

## DNI Lecture: Accounting for Nuclear Materials

Since the initial signing in 1968, more than 135 nations have become party to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons. Except for the United Kingdom, United States and Soviet Union, which already possess them, the countries that have ratified the treaty have therein agreed not to develop or acquire nuclear weapons.

The treaty also mandates that those nations that do not have nuclear weapons must accept International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) safeguards inspections, to verify that no nuclear materials intended for peaceful purposes have been diverted for possible weapons use.

How can these inspections make the most efficient use of the IAEA's limited manpower? This is a question that Leslie Fishbone has been grappling with as a scientist in the Technical Support Organization (TSO) of the Department of Nuclear Energy (DNE).

Fishbone will share some of his conclusions in the 245th Brookhaven Lecture, which starts the 1988-89 series season on Wednesday, September 28. His talk on "International Safeguards — Accounting for Nuclear Materials" will begin at 4:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall. William Higinbotham, DNE, will introduce the lecturer.

As background, Fishbone will talk about the Non-Proliferation Treaty and what measures the IAEA employs to verify nuclear materials. These measures are known as safeguards, which are applied to the peaceful nuclear power industry to provide

assurance that uranium and plutonium, used or created in the fuel cycle, are not diverted for use in nuclear weapons.

In the nuclear fuel cycle, raw materials are fabricated into fuel elements. In a typical cycle, uranium is taken from the mine, chemically converted, enriched in the isotope uranium-235, converted once again and incorpor-

ated into fuel elements for power reactors. In certain foreign countries, the fuel is reprocessed after being irradiated in the reactors, to recover produced plutonium for further use.

In 1987, as in previous years, the IAEA found no indication of a diversion of safeguarded nuclear material: Though minor anomalies were uncovered, all were satisfactorily resolved.

Fishbone will discuss the safeguards employed at an irradiated-fuel reprocessing plant, as an example. In part, the inspectors are like accountants, verifying that the books are in balance — that the amount of fuel that came into a plant equals the amount that left, though it may be in another form. To complement their book audits, the inspectors perform actual measurements, take samples and service surveillance equipment.

As Fishbone will relate, making the

inspections more efficient is an important goal, as treaty nations build more facilities for supplying fuel for nuclear power plants. This has led the Agency to foster the study of advanced safeguards approaches: Thus it has called upon TSO — and Fishbone and his colleagues — as one part of a worldwide research and development effort to enhance IAEA safeguards.

One approach, which Fishbone will describe, is the zone approach, wherein safeguards are carried out for a whole group, or zone, of facilities, rather than individual facilities. There would then be no need to verify materials transfers between facilities within the zone, which would reduce the manpower and equipment required.

Les Fishbone received his B.S. in physics from the California Institute of Technology in 1968, and his Ph.D. in physics from the University of Maryland in 1972. The next year, he spent seven months in the Soviet Union as part of the scientific exchange program run by the U.S.S.R. Academy of Sciences and the U.S. National Academy of Sciences.

In 1974, Fishbone joined the University of Utah as a research associate and associate instructor in physics. In 1976, while still at Utah, he began working on energy problems with the governor's science advisor.

Fishbone came to BNL in 1977 to join the staff of the National Center for Analysis of Energy Systems in the Department of Energy & Environment, now the Department of Applied Science. He moved to TSO in DNE in 1980.

A Brookhaven Lecture Committee member since January 1985 and secretary since 1986, Fishbone became chairman of the Committee this month. He is also a member of the American Physical Society and the Institute of Nuclear Materials Management.
