

## DOE Committee Pleased With Booster Progress

"We've been told we have both substance and form," said Bill Weng, project manager of the Accumulator-Booster Project, after the successful semi-annual Booster review by a Department of Energy Review Committee (DRC) from April 12 to 14. Weng, a Physicist in the Accelerator Development Department (ADD), was reporting on the DRC's approval of work accomplished in the last six months in technical design, construction, cost, scheduling and management.

Projected for completion in 1991, the Accumulator-Booster will be a small accelerator through which particles receive the intermediate phase of acceleration before entering the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS). It will increase the intensity of protons and polarized protons for high energy physics experiments and allow the AGS to accelerate the whole range of heavy ions generated in the Tandem Van de Graaff accelerator.

Among the technical milestones that especially interested the reviewers was the prototype half-cell set up by a team working with Rudolph Damm, Senior Project Engineer, ADD. A complex of dipole, quadrupole and sextupole magnets mounted on a

common base was placed in a mock tunnel to test the effect of space restrictions, alignment of components, installation of the beam tube and performance of vacuum and electrical equipment.

Also receiving positive attention was the Booster Accounting and Reporting System (BARS), established for the review by a team working with Jesse Becker, Department Administrative Manager, ADD.

BARS is an automated system that shows project estimates and costs down to the lowest level of the work breakdown structure. At each level, the original baseline estimate and any variance from the current working estimate are presented in the same format. This uniformity, along with the graphics that summarize tables of information, make the work breakdowns, procurement plans, milestone schedules and project status easy to assimilate.

The DRC further commented that the Booster project has good and competent people on the team, Weng said, and that BNL's success in building the Booster would certainly have a positive impact on the Lab's Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider proposal.

## Summer Science for H.S. Students

High school students who are entering or have recently completed their senior year are the focus of a new Community Summer Science Program to be offered this summer at BNL.

As explained by Karl Swyler in the Office of Educational Programs (OEP), the program will consist of two parts: an open lecture series by Laboratory scientists in the mornings and a limited number of student internships in the afternoons.

The morning lectures, which will be held every weekday from the beginning of July to mid-August, will cover current topics in such areas as physics, astronomy, chemistry, biology, medicine and applied science. They will be open to all 1988 Suffolk County high school graduates, entering seniors

and science teachers, as logistics permit.

After participating in the morning lectures, student interns will spend the afternoons in a research environment provided by their sponsoring BNL scientist. Interns, who must be at least 18 years old to begin their appointment, will be offered limited financial support.

Students must apply for both programs. The application deadline has been extended to May 20, and forms are available through area high schools or from the OEP, Ext. 4503. Post-deadline applications will be considered if openings remain. Science teachers should register for the lectures with OEP.

## MIS Assumes PC Training Role

Personal computer (PC) training courses, which have been offered to employees on site by the Personnel Division, will become the responsibility of Management Information Systems (MIS) Division's Information Services and Support Group (ISS), as of May 1.

Under the direction of Robert Kaszuba, MIS Assistant Manager, ISS will now offer the introduction to the IBM PC and DOS courses. They will also continue to offer introductory courses on major software programs such as dBASE III Plus, Lotus 1-2-3, RBase System V and WordPerfect.

Previous requests for training do not need to be resubmitted, as MIS will begin scheduling based on all existing requests. Those who would like to submit new requests should contact their department administrator or Kaszuba, Ext. 7785, who will also discuss scheduling and suggestions for additional training.

The comprehensive PC training by ISS will enable attendees to explore

and utilize the advantages of personal computing through core courses. They will go into micro-based applications such as PC operating systems (DOS, OS/2) connecting PCs to mainframe computers, spreadsheets, word processing and data base management software.

Currently, the principal instructors are Michael O'Reilly, ISS, and Kurt Fuchel, Applied Mathematics Department. Outside trainers may also be used.

O'Reilly will also conduct application workshops to help users develop their own systems utilizing the techniques presented in the core courses.

The training program's main objectives are to encourage the use of personal computers and to support the end-user computing community. There will also be an emphasis on making it easier to use the information contained within the ad-hoc and inquiry data bases that reside on System A, the user computer at MIS.

## The Alchemy of Garnets

When one thinks of garnets, the study of magnetic interactions usually does not come to mind unless one is thinking about yttrium iron garnet crystals.

Yttrium iron garnet is perhaps the best model material for the study of magnetic interactions. By substituting various ions for those in the garnet structure, one can tailor the stone's physical properties over a very wide range, creating new and intriguing materials.

These effects will be discussed by Martha Pardavi-Horvath on May 5 at 1:30 p.m., in the Physics Department's small seminar room, Bldg. 510. Her talk on "The Alchemy of Garnets: Magnetic and Electrical Properties of Substituted Yttrium Iron Garnets" will be sponsored by Brookhaven Women in Science, and all are welcome to attend.

Pardavi-Horvath, a Postdoctoral Research Associate at Ohio State University's Magnetic Resonance Laboratory since 1985, conducts research on magnetic, optical and electrical properties of uncompensated magnetic garnets.

Born in Budapest, Hungary, Pardavi-Horvath received her master's degree in low temperature physics from Moscow State University in 1967.

That same year, she joined the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, where, in 1970, she became head of the Research Group of Crystal Technology and Characterization and, in 1985, she earned her Ph.D.

Dr. Pardavi-Horvath is the author of about 100 scientific papers and two books on magnetism. A member of the Roland Eotvos Physical Society of Hungary and the European Physical Society, she was awarded the Janossy Prize of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences in 1981.


After 41 years of service that began on April 2, 1947, when he became the second photographer hired by the Laboratory, Robert Walton will retire from the Lab at the end of April. Since May 1969, Walton has served as Photography Supervisor; with his retirement, Mort Rosen assumes responsibility for the Photography Section of the Photography & Graphic Arts Division, which includes the section's photographers, dark room technicians, office staff — and about 500,000 negatives.





How many of those negatives are Walton's is anybody's guess, including his. Regardless of the total, a good number of Walton's negatives are firsts: The first photographs taken of many aspects of the Laboratory newly created 41 years ago. "Some of these negatives are so old that they are losing their silver," reports Walton.

In October 1947, Walton shot the first aerial photograph taken of Brookhaven National Laboratory — which looks more like yesterday's Camp Upton than the BNL of today. Walton took this picture hanging out of the airplane, the wing of which can be seen in the foreground, right.



From a picture of the old cafeteria that Walton took in November 1947, the luncheon menu can be read with the aid of a magnifying glass: Manhattan clam chowder 15¢, broiled mackerel 65¢, chicken pot pie 65¢, tuna fish croquette 60¢ and creamed chipped beef on toast 60¢. Cold plates cost 55¢ each for ham, roast beef or tuna fish, 45¢ for egg and 40¢ for cottage cheese. The old cafeteria, replaced by Berkner Hall on September 9, 1968, sat on the northeast corner of the intersection of Brookhaven Avenue and Columbia Street.



No, this is not a picture of an Antique & Classic Motoring Club rally: Though today each of these autos would be classics and some would be antiques, they were merely being driven to work through the main gate at BNL when Walton snapped this shot one July morning in 1947.

### Safety Alert: Beware of Rumors

Back in 1983, the Bulletin reported a scary, false rumor in circulation at the time. Now Herb Schulman of the Safety & Environmental Protection Division advises that the same rumor is making the rounds again — and it's still totally untrue.

In the rumor's most recent version, an electrical worker from Duquesne Electric and a welder from United Parcel Service are said to have been exposed to an electric arc while wearing contact lenses, in two separate incidents. Supposedly, the arc generated microwaves that instantly dried the fluid between the eye and the lens, causing the cornea to bond to the lens. The rumor reports that, on returning home from work, the electrical worker and the welder removed their contact lenses along with the fused corneas, thereby causing permanent blindness.

These injuries cannot happen, said Harold Davis, secretary of the American Optometric Association's Contact Lens Section, in an article in *Occupational Health Nursing*.

"Most contacts are concave, so if anything, they diverge light. As far as melting the lens or drying up the fluid in the eyes, you'd have to stick your head in a blast furnace to do that," he said.

Davis also said that, even in the unlikely event that the contacts were dried to the eyes, the corneas would not be damaged because the eyes are covered by protective epithelial layers. Even if these cells were scraped off, they would regenerate within 72 hours.

According to the June 1983 issue of *Optometric Management* the rumor apparently originated in 1967, when a Baltimore shipyard worker suffered minor eye injuries after an electrical device exploded. He quickly recovered, a fact apparently overlooked.
