

From Record Drought to Snowfall – In '93 We Had It All


A blizzard, a heat wave and the driest summer on record characterized the weather at BNL in 1993, the 44th year that the Lab has kept meteorological records.

"It was a year of diversity," said Victor Cassella, a meteorologist in the Department of Applied Sciences' Oceanographic and Atmospheric Sciences Division. "No particular pattern emerged. The annual average temperature was close to normal, and, for the third consecutive year, annual precipitation was below normal."

Among the year's most extreme weather conditions were the blizzard of March 13, which dumped 22.86 centimeters (9 inches) of snow and 5.08 cm (2 inches) of rain over Long Island and brought the second lowest barometric pressure ever recorded at BNL.

May through August was the driest four-month period on record, with precipitation totaling 16.59 cm (6.53 inches), less than half the average for these months. This was also the sec-

ond warmest summer on record, with an average temperature of 20.1°C (see thermometer for conversion to Fahrenheit) for the same four months.



July was a sizzler, with seven out of ten consecutive days bringing temperatures over 32.2°C, starting on July 4. Also, the month brought one record high temperature of 37.5°C on July 10. The highest temperature ever recorded at BNL was 38.1°C on July 22, 1957.

Other record highs in 1993 were: January 5, 15.6°C; June 19, 33.1°C; August 25, 26, and 27, 33.3°C, 32.8°C, and 33.9°C, respectively; and November 14 and 15, 21.1°C and 25.6°C, respectively.

Four low-temperature records were set during the year, three in February: On February 6, the thermometer fell to -20.3°C, the next day it dipped to -22.8°C, and on February 20, it plummeted to -15.8°C. The other record low, -10.8°C, occurred on November 26.

Also, for the first time in five years,


Brookhaven had a white December, with 20.32 cm (8 inches) of snow. Total precipitation for the year, however, was only 108.97 cm (42.9 inches), compared to the yearly average of 122.68 cm (48.3 inches).

For 1994, Cassella predicts a colder winter than usual, and an above-average annual snowfall. "Judging by the first part of 1994, we're in for a long, cold winter," he said.

BNL meteorologists will eventually be connected by Ethernet and radio transmitter to the new National Weather Service Forecast Office on site. "When those connections are in place, we hope to work more closely together," Cassella said. "The presence of the National Weather Service here certainly enhances BNL's meteorological capabilities."
