

Grandparents' Day 1992

'Please Let Nothing Interfere With A Natural Grandparent-Child Relationship'

In 1978, President Jimmy Carter, himself a grandpa, signed a Congressional resolution establishing the first Sunday after Labor Day as Grandparents' Day. First celebrated in 1979, Grandparents' Day this year is this Sunday, September 13.

Though one of the least celebrated and commercialized holidays in America, Grandparents' Day is a day not only for grandchildren to express their appreciation for their grandma and grandpa. But it is also a time for grandparents to reflect on their involvement with their grandchildren — especially in times when grandparents' rights to visit with their grandchildren are often battled over in the courts.

Ruth Ann Lutz, Director's Office, experienced such a battle with a former daughter-in-law over her first grandchild, Brittany, who is now age 6½ and who last visited with Lutz and her husband John on December 3, 1989.

Though they petitioned the court for visitation rights following the divorce of Brittany's father and mother, the elder Lutzs have withdrawn their case, since they did not wish to see their innocent granddaughter drawn further into a litigious conflict.

Explains Lutz, "After seeking our rights through the courts but getting nothing but more grief, I started GRID — and began reaching out to other grandparents in similar situations, in hopes that some good may come out of the bad."

Called GRID for Grandparents Rights in Divorce, the advocacy and support group for grandparents who have become lost to their grandchildren met at the Shoreham-Wading River Library at a time when there were no local chapters of such recently formed national organizations for grandparents as Grandparents United for Children's Rights or Grandparents Rights Organization.

With the growth in membership and resources of these national grandparents'-rights groups, GRID ceased to meet. However, Lutz continues to field phone calls from

grandparents looking for information about grandparents' rights.

Says Lutz, "I at least have my husband John, my 80-year-old mother, my three children, another granddaughter Kristie, and my health and my job. Some of the grandparents with whom I have spoken have no one else and nothing — and many have had to end retirement to go back to work to pay for the legal fees to fight for their rights. Having to spend your retirement years in court so you can see your grandchildren is not right.

"In being deprived of their grandparents, grandchildren are also losing much of their cultural heritage and family traditions — and that is also wrong," continues Lutz.

"I had a wonderful relationship with my grandparents — and that's what I wanted for Brittany. I wanted to make memories with her, of family holidays and rituals that come from seeing each other often and regularly. It makes me very sad that Brittany will not know anything about the Scandinavian side of her family and that she is being deprived of my mother, her great-grandmother. Very

few little girls are so lucky as to have their great-grandmothers still alive and well.

"Grandparents can share what we may not have had the time or knowledge to share with our children," explains Lutz.

"We are not busy raising the children as are their parents, so our time with our grandchildren is 100 percent quality time. We are there for them and they are the center of our world while they are with us. We can share with them the patience, experience and wisdom that we acquired over the years and that we might not have had when their parents were our children.

"So, on this Grandparents' Day," says Lutz, "if there is anything we can teach our children, it is that they must please let nothing interfere with a natural grandparent-grandchild relationship.

"Not the lack of a marriage certificate, not separation or divorce, not sibling rivalry, not unresolved conflicts with their parents, not immaturity, selfishness or pettiness — not anything. Life is too short for such luxuries. All the hate must be set aside so that the love between a grandparent and grandchild may flow back and forth across the generations," concludes Lutz.

Road Work at Main Gate

This weekend, September 12 and 13, West Princeton Avenue will be repaved. West Princeton is the stretch of road at the Main Gate, between William Floyd Parkway and the blinking light.
