Cold Fusion Is Hot Topic

Have university scientists actually achieved "cold" nuclear fusion in a simple electrolytic cell? When the Bulletin went to press, data from two BNL experiments begun last week were still inconclusive — they neither confirm nor disprove earlier claims of this achievement.

These claims, first made by scientists from the University of Utah and the University of Southampton in England and later by another team of researchers from Brigham Young University in Utah, have generated world-wide debate, coupled with intense news media interest.

If the findings are correct, they open the way to a revolutionary, if disarmingly simple, method of nuclear fusion at room temperature. This is in contrast to the extremely high temperatures normally associated with fusion research.

Hence, researchers at a number of institutions, including Brookhaven, have plunged into experiments of their own, trying to duplicate what was reported on earlier.

One of the BNL experiments begun last week is being done by Stephen Feldberg and James Reilly, both in the Department of Applied Science (DAS). The other involves Hugh Isaacs, Harold Wiesmann and Alison Davenport, all in DAS, and Kelvin Lynn, of DAS and the Physics Department.

Both BNL teams are gearing up to carry on their experiments with a more sensitive detector at Yale University. As the results of these experiments become available, they will be reported in the Bulletin.

Patent Awarded

U.S. Patent No. 4,755,344 has been granted to Lewis Friedman and Robert Beuhler, both of the Chemistry Department, for their invention of a method and apparatus for producing large cluster ions, which can contain hydrogen or deuterium, or other specialized isotopes.

A "cluster ion" in this context means a group of atoms or molecules, which range in number from several tens of particles to several hundred thousand and carry one or more units of electrical charge.

Since the cluster ions from the new method are charged, they can be conventionally accelerated for investigations of electronic and nuclear energy exchanges in condensed matter. They also can be useful in preparing and

doping, or altering, material for semiconductors and solid state devices.

Other applications, which involve isotopic hydrogen cluster ions, include generating beams for producing and fueling fusion energy. Cluster ions containing mixtures of lithium or boron may also be used in fusion systems.

To create cluster ions using this new method, a source containing gas is cooled to about its boiling point and held at a relatively high pressure. An electrode is placed so that at least part of the gas can be ionized in the source prior to its expansion through a nozzle. A mixture of gas, ions and electrons made as the gas ionizes, this plasma is then expanded through the nozzle into a region kept at low pressure. The clusters form around the ions in the expanding gas.

These clusters tend to be larger

than those produced by previous methods, and, because they are charged at the time they form, they are more strongly bound and less subject to re-evaporation than neutral clusters. Also, they are all singly charged, resulting in an improved, narrower cluster mass-to-charge distribution.

The source design offers another advantage — it eliminates contact between the ion plasma and any surfaces containing electro-negative elements. This minimizes the formation of impurities, which can destroy the efficiency of the ion source.

A useful result of the large number of electrons and negative ions in the plasma source is the relatively large yield of negative cluster ions. Previous methods, which used electron impact ionization, produced mostly positive cluster ions.

Mini-Semester — Maxi-Learning Experience

Students from both the City College of New York (CCNY) and Brooklyn Technical High School (BTHS) came to BNL the last week in March to participate in a mini-semester with a physics focus. The Affirmative Action Office arranged the program to provide the students with firsthand knowledge of the Lab's scientific and technical pursuits.

The students pictured at left, below, were the thirteenth group of CCNY freshmen to spend a mini-semester at BNL. Highlights of their four days here included discussions

about the Multiparticle Spectrometer at the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS) and topics in both solid state and high energy physics.

They were also introduced to the National Synchrotron Light Source and received an overview of occupation and environmental health efforts at BNL. The students had a Plant Engineering site maintenance tour and visited the AGS and Accelerator Development Departments.

The students pictured at right, below, were the first to represent BTHS in a mini-semester at Brookhaven. They spent a full week at the Lab and, with their extra day, focused on such subjects as the Power Transmission Project, the magnet factory in Bldg. 902, the Tandem Van de Graaff accelerator, the High Flux Beam Reactor, the Central Scientific Computing Facility, the Positron Emission Tomography facility and the acid rain project in the Department of Applied Science.

Taking Stock Of Stock Catalogs

Peter Yamin, a physicist at the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron, thought that too many BNL stock catalogs were being sent to employees who did not use them. So he suggested that the Supply and Materiel Division review their distribution list. A survey showed that 381 fewer catalogs were needed, saving the Lab \$2,500. This cost-conscious idea won Yamin an award of \$250 from the Employee Suggestion Program (ESP).



Battery Case Dismissed, Winner Gets Prize

The wire-wrap tool that Henry Ashby is using above is battery-powered. In the past, replacement batteries came from stock in a new case, like the three-piece assembly shown at right. Since the case doesn't fail, why not stock just the battery alone, reducing the price of the unit and saving the Lab about \$600 a year? For this suggestion, Ashby, a technical specialist in the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS) Department, won \$60 from the Employee Suggestion Program (ESP).

Another recent prizewinning suggestion came from Linwood Johnson, a chauffeur in the Staff Services Division, who won \$30 from ESP for his idea of using Telephone SPIN Calling Cards. These eliminate the need for collect calls to the Lab, but can be used for only one telephone exchange. Issued through the Computing and Communications Division with approval of the user's department or division head, the cards are expected to save about \$300 annually.

Arthur Scholtz, a technical specialist in the AGS, was awarded \$25 by ESP for suggesting that the string on gas cylinder tags be replaced with wire. Wire will not weather from outdoor exposure or be cut when the metal cylinder caps are screwed on. In addition to preventing loss of tags, this will be helpful in cylinder identification, thus enhancing safety at the Lab.



Magnets Without Splinters

William Sandhoff Jr., a technical project supervisor in the Accelerator Development Department, earned \$200 from the Employee Suggestion Program (ESP) for his idea to demagnetize the tooling used to wind magnet coils. Sandhoff works in Bldg. 924, where the coils for the proposed national Superconducting Super Collider (SSC) and BNL's proposed Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC) are wound.

Mandrels, centerposts, blade assemblies and other coil-winding tooling are machined within BNL's Central Shops Division. In the process of being hardened, ground and drilled, however, the tooling becomes magnetized, attracting metal splinters.

If these splinters are wound along with the coil into SSC or RHIC magnets, they could cause electrical shorts. Thus, the use of Sandhoff's suggestion has reduced the possibility. Sandhoff is pictured here demagnetizing a centerpost.
