

BNL Team At Checkpoint Kennedy

In the aftermath of the nuclear accident at Chernobyl, Brookhaven was asked first by New York Senator Alfonse D'Amato and, later, by Congressmen Benjamin Gilman and Hamilton Fish Jr., to test Long Island and other New York State students arriving from the U.S.S.R. at Kennedy airport.

The Brookhaven RAP team promptly responded. RAP stands for Radiological Assistance Program, a program which was established by the Atomic Energy Commission in 1958 to provide advice and assistance in dealing with radiological emergencies. The program is now under the jurisdiction of the Department of Energy. The RAP team from Brookhaven serves the northeast and is composed largely of health physicists from the Safety & Environmental Protection Division.

Airport Screenings

On May 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6, the RAP team went to Kennedy airport to assess the amount of radioactivity on the person or belongings of about 150 people returning from the Soviet Union. This nuclear power plant accident emitted radioactive iodine, among other fission products.

Since the thyroid gland concentrates iodine more than any other part of the body, a measure of radioiodine present in the thyroid glands of the travelers from Russia, was judged to be a good indication of exposure to the Chernobyl plume. The RAP team used a sensitive sodium iodide crystal of the type used for thyroid function tests in medicine. About one-third tested positive but, according to team members Alan Kuehner and Steve Musolino, the radiation levels were medically inconsequential.

A pancake geiger counter measured the presence or absence of residual contamination on clothing, shoes or exposed skin. Again, that survey showed no cause for alarm, although all passengers arriving from Eastern European countries were advised to thoroughly wash their clothes, clean their suitcases and scrub the bottoms of their shoes.

As further reassurance for the returning passengers, the RAP team offered to do a whole-body count for them at the Lab. This determines how much radioactivity is inside the body. To date, about 25 people have accepted the offer and the results do not differ from the airport screenings.

BNL Team

At the airport, Charles Meinhold, head of the Safety & Environmental Protection Division acted as spokesman. The New York State Department of Health was asked to participate in these surveys. As Musolino explained "we do the assessment and they

determine the acceptable level of health risks."

RAP Responses

This is not the first time BNL has been called upon to use its expertise in radiation assessment to assist the Federal government.

For example, for over 30 years, a team from the Medical Department has monitored the health of residents of the Marshall Islands who were exposed to radioactive fallout from nuclear tests conducted in the Pacific in the 1950's. Since 1974, BNL has also sent health physicists to the islands to evaluate the radiation doses to the exposed people.

In March 1979, the RAP team was alerted to the serious incident at the Three-Mile Island nuclear power plant near Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. In direct response, BNL sent teams of S&EP health physicists and tons of lead shielding to the area. In addition, both in 1979 and again last week the Public Relations office handled hundreds of inquiries from the media and the public, dealing with every aspect of nuclear energy.

On Site

Bell Avenue, from Columbia Street to Center Street, will be closed for about three weeks, beginning on Monday or Tuesday of next week. The closing is necessary while a steam main is run across the street, one step in a major construction project to expand and improve the BNL heat distribution system.

Forsyth Heads New Department

As announced by Director Nicholas Samios last week, a companion to the AGS Department has been created. It is called the Accelerator Development Department (ADD) and is chaired by Eric Forsyth.


"Briefly," says Forsyth, "this department will play an important role in the Superconducting Super Collider and, nearer home, we will construct the Booster for the AGS. Just as important, we plan to do the early research and development, in collaboration with the interdepartmental Task Force, on the proposed Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC), which we hope will occupy the old CBA tunnel one day."

The new department has been organized into the Magnet Division, under Erich Willen; the Accelerator Physics Division, now led by Ernest Courant; the Engineering Division, headed by Jack Sondericker and the Booster Project, with Forsyth as project manager.

The Magnet Division will use its expertise in making magnets for the SSC, the Booster and later for RHIC. Accelerator Physics will be the theory group for these machines, and the Engineering Division will handle architectural engineering, cryogenics and management systems.

The Collider Center (Bldg. 1005S) is headquarters for the new department; magnets will remain in 902 and the other buildings currently in use; and some of the Booster work will be done in Bldg. 911.

Since 1972 Forsyth has headed the Superconducting Power Transmission Project. The room-temperature cable developed by this project was transferred to industry and will be manufactured by Cablec, a high-voltage cable company in Yonkers, New York. The on-site test facility will be maintained by ADD as part of the collaboration with Cablec on the development of fully synthetic plastic insulation for conventional power cables.



Eric Forsyth

Forsyth is an electrical engineer who was educated at Manchester University, England, and at the University of Toronto, Canada. He joined the staff of the then Accelerator Department in 1960. In 1965 he was appointed chief electrical engineer of the AGS Division and deputy division head in 1967. In 1969 he started work on superconducting devices and devoted much of his time to that field until he moved over to High Energy Facilities as head of the Technical Projects Branch a year ago.

Inside Info

Russell N. Dietz, chemical engineer, Department of Applied Science, has received a 1986 Federal Laboratory Consortium Special Award for Excellence in Technology Transfer. Dietz was cited for his leadership and initiative in developing and commercializing an air infiltration measurement system, dubbed AIMS, that will result in more comfortable homes and energy efficient buildings.

The AIMS system uses tiny sources and monitors placed around a house. The sources release inert gases at a known rate, and the monitors measure their concentrations, which are a function of the air infiltration rate into the building. The system is being marketed by the National Association of Homebuilders Research Foundation.

The Laboratory Consortium award program is open to scientists from 328 Federal laboratories representing 85 percent of the Federal R&D budget. The Consortium was established in 1974 as a national network of technology transfer representatives from all the federal agencies.

Ronald E. Odrovic, senior contracts specialist, Contracts and Procurement Division, has been designated a Certified Professional Contracts Manager by the National Contract Management Association. The program recognizes individuals who have accomplished a high level of education, experience and training in the procurement and contracting profession. To be certified, the candidate must pass a six-hour examination.

Four weeks are spent in the classroom, where Tyler is seen with the latest class of recruits. The most important classroom lessons are those concerning the limited arrest authority patrol officers have and the use of deadly force. Under the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, BNL patrol officers are authorized to make arrests for nine felonies and 14 misdemeanors, including theft of government property and nuclear material, trespassing and sabotage. For other violations, they are responsible for stopping the crimes and have the authority to apprehend criminals. The recruits are taught to use deadly force only as a last resort to prevent their own or another person's death or serious injury, to prevent the theft or sabotage of nuclear materials and the escape of anyone committing such crimes.




By the end of the second week the mice are separated from the men and women: To continue training, all recruits must qualify in the day and night use of the 38-caliber Smith & Wesson revolver, the Remington 870 12-gauge shotgun and the Heckler & Koch MP5 9mm submachine gun, in semi- and automatic modes. Pictured at the range with the MP5 are (standing, from left) Recruits James Devito and Ernest White, Tyler, Recruits Peter Mendlesohn, (kneeling, from left) Leonard Butera and Carlos Victoria. The recruits practice "dry" and shoot 5,000 rounds of live ammunition at distances of three to 25 yards from a silhouette target of a human torso (combat distance is usually three to seven yards). Not only must they shoot straight, but they are timed as they stand, kneel and crouch, and "speed load" and continue firing. While they hold the submachine gun and the shotgun at the shoulder, they must be able to fire the revolver using either hand or both. Armed with a whistle and stopwatch, Tyler, a DOE-certified firearms instructor, doesn't take any "alibis" for ceasing fire from recruits — except if a weapon malfunctions.



After classroom training, recruits are assigned to rotating shifts, patrols and patrol officers for 80 hours of on-the-job training. "OJT" includes learning the proper procedures for such mundane tasks as guarding the main gate, for such emergencies as assisting during Fire Department calls and for such extraordinary tasks as searching for "bugs" and explosives. In the picture, Patrol Officer Reinaldo Santiago demonstrates main gate procedures to Recruits Butera and DeVito.



What do patrol officers do if they are unarmed and encounter the "criminal element?" According to John Hunt, unarmed combat instructor and head of the Technical Security Planning & Audit Section, if there is no doubt in their "military minds" that they are in imminent danger, they are to reach deep down inside of themselves for the strength and power they have in reserve and EXPLODE. To learn how to explode with inner strength and power, recruits don sweat suits for a ten-hour course in judo, karate, boxing and good ol' street fighting. This includes what to do when a gun is held to your head or a knife is held to your chest (you distract your assailant with a fake of the head, get the weapon away from your person, break their fingers and get a hold of the weapon yourself — easier said than done). The recruits practice their parries, thrusts and falls, and pair up to throw (for real), and beat and strangle (simulated) each other, taking turns as the bad guy. Recruit Devito is shown tossing Recruit Mendlesohn. All this is done with the primal cry "kia."



New patrol officers are reminded by Police Chief Harold Justice that they have a difficult job because they do not deal with criminals in their daily routine, but they must be ready because of the ever-present threat of terrorism. Readiness is maintained through more training, at the Lab and at DOE's Central Training Academy in Albuquerque, New Mexico. So, after being issued a shield and being given a diploma and a handshake, a new patrol officer cannot sit back and just twirl his nightstick. He must go on to become a DOE-certified security inspector, whose job it is to secure the High Flux Beam Reactor (HFBR). At the HFBR, Training Specialist Kathy Walker is shown briefing Recruits DeVito and Butera on the use of security equipment, such as the metal detector (foreground) and x-ray machine (at left). As members of the BNL Police Department, patrol officers and security inspectors must pass an annual round of physical, fitness and weapons testing.
