

Joseph Gisondo Joins Clinic Staff To Manage Employee Assistance Program

Clinical psychologist Joseph Gisondo has joined the staff of the Occupational Medicine Clinic (OMC), as the new manager of BNL's Employee Assistance Program (EAP).

EAP is an on-site, mental-health service established in 1981 to help employees with emotional and personal problems that can affect their work. As approximately 10 percent of any work force can be expected to have mental-health problems that interfere with job performance, the goal of EAP is to promote healthier, more productive BNL employees.

Confidentially and without charge, the EAP psychologist offers short-term counseling for employees as needed and refers those with continuing problems to outside practitioners, groups and treatment programs. In addition to addressing personal, emotional, interpersonal, social, marital and family difficulties, EAP helps employees troubled with drug and alcohol abuse problems.

EAP is also a part of BNL's Employee Relations Program; therefore, the EAP manager is also someone to whom employees can bring work-related problems involving personal or interpersonal difficulties. As well, employees could be referred to the EAP psychologist by their supervisors or by OMC physicians.

Having come to the Lab on October 23, Gisondo replaces clinical psychologist Jannifer Hill. She left BNL on November 8, after 3½ years as EAP manager, to join a New Jersey consulting firm specializing in organizational and management development.

"With the employment of Dr. Gisondo, we are very fortunate to be able to continue the high quality of BNL's Employee Assistance Program, which has been very well managed by Dr. Hill until now," says

Bryce Breitenstein, Head of the Occupational Medicine Clinic. "EAP is a very important part of the services offered by the Clinic, and Dr. Gisondo comes to BNL well qualified to carry out this program."

"Dr. Jannifer Hill maintained the highest standards of professionalism and integrity," says Gisondo, "and it is my goal to continue in her practice of caring, competence and confidentiality."

Initially dividing his time between EAP and his private practice in Amityville, Gisondo comes to the position with over 20 years' experience in the health care profession. His experience includes psychological diagnosis, evaluation and acute intervention, short- and long-term psychotherapy, alcohol and drug counseling, and work with medical, surgical and psychiatric patients.

"When an employee comes to me for a referral, we collaborate on finding the right services, be it

individual therapy or a group," explains Gisondo. "During a consultation, I will make the psychological assessment and help define the scope of treatment. However, I will not tell employees what their problems are, nor will I impose my own solutions on anyone. This is a joint effort — the choice of care for each employee will have to make sense to both of us."

Gisondo's referral network includes a growing list of psychiatric social workers, psychologists, psychiatrists, alcohol and drug counselors, self-help groups and treatment programs.

After employees are referred, they may feel free to discuss their progress with Gisondo. In addition, he will evaluate employees' ongoing treatment, as requested by Connecticut General Life Insurance Company, which administers BNL's medical insurance plan.

"Evaluation of continuing care is an important quality-control check, to make sure that the therapeutic process is effective, that employees are being helped by their health benefits," explains Gisondo.

He also serves as a consultant to supervisors, management and the BNL administration on general mental health issues in the workplace and on specific employees' problems that have interfered with their job performance. Comments Gisondo, "As the EAP policy states, my job is 'as a consultant [who] shall not be construed as necessarily sympathetic toward either management or employee points of view.'"

Joseph Gisondo received his Ph.D. in clinical psychology from Hofstra University in 1978. Earlier, he had been granted a B.A. in psychology from St. John's University in 1969, his first M.A. in psychology from the New School for Social Research in 1971, and his second M.A. in psychology from Hofstra in 1974.

In private practice exclusively for the past two years, Gisondo had served on the Department of Psychology staff at Brunswick Hospital in Amityville from 1976 until 1987, moving up from an associate psychologist to senior psychologist and

Update: 1990 Funding

With the fiscal year almost two months old, Congress has not yet approved all government budgets for 1990. Until these budgets are approved, the Laboratory's fiscal situation is clouded with questions.

Thus far, Congress has approved and the President has signed into law only a few of 13 appropriation bills. The 1990 Energy and Water Development Appropriation Bill, under which the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is funded, is one of them.

As the Bulletin reported on September 22, the final version of this bill called for a reduction of \$5 million in funding for BNL's Alternating Gradient Synchrotron. Uncertainties still exist, however, as to how DOE will allocate remaining funds, and how these allocations will affect the Lab.

In addition, if Congress does not finalize the other appropriation bills, there is the potential for Gramm-Rudman reductions to take effect. Such reductions, said BNL Deputy Director Martin Blume, "could lead to cuts of up to five percent throughout the government budget. Naturally, such cuts would have serious consequences, and we are following events very carefully. As the budget picture changes, we will keep employees informed."

Flexible Spending Accounts: Questions and Answers

As 1990 approaches, so too does the premiere of the new Flexible Spending Accounts benefit option Associated Universities, Inc. (AUI), is introducing for BNL employees.

The program begins on January 1, 1990, and employees have until November 30 to sign up for one or both of the accounts: the Health Care Reimbursement Account and the Dependent Day Care Reimbursement Account.

Over the past few weeks, employees have received informational brochures and enrollment materials. After reviewing the material, several employees have contacted Personnel Services with questions about the new program.

Following are some of the most commonly asked questions and their answers:

Q: Can I still open a Flexible Spending Account if I don't enroll by

the end of the open enrollment period?

A: If you don't enroll by November 30, you will not be able to participate in the new benefit program until the next enrollment period, which is January 1991.

Q: Will the money that I contribute earn interest?

A: No. Your contributions will not earn interest while they remain in the accounts.

Q: For dependent care expenses, which is better, the Dependent Day Care Reimbursement Account or the income-tax credit?

A: In general, couples earning less than \$21,000 per year will do better with the tax credit, while those earning more should probably use AUI's Dependent Day Care Reimbursement Account. However, the tax laws are complex, so it's a good idea to consult a tax advisor to determine (Continued on page 2)

which is better for you. Your "Tax Savings Workbook" has examples comparing the tax credit and the reimbursement account.

Q: Under Internal Revenue Service (IRS) rules, any money left in my account(s) at the end of the year must be forfeited. What happens to this forfeited money?

A: AUI will use any forfeited money to offset the cost of administering the Flexible Spending Accounts.

Q: With this forfeiture provision, why would I want to contribute to the reimbursement accounts?

A: You'll want to plan as carefully as possible, to avoid forfeiting money at the end of the plan year. But, if you typically have dependent day-care bills and/or out-of-pocket health care costs such as deductibles, coinsurance, routine physical examinations or vision care, you might want to make a conservative estimate of these expenses and then set aside a portion of your salary to pay these expenses throughout the year with tax-free dollars.

Q: If I'm reducing my salary before taxes are taken out, why aren't the benefits that are based on my salary, such as life insurance, affected?

A: Because all of your pay-related benefits are based on your regular base salary. For example, if your base salary is \$40,000 and you reduce it by \$3,000 to participate in the reimbursement accounts, your taxable income will be \$37,000. But your life insurance and other AUI benefits will continue to be based on your \$40,000 a year salary.

Q: If my employment is terminated for any reason, is my outstanding account balance returned to me?

A: No. According to IRS regulations, any contributions you make to your flexible spending accounts must be used or they will be forfeited, regardless of your employment status. Your reimbursement accounts contributions cease on the date your employment ends. However, you have until December 31 of the year you terminate employment to file health-care and dependent day-care expenses that were incurred on or before the last day you worked.

Q: What must I do to sign up for a Flexible Spending Account?

A: Fill out the enrollment application form, indicating your salary reduction amount for the reimbursement account(s), then return it to Personnel Services, Bldg. 185, by November 30.

Radon Levels Under Study

Less than two inches in diameter, they're not very big — but they've got a big job to do. They're the measurement devices that have been installed in approximately 5,200 locations in U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) buildings at 50 sites, and their job is to determine the extent of radon concentrations present in those buildings.

As a DOE contractor, BNL is part of this study, which Congress has required of all federal agencies through the Indoor Radon Abatement Act of 1988, an amendment to the Toxic Substances Control Act. To comply with this requirement, the black and gold devices were installed in most Lab buildings earlier this week.

As naturally occurring uranium decays, it produces radon, which is an invisible, odorless, radioactive gas. Radon decays into radioactive particles, which, if inhaled, may cause damage to lung tissue, increasing the risk of lung cancer.

Radon migrates through permeable rocks and soil, eventually dispersing into the atmosphere or into buildings where it can accumulate. In outdoor air, radon is diluted to such low concentrations that it is usually nothing to worry about. Indoors, however, levels depend on both a building's construction and the concentration of radon in the underlying soil. Every structure in the U.S. has some level of radon gas in its air, but in most cases these levels are too low to require any action. However, the

only way to be certain about the level of radon in a structure is to measure it.

For the DOE study, indoor radon levels will be measured during the next three months. After that, the results will be analyzed, and a final report will be provided to DOE by the end of April 1990. In turn, DOE will give the report to the Environmental Protection Agency by June 1990.

According to Robert Miltenberger and Norman Rohrig, health physicists in the Safety & Environmental Protection Division, BNL is not situated on or near any significant concentrations of radon and we should not have any problems here.

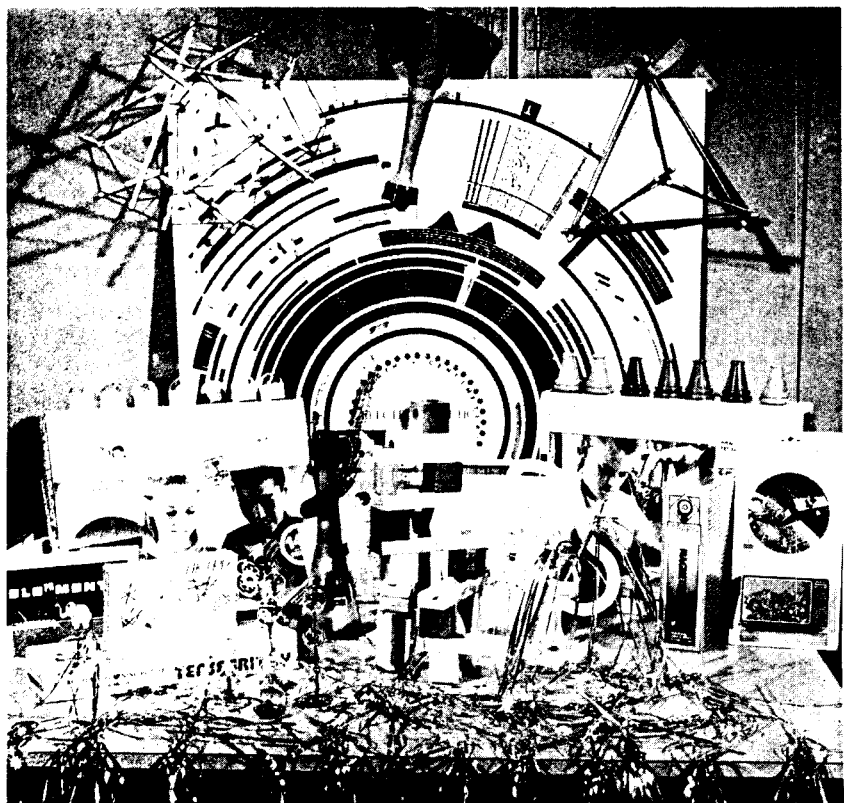
