


Celebrate a Fire-Safe Holiday

For a safe, enjoyable holiday, follow these tips for fire safety from the National Fire Protection Association:

Look out for the children — Keep them away from matches, lighters, candles, fireplaces and space heaters.

Buy safe toys — Don't buy toys that burn easily or use flammable liquids; check that electrical toys are labeled for fire safety.

Install smoke detectors — Put them on every floor, check alarms weekly and change batteries yearly.



Choose a fresh tree — Pick one without shedding needles, cut one inch from the trunk, put in a sturdy stand away from exits and heat sources, and keep it well watered. Check man-made trees for fire-retardant labels.

Check out lights — Before you buy, look for the fire safety label; replace sets that are worn or have loose connections; outside, use specially insulated lights; inside, don't overload outlets and place lights carefully — never on a metal tree; unplug everything before going to bed or leaving the house.

Take care with candles — Don't put them on the tree or window sill or within children's reach, and don't leave them lit when you're gone.

Make your fireplace fire safe — Yearly, have it cleaned professionally; use only materials designed for it — not paper; dispose of ashes in metal containers and never store them in the house; use a fire screen; consider installing a spark arrester atop the chimney.



Give space heaters space — Place at least three feet from combustible surfaces and away from children, curtains or furniture. Use only kerosene fuel in a kerosene heater — never gasoline or diesel fuel.

Party safely — Use flame-retardant, noncombustible costumes and decorations; provide smokers with deep ashtrays and check for smoldering cigarette butts, especially in upholstered furniture, before you go to bed.

On the Cover . . .

The lovely pine cone wreath that graces the Bulletin's holiday cover was made by Judy Otto and Irma Reilly, who both work in the Illustration Group of the Photography & Graphic Arts Division.

About five feet in diameter and weighing around 25 pounds, the wreath is made up of over 2,000 pine cones and took some two weeks to assemble. As it did last year, the wreath hangs on a wall in Graphic Arts, Bldg. 197, where it can be seen in all its splendor.

Completed last December, the giant wreath was the culmination of a collaboration that had begun months before, when Otto asked Reilly "to show me how to do it — instead of just sitting around at lunchtime." They started out making small wreaths, and, said Otto, "They got bigger and bigger."

Of course, they could not make wreaths until they had collected enough pine cones — most of which they gathered during lunchtime forays around the Lab site. "We can tell you where on site to find almost any of the pine cones we used," said Reilly. For example, the eastern white pine cones came from the woods across from the firehouse, while the cones from the noble fir trees came from the edge of the field on the southeast corner of Upton Road and Brookhaven Avenue.

They also found other types of pine cones — Scotch pine, scrub pine and many more — and incorporated them into their interesting final design. "We had a general idea of the design," said Reilly, "and once we started, it all came together. And I think our artistic backgrounds were an asset."

Though this wreath is the largest one they've made, Otto and Reilly still enjoy making the decorations on a smaller scale — mostly to give to friends. So you're still likely to see them out there during lunchtime, scouring the Lab's forests for the perfect pine cone.

Dental Plan Enrollment Opens

From today through January 27, 1989, regular employees working 20 or more hours per week may enroll in the AUI Dental Assistance Plan. Coverage will become effective February 1, 1989.

Employees currently enrolled in the dental plan will have their coverage automatically continued unless they complete a termination form. Employees wishing to enroll must complete application and payroll deduction forms. All forms are available from Personnel Services, Bldg. 185, and completed forms must be returned there by January 27, 1989.

Effective with the new enrollment period, the schedule of payments for preventive and diagnostic treatment, and for basic and restorative dental services will be increased by an average of approximately 25 percent. Required employee premiums will also be increased by a corresponding percentage.



The AUI Dental Assistance Plan pays a maximum of \$1,000 benefits per calendar year for each individual for non-orthodontic dental expenses. The plan covers three categories of dental service:

• **Prevention & Diagnosis** — For services including routine exams, cleaning and scaling, and x-rays, the plan covers expenses from the first

dollar spent to a maximum stated in a payment schedule.

• **Basic & Major Dentistry** — After an individual pays the first \$25 of covered expenses during the calendar year, restorative, endodontic, periodontic and prosthodontic dental work, and oral surgery are reimbursed according to a schedule of allowance. The maximum deductible for any family is \$75 per year.

• **Children's Orthodontia** — Fifty percent of reasonable and customary charges for orthodontic services for dependent children are paid, up to a lifetime maximum of \$1,000 per child.

To continue this benefit while controlling increasing health care costs, the Lab is offering the dental plan as an employee option with the following required employee contributions:

Coverage	Weekly	Monthly
Employee only	\$1.15	\$ 5.00
Employee & one dependent	2.31	10.00
Employee & two or more dependents	4.38	19.00

In addition, employees who elect the Dental Assistance Plan and who are insured under the AUI Medical Insurance Plan will have their major medical deductible increased to \$200 per year or \$500 per family, while those enrolled in an HMO Plan will be required to pay the difference between the current AUI Medical Insurance Plan and the plan with a \$200 deductible.

Employees who sign up for the Dental Assistance Plan will be required to participate until the next enrollment period, January 1991. Present eligible employees not electing coverage at this time must wait until this period to be able to participate.
