

## BNL Leads \$17.8-Million Program to Improve Safety Of Soviet-Designed Nuclear Power Reactors

The worst nuclear reactor accident in history — the explosion of the Soviet Union's Chernobyl-4 — released an estimated 50 million curies of radioactive material into the environment on April 26, 1986.

Thirty-one Chernobyl workers died, and 200 people at the site were hospitalized due to excessive radiation exposure — but, even yet, the long-term damage cannot be fully assessed.

Though the Soviet Union is now gone, Russia still operates a dozen of these Chernobyl-type reactors, known as RBMKs, and another four are in use in Lithuania and Ukraine. These graphite-moderated, boiling-water reactors have been upgraded, but their design is seriously flawed. So, the U.S. position is that they should be shut down.

In addition, more than 42 Soviet-designed, pressurized-water reactors, known as VVERs, are operating in Russia, Ukraine, Hungary, Bulgaria, the Czech Republic and Slovakia. Sixteen new VVERs are also under construction. With substantial safety improvements, these reactors could continue to function.

Because of the absence of effective nuclear regulatory authorities in Russia and the rest of Eastern Europe, and these countries' lack of resources needed to upgrade and maintain these nuclear power plants, the U.S., along with Britain, Canada, France, Germany, Japan and Italy, has instituted a program to assist in improving the safety of Soviet-designed reactors.

The International Nuclear Safety Project Office (INSPO) of the International Projects Division (IPD) in

BNL's Department of Nuclear Energy (DNE) was selected to manage the program by the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), with the concurrence of the U.S. Agency for International Development (AID) and the U.S. Department of State. Funded with \$17.85 million for fiscal year 1992 from DOE via AID, the project began last October and is expected to be completed by December 1995.

"BNL was chosen to oversee the project because of our extensive experience in managing international safeguards programs and our in-depth knowledge of the safety of Soviet-designed reactors," said DNE Scientist and IPD Head Ann Reisman.

Others from DNE with major roles in the project are: Nuclear Engineer and INSPO Group Leader William Horak, Senior Research Engineer and INSPO Manager Robert Fitzpatrick, Nuclear Engineer James Guppy, Research Engineer William Shier, and Scientist Sonja Haber.

They have also received additional support from DNE Chairman Romney Duffey, BNL Associate Director Seymour Baron and others in the

Director's Office, the DOE's Brookhaven Area Office, BNL's Division of Contracts & Procurement, and DNE's Administration Division.

### Reducing Risk

"The thrust of the project is three-fold," explained Horak. "First, we will help to establish training centers in Russia and Ukraine. There, we will work closely with the owners and operators of the nuclear power plants in the area of safe operating and maintenance procedures.

"Second," Horak continued, "we'll be proposing short-term, risk-reduction measures, which may involve installing better electrical backup systems, better instrumentation, and better ways to fight fires, as well as improving confinement systems, until the RBMK plants can be shut down in two to three years.

"Finally, we want to upgrade the VVER 1000s, which need to be modernized to meet Western safety standards," concluded Horak. "Moreover, we will be providing training for the operators of these plants, and improving plant capacity and reliability."

Reisman explained that approximately \$3 million of the current annual funding is tagged for INSPO expenditures. These funds will be used for project management, and technical direction and oversight. The remainder of funding will be used (continued on page 2)

## New Avenue for Resolving ES&H Concerns

Just as BNL employees, contract workers and guests have an obligation to comply with the Lab's environment, safety and health (ES&H) requirements, they also have the responsibility to report any unsafe conditions within the workplace that may threaten their physical well-being or violate ES&H standards.

If unsafe or unhealthful conditions are found, BNLees have been asked first to alert their line management. If an individual is not satisfied with the response from management, then the person could turn to the department or division's ES&H coordinator or the ES&H representative from the Safety & Environmental Protection Division (SEP). Employees covered by labor agreements may have their ES&H concerns addressed through the labor-grievance process.

In the past, if individuals were still not happy with the solutions, their only recourse would be to bring their problems to the attention of the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), via the on-site Brookhaven Area Office.

Now, however, Employee Relations Counselor Susan Foster, Bldg. 185, Ext. 2888, may be brought in to oversee an investigation of the situation and its correction, under a new ES&H employee-concern program. If so requested, Foster will make every effort to handle ES&H matters confidentially.

As Employee Relations Counselor, "I have handled a few such problems in the past, in an attempt to find

prompt and fair solutions to work-related conflicts that have not been solved through the supervisory chain," explains Foster. "The only difference is that, now, I am formally a part of the concern program which employees and others working on site may utilize in trying to resolve ES&H problems on site. Before, those with ES&H complaints may not have realized that turning to me was an option."

By involving her position in the ES&H complaint process, "The Lab is demonstrating that it wants to encourage employees to bring their ES&H concerns to management's attention and to assure all that's (continued on page 2)

## Flack to Be Recognized By Long Island Black Educators

Yreana-Renée Flack, Office of Educational Programs (OEP), will be presented with an "Excellence in Education" award by the Long Island Black Educators Association at its annual scholarship ball, at the Marriott Hotel in Uniondale tomorrow evening.

Flack is being honored for designing and implementing OEP's Environmental Education Outreach Program. Funded by the U.S. Department of Energy, Office of Environmental Restoration and Waste Management, the program's goal is to promote an interest in environmental science as a career choice among high school students who belong to minority groups underrepresented in this field.

In this program, about 40 Wyandanch High School students now attend a two-and-a-half-hour class covering various environmental topics each week for one semester at Suffolk Community College.

Three Wyandanch teachers and an instructor from the college are teaching the course, based on the syllabus they wrote after attending summer enrichment sessions during the Minority High School Apprentice Program at BNL.

Five outstanding students will be chosen from the current group to attend a one-week, mini-semester program at Brookhaven in April. The students will stay on site, attend lectures on such topics as "Analyzing Environmental Hazards" and "Injury Prevention" offered by Brookhaven researchers, and tour pertinent areas of the Lab.

These students will be invited back to Brookhaven in August for a month-long residency, during which they

will delve into environmental science more deeply.

"I'm honored to receive this award and gratified that the two-year-old environmental science program is such a success," Flack said. "It's one of dozens of programs Brookhaven Lab offers students — from elementary school to the postgraduate level — to promote interest in science."

Flack started her career at BNL in 1965, as a clerk in the Personnel Division and, later that year, moved to the Contracts and Procurement Division. In 1971, she started working in the Director's Office as an equal opportunity assistant, and, by 1983, she had worked her way up to Senior Equal Opportunity Representative. She joined OEP in 1990.

While working full-time at the Lab, she earned her AAS from Suffolk, her B.S. from St. Joseph's College and her MBA from Dowling College.

## Leaving the Lab — After 35 Years or More

# Jim Costanzo, Reactor Division

When Jim Costanzo was nearing graduation from New York's Agricultural & Technical College at Farmingdale, he knew that he was one of the lucky few who, before graduation, already had a job lined up for after.

Little did he know that the Lab would be his only civilian employer, that he would have an almost 38-year BNL career, and that he would spend all of it in the Reactor Division.

With an associate's in applied science, "I graduated on June 18, 1955, started work on the 20th and became a father for the first time that July — now that was planning," muses Costanzo, who is retiring next Wednesday, March 31, as a reactor support specialist.

Born in Bellport, raised in Patchogue, and a Korean War veteran of the U.S. Navy who made a world cruise through the Panama and Suez Canals aboard the U.S.S. Worcester, Costanzo came home after four years of service, to complete his education under the G.I. Bill.

"In the Navy, I was an electronics technician, responsible for controlling the firing of the big guns, so that is what got me interested in specializing in industrial instrumentation at Farmingdale," he explains.

### Job Promise

Promised a job in March 1955, Costanzo started work that June as a technician B in the Reactor Instrumentation Group, installing and modifying instruments for the world's first reactor for peacetime

research and BNL's first, the Brookhaven Graphite Research Reactor.

"The Graphite Reactor was just a big cube of graphite with air flowing through it — nothing as innovative and challenging as the HFBR," comments Costanzo. "The HFBR has many more and different instruments in the control room than did the Graphite Reactor, and, as the operating regulations have increased, especially after Three Mile Island, so have the number of instruments and their complexity."

After the Graphite Reactor, which operated from 1950 to 1968, but before the HFBR, which came on line in 1965, Costanzo helped in the commissioning of the Medical Research Reactor, in 1959. "I remember working until 3 or 4 o'clock in the morning putting that one into service," he says.

### Promotion Chain

While installing, maintaining and upgrading the instrumentation that controls each reactor and, hence, its chain reaction, Costanzo was given a chain of promotions: to a technician A in December 1956, a senior lab technician in June 1958, and a senior technician in January 1959. He first became a technical specialist III and then a II in July 1964 and 1968, respectively. In July 1970, he was named a technical associate II and, in November 1973, a technical associate I.

After spending over 30 years working hands-on with reactor instruments, the last 20 or so as project

leader for reactor-instrument modifications, Costanzo moved into the Reactor Division's Quality Assurance Group almost four years ago and received his final promotion in October 1991.

Within that group, he has been primarily responsible for Reactor Division calibrations: making sure that all tools and instruments are regularly certified that they properly measure, within their specifications, whatever quantity they are supposed to gauge. In addition to evaluating the Division's procedures for calibrating, using, maintaining and upgrading instruments, Costanzo helps perform quality-assurance inspections and audits, to evaluate the performance and effectiveness of these procedures.

### ERC Member

Besides his duties within the Reactor Division, Costanzo was selected by the Laboratory Director to serve on BNL's Employee Relations Committee, 1983-87. "Since the Lab has been good to me, I thought I could help other employees who didn't know where to turn when they had problems that they couldn't resolve with their supervisors." For almost a decade, almost a decade ago, another duty for Costanzo was serving on the electronic stock committee, which did product evaluation for the Supply & Materiel Division.

### Back With the Goods

About his retirement, Costanzo plans on "playing it by ear" with his wife Lorraine: "Maybe we'll do some traveling in our van, maybe I'll buy another boat and do some fishing and clamming on the bay."

While their son James just became the proud father of his second son and their second grandson, the Costanzos don't have far to go to visit them, as both families live in Patchogue. Their daughter Linda, however, lives in Boston and is about to open an Italian restaurant with her husband.

While Costanzo does plan on doing a little gardening in his retirement, it won't be on the scale of what he did after work and on weekends until 1988, helping his late father till the 14 inches of topsoil on the family nursery in Brookhaven Hamlet. While most of the 15 acres was sold to a developer, "My mother still lives on the property, so I'll continue to help her," he says.

To his friends and soon-to-be former coworkers on site, Costanzo promises, "I'll be back — with the goods from Fritzsche's bakery."

Lab will neither initiate nor tolerate any form of retaliation against those who register such complaints," adds Foster.

To initiate an ES&H investigation, Foster will contact SEP Head Robert Casey, who will assign an appropriate SEP staffer to the case and, based on the nature of the problem, determine how quickly it must be resolved.

The investigation will include not only a study of the workplace where the violation was reported to occur, but also a look at how the problem had been addressed within the organization. When the problem is resolved, Foster will contact the person who filed the complaint.

If the outcome is still not to the individual's satisfaction, then, as in the past, DOE's Brookhaven Area Office, Bldg. 464, Ext. 2405, may be called upon.

According to Casey, involving the Employee Relations Counselor in employees' ES&H concerns was brought about as a result of a new DOE requirement.

As a result, he concludes, "Employees and others working at BNL now have one more person on site to whom they can turn to get a review of any unresolved problems that they may have with their workplace environment or concerns about their personal safety and health. Having ES&H problems taken care of locally, quickly and directly benefits not only the person who brought the problem to our attention, but also the entire Lab community."

to purchase equipment and contract with the private sector for engineering and other services.

For example, to improve the safety of the operation and maintenance of the Soviet nuclear power plants, BNL will contract to purchase a computer-based training simulator for the Ukrainian reactor operators and will provide them with instruction on its use. All U.S. nuclear power plants have these sophisticated training tools, which allow personnel to simulate accidents for training purposes.

In addition to human error, design deficiencies played a role in the Chernobyl accident. Under the INSPRO program, the flaws in RMBK reactors that must be corrected include: a potentially unstable reactor design, along with poorly designed emergency-shutdown systems; lack of separation in critical electrical and fluid systems, and susceptibility of certain crucial safety systems to common-cause failures; little or no fire protection; and, most importantly, lack of a containment system, which would prevent the release of radioactivity into the environment in case of an accident.

While VVER designs have safer features than their sister Chernobyl-style reactors, they are still considered substandard in terms of safety. Design modifications under the new initiative allow RMBKs to operate only temporarily, but many VVER reactors can be adapted for longer-term use.

### Private Sector Help

The bulk of the safety improvement work will be subcontracted to the private sector, with U.S. companies making competitive bids on specific projects. Two Russian firms will also provide technical assistance. For each safety problem, several experts from the U.S., along with experts from Russia and the other Eastern European countries, will discuss alternatives and strategies, with the goal of deciding upon mutually agreeable solutions.

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## Healthline Lecture

# Early Detection Key to Surviving Testicular and Prostate Cancers

Despite the fact that early detection is key to surviving testicular and prostate cancers, men often shy away from exams for these cancers: They fear that, if cancer is detected, they will then face disfigurement or impotency as a result of treatment.

In not seeking early medical attention, however, what many men who develop these cancers must face instead is an early death.

In discussing "Testicular and Prostate Cancers," during the next Healthline lecture, urologist Wayne Waltzer will stress not only the importance of regular exams for these cancers, but also the advances in treatment that have extended life expectancy rates and made substantial progress in preserving potency.

Sponsored by the Health Promotion Program (HPP) of the Occupational Medicine Clinic, Waltzer's talk will take place on Tuesday, March 30, from noon to 1 p.m. in Berkner Hall. All are invited. Audiotapes of the lecture will be available afterwards in the Research Library.

Although it is rare, cancer of the testes is the most common cancer in males age 15-34 years. Since the turn of the century, the rate of testicular cancer began to rise, and its incidence has nearly doubled in the past 20 years. Today, some 1,000 men, most under 45, are diagnosed with the disease, and about 150 die of it each year.

The most prevalent cancer in men over age 65, prostate cancer is the most common of all cancers in men, whose lifetime odds of developing it are 1 in 10. The rate of prostate cancer, too, has been on the rise, especially in black men. Each year, some 122,000 new cases are diagnosed and 32,000 men die from the disease in the United States.

As Waltzer will discuss, medical, surgical and radiation treatment of both cancers has been dramatically improved over the years, so that, now, 90 percent of testicular cancer patients and 80 percent of those with prostate cancer are cured — but only if they were diagnosed early in the course of each disease. So, he will stress the importance of regular testicular self-examination and rectal examination of the prostate.

Wayne Waltzer, M.D., is a professor of urology and surgery at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, and the Vice Chairman of the Department of Urology within Stony Brook's Health Sciences Center. Board certified in urology and surgery, he specializes in urological oncology, kidney transplantation and reconstructive surgery.
