




Alternating Gradient Synchrotron





BNL's Fabulous Forty

As this is the last Bulletin issue during BNL's fortieth anniversary year, this is the final article in the year-long series "BNL's Fabulous Forty."

A memorandum to all employees from the Personnel Division, dated December 5, 1947, read:

A number of employees have suggested the formation of an Employee's Recreation Association. We are heartily in favor of such a move. Indeed, it is hoped that an association, if formed, will eventually take full responsibility for all employee recreation activities, using the facilities of the Welfare and Recreation Section . . .

That association was formed in March 1948 and was called the Brookhaven Employee Recreation Association (BERA). Its first constitution was adopted that June. The first BERA board of trustees was elected in December 1949, and, in fact, Department of Applied Science Chairman Bernard Manowitz, who is celebrating his fortieth service anniversary at the Lab this year, served as the secretary of the original board.

Twenty years after BERA was born, Blanche Laskee transferred from the Reactor Division to Personnel's Recreation Office, which manages BERA facilities and facilitates BERA activities. At the end of this year, Laskee will retire as Recreation Supervisor.

In this position, Laskee has acted as a liaison between the BERA board, which promotes and regulates organized clubs and their activities, and Personnel, which has the overall responsibility for the recreation program. Since November 1, she has been sharing her office and on-the-job experience with M. Kay Hunt, the newly appointed Recreation Supervisor.

bered 26. Now, 20 years later, there are 43 activities. Observes Laskee, "What is new or popular in today's society — such as body building and computers — is new or popular at the Lab, and so is that activity."

Activities have waxed and waned with the times. For instance, on August 5, 1948, more than 700 employees and their guests attended the first annual, mid-summer dance sponsored by BERA. Seasonal dances were held in the gym, despite the sign stating "No Street Shoes Allowed," until 1972, when the gym floor was replaced. Instead, "The new social and cultural clubs now hold smaller dances in the Recreation Building, Brookhaven Center or Berkner Hall," observes Laskee.

While the Concert Group has been inviting top classical artists to perform at the Lab since 1949, Laskee remembers when the top popular music soloists and groups of the day played Brookhaven at the invitation of the Special Events Committee. "We had all big names here — Pearl Bailey, Louis Armstrong, Count Basie, the Baja Marimba Band, Al Hirt, Lionel Hampton, Duke Ellington. Nowadays, we couldn't possibly afford such performers."

In addition to witnessing an expansion in the type and number of clubs, Laskee has overseen the growth and improvements to recreation facilities and program hours. For example, the number of ball fields was increased from four to six, as softball became the most popular BERA sport; the swimming pool and gym are now open weekends and longer hours; and the Parcourse fitness trail opened September 1984.

As Laskee concludes, "Being associated with the recreation program has, by no means, been all fun and games: There was a lot of hard work involved — with many problems and frustrations. However, I loved every minute of it."

"Working behind the Recreation desk is quite different from working behind the front desk of Personnel, and it is a challenge I welcome," says M. Kay Hunt, who came to BNL's Applied Mathematics Department in 1968, moved to Personnel in 1969 and became the mainstay of the reception area in 1970. "In one way, however, it is the same: I will continue to work with people. As I'm a people-person, that is something I enjoy."

Hunt has also enjoyed BERA activities: She has participated in softball, bowling, volleyball and the Afro-American Culture Club. She served on the BERA board from 1973-76, and twice on the BERA nominating committee, 1972 and 1985. "So you could say that I'm more than familiar with how BERA operates," she says.

At the beginning of the year, Hunt will take charge of the day-to-day

operation of the swimming pool, gymnasium, recreation building in the apartment area, Recreation Park, the six tennis courts, the Parcourse fitness trail, the Astronomy Observatory and the BERA Sales Office in Berkner Hall.

Recreation Representative Guy Mastrion and Recreation Assistant Richard Parsons will report to Hunt, as they coordinate after-work recreation activities and supervise the lifeguards and the facilities attendants.

What Hunt has already begun and hopes to continue is a working relationship with the Long Island Industrial Recreation Association (LIIRA), an organization of over 150 corporations and businesses interested

in athletic fitness, social activity and cultural exchange. "By being an active LIIRA member, I hope to get new ideas, new input and new contacts for Brookhaven's recreation program," explains Hunt.

All BNL employees and their immediate family members are BERA members, as are the employees of Associated Universities Inc. (AUI), BNL and AUI guests and visitors, non-BNL employees working on site and the immediate families of all these groups. Adds Hunt, "I can now officially invite all interested BERA members to participate in BERA activities: Get involved — keep BERA growing."

"When I came to work in Recreation, the recreation supervisor and I had our offices in the gymnasium where the exercise rooms are now located," recalls Laskee. "We also had a small, adjoining store, where we sold such things as tennis balls, shuttles and athletic clothing."

In 1972, the location of the Recreation Office was moved to Personnel, Bldg. 185, and, at that time, the old gymnasium offices were remodeled into the exercise rooms. "For the next two years, I did double duty," explains Laskee, "working in Personnel Services and for Recreation." She was named Recreation Supervisor in 1974.

During her twenty-year association with BERA, Laskee has witnessed many changes in the recreation program.

In 1948, BERA began with eight recreational and social activities: a bridge club, camera club, choral group, dance and party committee, film society, rental library, tennis club and theater group. Only four continue today: the camera club, choral group, tennis club and theater group.

When Laskee joined the Recreation Office, BERA clubs and leagues num-

Last Sale Day at Science Shop



Poinsettia Care

The poinsettia has long been a popular Christmas gift and a symbol of yuletide. The Cooperative Extension Association of Suffolk County offers the following advice for caring for poinsettias:

- Place in a bright sunny window, but avoid areas with drafts or sudden fluctuations in temperature. The poinsettia's flower bracts last longest when daytime temperatures are from 60 to 70° F, and there is a 5 to 10 degree drop in temperature at night.
- Do not allow the leaves to touch cold windowpanes.
- When the top layer of soil feels dry to the touch, water the poinsettia until water runs through the drainage holes in the bottom of the container into a saucer. Wait 15 minutes, then discard the excess water.
- Fertilize the poinsettia regularly with a water soluble, chemical houseplant fertilizer following label directions.
