"LIFE AND 1/2 LIFE" CASTING CONTINUES

Real progress has been made by the Brookhaven Theatre Group in preparing their next presentation, "Life and 1/2 Life", according to Edward D. Nestor (Budget), chairman of the Script Committee. John F. Binnington (Library) has been cast in the male lead as an ambitious but shy youth named "Edgar". Ben-Ami Lipetz (Library) has been assigned the part of "Von Wilhelm", the astute laboratory watchdog, and Justyna C. Zaborowski (Nuclear Reactor) will assume the role of "Mrs. Kopper", the excitable good-will ambassador.

Several of the principle character roles are still open and casting will continue until all parts have been assigned.

The script, which is being written by Saul J. Harris (Nuclear Reactor) and John Karas (Accelerator), is in the final stages and should be completed in about a week according to Mr. Harris. George Cox (Photography) is designing the sets. Music Director Roy Sutter (Purchasing), who has composed several songs for the production, would like to have all musicians attend a meeting Wednesday at 5:30 p.m., September 22, in the large theatre, 12 Brookhaven Avenue, so that plans can be made for the organization of an orchestra.
