

## The Phantom of the BNCT Program Helps Test Medical Reactor Beam

A "phantom" representing the head of a patient with a brain tumor is being used to test the specialized neutron beam in the Medical Research Reactor.

The beam, called an epithermal beam, was developed for use in boron neutron capture therapy (BNCT). While its effects had already been documented, alterations at the reactor made last fall improved the beam by 50 percent.

Robert Brugger and colleagues from the Medical Department are therefore using a phantom to refine the radiation dosimetry, or measure of doses, to be used in clinical trials.

Said Brugger, "When I came to BNL in 1990, this beam, which is one of only three epithermal neutron beams in the world that can treat cancers by BNCT, was already the world's best. However, we're always looking at ways to improve things."

Brugger, joined by Hungyman (Ben) Liu in 1991, used Monte Carlo computer calculations to explore methods of making the beam more effective. Said Liu, "Neutrons come out of the reactor core at two million

electron volts. To get epithermal neutrons, which we need for BNCT, they have to be slowed down. Our goal was to increase the flux of epithermal neutrons while at the same time decreasing the fast neutrons."

### Some BNCT History

Research on BNCT started in the 1940s, when BNL staff studied its application in cancers such as glioblastoma multiforme, a brain tumor that results in a median life expectancy of less than a year.

In this therapy, a compound containing boron-10, a stable isotope of boron, is administered to the patient. The compound preferentially accumulates in the cancerous tumors and is then irradiated with slow neutrons.

Boron-10 absorbs the slow neutrons and then undergoes fission — releasing radiation that includes alpha particles energetic enough to sterilize a cancer cell when they traverse the nucleus. As the alpha transfers energy only as far as the radius of a single cell, and the boron-10 is mostly concentrated in and around

the tumor cells, the cancer can be selectively destroyed without much effect on nearby healthy cells.

In the first BNCT clinical trials in the 1950s and early 1960s, at Brook-

haven and at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), the boron-10 compounds used were not particularly tumor selective. Also, the slow, thermal neutron beam did not penetrate deeply enough to destroy the tumor without harming surrounding healthy tissue. Clinical trials were therefore halted in 1961.

Since then, new research in the Medical Department and at other research centers has yielded promising solutions to these problems. New boron compounds, some developed by Brookhaven scientists, have proven to concentrate in the tumor at levels required for effective treatment (see accompanying story).

Equally important has been the research done on the neutron beam.

Commissioned in 1959, BNL's Medical Research Reactor was the first to be specifically constructed for medical research, and for BNCT in particular.

In the 1960s, the late Ralph Fairchild and James Robertson, both of the Medical Department, pioneered work to modify the thermal beam. Finally, in the 1980s, Fairchild led a team from BNL and Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to produce a beam of neutrons with energies of a few hundred electron volts — intermediate-energy, epithermal neutrons. Slowed down by body tissue, these reach the tumor as slow, thermal neutrons that can interact with the boron-10 in the cancer cells and destroy them.

### Back to the Present

"Our calculations showed that we could improve the epithermal neutron flux in two ways," said Brugger. "First, we could rearrange the fuel elements in the reactor core. Second, we could redesign the moderator assembly — a filtering system placed where the beam emerges from the core to slow the neutrons to the correct energy."

"Once we'd suggested that rearranging the core would improve the beam, the staff of the Reactor Division took over," continued Brugger. "With Henry Hauptman leading the reactor operations team, the high standard of cooperation and skill resulted in four new fuel elements' being installed close to the beam, quickly and expertly. By fall 1992, the job was done, gaining us the predicted 50 percent beam improvement."

The next step was to reestablish (continued on page 2)

## CRADA Signed for Development Of Boron Compounds for Cancer Therapy

A new agreement between BNL and a North Carolina company may soon lead to significantly cheaper boron compounds for boron neutron capture therapy (BNCT), an experimental cancer treatment.

BNL Scientist Jeffrey Coderre, Medical Department, is the principal investigator in the Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) with Boron Biologicals, Inc. (BBI) of Raleigh. A small, six-year-old company, BBI is the sole commercial source of the boron compounds used for experimental BNCT in the U.S.

BNCT involves tagging certain biomolecules with boron-10, a nonradioactive boron isotope. After injection, the boron-10 concentrates at the target tumor site. Using BNL's Medical Research Reactor, researchers irradiate the tumor with a low-energy neutron beam (see accompanying story).

The boron compound absorbs the neutrons and instantaneously undergoes nuclear fission. The fission products then injure or kill the tumor cells, thus slowing or stopping tumor growth. However, the short range of the fission products greatly reduces the damage to normal tissues surrounding the tumor.

Coderre and his BNL colleagues recently determined that the boron

compound called p-boronophenylalanine (BPA) is highly effective in destroying malignant skin, brain and eye tumors in animals. Based on these results, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has given approval for Brookhaven to begin testing the distribution of BPA in cancer patients.

Actual treatment of human cancers at the Medical Reactor should begin in about a year if ongoing research continues to be successful.

Coderre said, "Our animal studies indicate that BNCT will be effective in treating human tumors, but the high cost of these compounds is inhibiting progress." One gram of BPA currently costs \$185, and one patient study costs approximately \$7,000.

To make BPA more affordable, BBI will use a new manufacturing method, which may decrease the cost of the boron compound by a factor of ten. As required by the FDA, Coderre and his associates will test the BPA produced by the new process

to show that it is equivalent to the BPA currently in use.

In addition, BBI will synthesize new boron compounds, which Brookhaven will evaluate in cell culture and animal tumor models to determine their toxicity, selective uptake in tumors, and efficacy of BNCT.

Another approach under the CRADA will be liposome encapsulation of new or existing boron-containing drugs, such as BPA. A liposome, a synthetic, spherical membrane, can trap a drug in the space inside the sphere, which may result in a boron-containing drug being present in the blood longer, thus enhancing uptake in the tumor. Also, the tumor cells may ingest these liposomes more readily than would cells in normal tissues, potentiating BNCT's lethal effect on tumors.

dosimetric measurements. Brugger and Liu designed an ellipsoidal lucite head phantom with removable rods inside. The rods are inserted loaded with different testing materials, such as bare and cadmium-covered gold foils, which show the effects of thermal and epithermal neutron fluxes.  
 "We also load the rods with cell cultures," noted Brenda Laster, who also works with Brugger. "By making tests with cells in different places in the phantom, we plan to evaluate their response to the calculated doses. Then, in clinical trials, we'll know what reactions to expect. Another advantage is that after many years of research with this cell line, we know it's stable and predictable at certain doses. It responds in a simple way to complex radiation, making an effective biological dosimeter."  
 As Brugger remarked, the present advances in BNCT are the result of years of intensive research at Brookhaven, in collaboration with several other institutions — the North Shore University Hospital, the University Hospital at Stony Brook, MIT, and

about a dozen more.  
 "What we need now is funding to finish the second part of our work," said Brugger. "The Monte Carlo calculations show that rearranging the materials in the filtering system can substantially increase the epithermal beam intensity and improve the beam quality."  
 Liu explained how the changes would affect a patient. "Before May, 1992, one treatment session was predicted to be 55 minutes long," he said. "Since October, 1992, with the new fuel arrangement, a treatment is predicted to take only 35 minutes. But if we can get funding for a new filter, a patient would have to be treated for just 25 minutes each time."

**Outreach Workshop Of Macho and Men**

Why do men tend to die earlier than women? Why are they more prone to accidents, serious illness, and alcohol and drug abuse? Why do they have a higher rate of suicide? Why are they more likely to act out violently, commit a crime, murder someone and be imprisoned?  
 Could it be the same reason many men are afraid to cry?  
 The answers will be discussed in the next Outreach workshop, "Of Macho and Men," on Tuesday, February 16, from noon to 1 p.m. in Room B, Berkner Hall. Sponsored by the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) of the Occupational Medicine Clinic, this workshop will be presented by clinical psychologist Don-David Lusterman. All are invited to attend, and the workshop will be audiotaped.



**Don-David Lusterman**

Lusterman will discuss what he calls "man disease," the things that happen to men as a result of their macho socialization. As Lusterman will explain, men have been socialized to be strong and virile — but, in the process of meeting the masculine ideal and of not being effeminate, men have had to harden themselves and suppress their emotions, especially those that make them feel vulnerable. This sublimation of emotion takes a toll on men's physical, social and psychological well-being.  
 Lusterman will suggest ways that men can transcend machismo, and feel less distanced from their emotions and their loved ones.  
 Specializing in family therapy in his Baldwin practice, Don-David Lusterman, Ph.D., is a fellow of the American Psychological Association (APA). He was the 1987 family psychologist of the year, so named by the APA's Division of Family Psychology. A founding member of the Society for the Psychological Study of Men and Masculinity, Lusterman is working toward establishing an APA division devoted to advancing the psychological research and treatment of men.
