


## Transformer on the Right Track

Twenty-three days and too many railroad miles later, here it is — a 27,000,000-volt-ampere transformer — the device that will be dedicated to transferring the electrical power supplied by the Long Island Lighting Company (LILCO) to the power supplies of BNL's Booster ring, now under construction. In the process, this seventh BNL transformer will convert the LILCO power from 69,000 volts to 13,000 volts, as required by the Booster's power supply system.



The 60-ton General Electric device began its journey from Rome, Georgia, on November 23 via the Southern Railroad — and its travels became the travail of Andrew Feldman, Contracts & Procurement Division, the procurement supervisor who made the purchase. After spending ten days in Enola, Pennsylvania, the transformer was taken over by CONRAIL and took a week to arrive in Newark, New Jersey. Sent on to Selkirk, in upstate New York, the transformer was held up again before being transferred to the Bronx and from MetroNorth to the Long Island Railroad (LIRR). Before the transformer could be delivered to BNL, however, the LIRR had first to remove, temporarily, the 60 passenger cars it was storing on the Lab's rail spur.

Feldman and Tower Lineman Bernard Brehm, PE, greeted the transformer's arrival on December 15 — at 2:30 a.m.

## Setlow Wins Fermi Award

Richard Setlow, BNL's Associate Director for Life Sciences, is one of two recipients of the Department of Energy's (DOE) 1988 Enrico Fermi Award. The awarding of DOE's highest scientific honor to Setlow and to physicist Victor Weisskopf of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, was announced by Secretary of Energy John Herrington on December 23.

A biophysicist and former Chairman of BNL's Biology Department, Setlow is being honored for his contributions to the fields of radiation biophysics and molecular biology. He will receive the award, which includes a Presidential citation, a gold medal and a \$100,000 honorarium for each recipient, at a special ceremony in Washington, D.C.

Setlow's career and the science for which he is being honored will be detailed in a story in next week's Brookhaven Bulletin.

## Town Meeting On Future Physics


A town meeting on "Future Directions in High Energy Physics" will be held on Thursday, January 5, to help provide input to a recently formed High Energy Physics Advisory Panel (HEPAP) subpanel.

This HEPAP subpanel is studying the future directions high energy physics can take both before the proposed Superconducting Super Collider (SSC) comes on line and while the SSC is operating. Town meetings such as this one are one way in which the subpanel is seeking input from the high energy physics community on these issues.

The town meeting at BNL will be held in the large seminar room in Physics, Bldg. 510, from 10 a.m. to noon, or longer, if necessary. To open the meeting, Stanley Wojcicki will discuss the charge of the subpanel he chairs; then, members of the Lab's Directorate will discuss BNL's plans for the future.

An open meeting will follow, devoted to comments and presentations by BNL staff and users of the Lab's facilities, all of whom are encouraged to attend, express their views and participate in the discussion. 
