## NASH TALKJ ON WORLD FEDERATION

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 25, 1948

On Wednesday, August 18, in the auditorium of the Bellport High-School, Vernon Nash, Vice-President and Director of Special Projects of United World Federalists, Inc., spoke to over one hundred supporters of the world government movement under the auspices of the Great South Bay Chapter of UWF with headquarters in Bellport.

Mr. Nash emphasized the widening interest in this country and abroad in the world government idea and examined the essential common factors which have characterized successful movements of this sort in the past. Admitting that many obstacles lie in the way of those who seek a world federation under law and with powers sufficient to prevent war, Mr. Nash pointed out that most great popular movements have achieved their objectives in spite of every evidence that they would fail. "If you believe the job needs to be done, you will find the way to do it," he said, "but above all you must believe, you must spread your beliefs among your friends, and you must join with them in an effort to persuade others to believe."

According to the experts now is the time to put in your grass seed and take care of that lawn. BERA has made arrangements with Ed Hunter, Ground Maintenance, who has kindly offered to purchase grass seed and fertilizer for members of the Association.

The grass seed purchased will be 75% red fescue (ilahee strain), 20% Canada bluegrass, 5% Red Top (recleaned).

The following amounts of grass seed and fertilizer are recommended:

1. Grass Seed: 3 lbs. to 1000 sq. ft.

\$.57 per lb.

2. Fertilizer (new seeding):

Good Soil - 10 lbs. to 1000 sq. ft. Poor Soil - 20 lbs. to 1000 sq. ft.

3. Fertilizer (lawn maintenance):

Good Lawns - 5 lbs. to 1000 sq. ft. Medium-Poor Lawns - 10 lbs. to 1000 sq. ft.

4. Renovation of Existing Lawns - Half the above amounts.

5. Specific instructions on care of lawns, written by Ed Hunter, may be obtained from Barry Mines, Adm. "B".

Minimum order will be 1 lb. of grass seed or 100 lbs. of fertilizer. You will be informed when purchases have been received, at which time they may be picked up at T-423, the first building west of Firehouse #2. At the same time you will be given a bill which is to be paid to the concern from which the goods were purchased.

All orders must be at the Recreation Office, GYM, not later than Monday, August 30th.
