ft.
