

Setlow Being Honored by Cancer Researchers

Richard Setlow, BNL's Associate Director for Life Sciences, is the guest of honor and a keynote speaker at a conference entitled "Cellular Responses to Environmental DNA Damage" being held this week, December 1-6, in Banff, Alberta, Canada. Sponsored by the American Association for Cancer Research, (AACR), the international meeting on DNA repair marks Setlow's 70th birthday, which occurred earlier this year.


The AACR meets regularly each year and also sponsors a number of special annual conferences. This year, colleagues and former students are honoring Setlow for his outstanding achievements in the fields of radiation biophysics and molecular biology during four decades of research, first at Yale, next at Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL), then at BNL.

In the early 1960s, Setlow and his colleagues at ORNL discovered how cells repair structural defects in DNA, the substance that is the molecular basis of heredity. Setlow first demonstrated that certain DNA defects caused by ultraviolet light lead to biological damage. He also showed that, in normal bacterial cells, these defects could be excised by cellular enzymes, though no excision took place in ultraviolet-sensitive cells.

These discoveries had far-reaching effects, bringing about intense worldwide interest in this area of research, which eventually led to finding DNA repair mechanisms in all organisms. Also, since certain genetic diseases in humans are the result of inherited deficiencies in DNA repair, Setlow's discoveries were the catalyst for the beginning of another important and fruitful area of research.

In current experiments, Setlow and his colleagues are investigating how DNA repair differs among people in normal human populations and whether repair processes are constant over time. In addition, they are investigating the role of melanoma-susceptibility genes and tumor-suppressor genes in causing melanomas. For this

Inside Info

Last month, Leon Green attended his last meeting at the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) in Vienna as Division Head of the International Safeguards Project Office (ISPO) in BNL's Department of Nuclear Energy (DNE).

"In recognition of his 13 years of stalwart support to IAEA Safeguards," Green was presented at that meeting with a plaque signed by J. Jennekens, IAEA Deputy Director General, Safeguards, and by K. Naito, IAEA Director of Safeguards Development.

On behalf of the U.S. Department of State, ISPO manages a special Program of Technical Assistance (POTAS) to the Department of Safeguards within the IAEA, which was established by the United Nations to verify that nuclear materials and installations worldwide are used only for peaceful purposes.

Green began leading ISPO in 1977. As the second head of that division, he was praised by DNE Chairman Romney Duffey for "significant, lasting and important contributions that are internationally recognized."

As Green stepped down on December 1 to continue within ISPO to advise and support its and other DNE activities, Ann Reisman became the new ISPO Division Head.

Reisman, who had been ISPO's Deputy Head since September 1990, began her BNL career in 1974 in the Department of Applied Science. There, she contributed to the National Energy Plan of the U.S. Department of Energy and was principal investigator of a study to develop methodology to assess the feasibility of large-scale district heating and cogeneration systems in the U.S.

In transferring to ISPO in DNE in March 1985, Reisman began applying her analytical experience to international safeguards. From 1987 to 1989, she served as Liaison Officer at IAEA Headquarters in Vienna, Austria, acting as principal contact between the IAEA's Department of Safeguards and the ISPO office at BNL.

Tax Savings For Dental Plan Participants

Effective January 1, 1992, all employees currently enrolled in the AUI Dental Assistance Plan, as well as new participants, will be able to make their required contributions on a before-tax basis by taking advantage of a new salary reduction option.

Before-tax contributions will be deducted from pay before federal income taxes and Social Security taxes are withheld, resulting in a lower actual cost to the employee.

Salary reduction authorization forms have been mailed to all current plan participants, who must return the completed form to Payroll, Bldg. 134J, by December 31, to take advantage of this tax savings. New participants should get the form from Personnel Services, Bldg. 185, when they pick up their application.

Special Dental Plan Enrollment

Since participation in the AUI Dental Assistance Plan will no longer have an impact on the deductible amount for the AUI Medical Insurance Plan after January 1, 1992, the Lab is holding a special enrollment for the Dental Assistance Plan during the month of December.

All regular employees working 20 or more hours per week who are not currently participating in the Dental Assistance Plan may enroll during December, with coverage effective January 1.

The plan pays a maximum of \$1,000 benefits per calendar year for each individual for non-orthodontic dental expenses, in three categories:

- **Prevention & Diagnosis** — For services including routine exams, cleaning and scaling, and x-rays, the plan covers expenses from the first dollar spent to a maximum stated in a payment schedule.
- **Basic & Major Dentistry** — After an individual pays the first \$25 of covered expenses during the calendar year, restorative, endodontic, periodontic and prosthodontic dental work, and oral surgery are reimbursed according to a schedule of allowance. The maximum deductible for any family is \$75 per year.
- **Children's Orthodontia** — Fifty percent of reasonable and customary charges for orthodontic services for dependent children are paid, up to a lifetime maximum of \$1,000 per child.

The Lab is offering the Dental Assistance Plan as an employee option, with the following required employee contributions:

Employees who sign up for the Dental Assistance Plan must participate until the next open enrollment period in December 1992. Present eligible employees not electing coverage at this time must wait until this period ends to participate.

High Schoolers' Hydroponic Harvest

Harvest came a little late this year for the 40 students who participated in the Office of Educational Program's (OEP) Minority High School Apprentice Program last summer. Organized by Renée Flack of OEP, the courses were held as they have been since 1980, in three four-week terms. These have included physics, biology, chemistry, environmental science and medicine, giving minority ninth and tenth graders the chance to experience hands-on science with a view to possible future career choices.

In one popular biology class, taught by Authur Pitschi of Patchogue-Medford High School, the students plant and harvest vegetables in hydroponic greenhouses. This year, they started by refurbishing the two greenhouses, donated to the program by the Biology Department. So, planting was delayed. However, on one Saturday in October, some of the students, who come from schools in Suffolk and New York City, returned with their parents for this special harvest celebration of their own lettuce, cucumbers and tomatoes.

BWIS Meeting

Chemist Etsuko Fujita, who does her organic chemistry research in BNL's Chemistry Department, will be the speaker at the next Brookhaven Women in Science (BWIS) luncheon meeting. She will discuss "CO₂ Activation by Metal Macrocyclic Complexes."

Carbon dioxide (CO₂) is created every time fuels are burned. Since it is a "greenhouse gas," there is much current concern about the amount of CO₂ in the atmosphere. Fujita and her coworkers are interested in turning CO₂ back into something useful, such as a fuel. She will discuss how CO₂ can be made more reactive, and therefore more likely to be transformed into another compound when it binds to metal complexes.

Etsuko Fujita came to BNL in 1976 as a postdoctoral student in the Department of Energy and Environmental, which became the Department of Applied Science (DAS) in 1983. She remained in DAS until 1986, when she joined the Chemistry Department.

they are using a fish model, a hybrid cross of platyfish and swordtails that is highly susceptible to melanoma caused by ultraviolet light.

Setlow received his A.B. from Swarthmore College in 1941 and his Ph.D. in physics from Yale University in 1947. He taught biophysics and physics at Yale until 1961, when interest in the effects of radiation on proteins, DNA and living cells brought him to a research position at the Biology Division at Oak Ridge. He joined BNL's Biology Department in 1974 and became Chairman in 1979. In 1986, he was named Associate Director for Life Sciences.

In 1988, Setlow was one of two winners of the Enrico Fermi Award, the most prestigious scientific honor awarded by the U.S. Department of Energy. He has also received honors from the Radiation Research Society and was awarded the Finsen Medal in 1980 at the Eighth International Congress on Photobiology.

Setlow holds an honorary Doctor of Science degree from York University, Canada, and he is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Having served as president of the Biophysical Society, and president of the Comité International de Photobiologie, he is also honorary president of the 11th International Congress on Photobiology to be held in Kyoto, Japan, in 1992. A member of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and numerous other professional organizations, Setlow is the author or coauthor of 246 scientific papers.
