

BNL Lecture: The Turquoise Trail Before Columbus

There are almost no turquoise mines in Mexico.

Yet, for nearly a thousand years before the arrival of Columbus, the Mesoamericans who lived in middle and southern Mexico used enormous quantities of this stone for their most precious religious artifacts and best jewelry. These include such magnificent pieces as the human skull inlaid with turquoise representing the god Tezcatlipoca, the gift of Aztec emperor Montezuma II to Spanish explorer Hernando Cortés when he landed in Mexico in 1519.

Where did all this turquoise come from? Was it from the nearest source — the many ancient turquoise mines found in the American Southwest?

In 20 years of research that proved this to be the case, Garman Harbottle of BNL's Chemistry Department and Philip Weigand, of the Coegio de Michoacan, Mexico, and the Museum of Northern Arizona in Flagstaff, developed a theory, which they proposed in the February 1992 issue of *Scientific American*.

To describe this theory and the crucial evidence for it, Senior Chemist Garman Harbottle will present "The Turquoise Trail Before Columbus," as the 282nd Brookhaven Lecture, on Wednesday, November 18, at 4 p.m. in Berkner Hall. Harbottle will be introduced by Associate Chemist Diane Cabelli, the Chemistry Department representative on the BNL Lecture Committee.

According to Harbottle and Weigand's controversial theory, so much turquoise came to Mesoamerica from the American Southwest that highly developed trade based mainly on turquoise must have existed between

these two regions about 1,200 years ago.

In his talk, which will be copiously illustrated with maps and photographs, Harbottle will briefly survey the history of turquoise and detail its use in Mesoamerica.

Harbottle will then explain neutron activation, the chemical analysis technique that he conducts at BNL, which enables the unique "fingerprints" of elements in known mines to be matched to samples of turquoise. By this method, after analyzing over 2,000 pieces of turquoise from different mines and about 100 artifacts from several major archaeological sites, Harbottle traced dozens of pieces found in Mexico to specific mines over 1,000 miles away in Southwestern America.

With this evidence, and other pivotal supporting facts such as the

sophisticated Mesoamerican beveled-edge technique of working turquoise being suddenly used in 1100 in Arizona, Harbottle will summarize how he and Weigand concluded that a formal system of trading between these areas existed from about 700 A.D. until at least the mid-1500s.

After receiving his B.S. from the California Institute of Technology in 1944, Garman Harbottle earned his Ph.D. from Columbia University in 1949 and joined the BNL Chemistry Department that same year.

From 1957-58 he was a Guggenheim Fellow at Cambridge University in England, and, in 1959, he spent a year teaching radioisotope procedures at the American Univer-

sity in Beirut. Later, from 1965-67, he directed the Division of Research and Laboratories at the International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna. Harbottle is also an adjunct professor in anthropological sciences at the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

In 1983, with Edward Sayre, Harbottle received the George Hevesy Medal for outstanding accomplishment in radioanalytical chemistry.

And six scientists who have attended all six symposia at BNL were presented with "16 Years of Perfect Attendance" awards.



Changes in Pavement Marks Coming at Lab's Main Gate

As a result of a number of discussions between BNL and Suffolk County, the county will be making several modifications at the Lab's exits on to William Floyd Parkway.

More information on these modifications will appear in a future Bulletin, but work on two of them is expected to begin very shortly, so they can be completed before the weather gets too cold.

The first change will eliminate the dual left-turn exit from the Laboratory's main entrance, at the intersection of William Floyd Parkway, Longwood Road and BNL's Princeton Avenue. The left-turn pavement arrow will be removed from the westbound right-hand lane, signs will be installed indicating that the right lane is for through traffic only, and the signal time will be increased to accommodate this change.

Also, at the North Gate, the County plans to increase the length of the acceleration lane heading north from BNL onto William Floyd Parkway, by revising the pavement markings to make it easier for Lab drivers to merge with existing traffic.
