ELECTION INFORMATION

The Personnel Department has furnished the following information which will be of interest to prospective voters.

Voting requirements for persons having moved to this area include:

Residence in New York State for one year.

Residence in Suffolk County for four months. Residence in the Election District for thirty days.

Those who meet the residence requirements must register in their Election District. Since the dates, hours and places for registry vary with the Election Districts, it is urged that your local village clerk be consulted for this information without delay. Election Day occurs this year on November 2, and normally registration records are closed three to four weeks prior to Election Day.

If any potential voters are exercising the right to vote for the first time, having arrived at the age of twenty-one since the last national election, they will be required to show a birth certificate. In addition, they must show a diploma from grammar, high school, or college in connection with a literacy qualification. If such a document is not available, a short literacy test is given at the polling (Contd. on Page 3)

At 12:30 midnight, Alfred J. Brunini, leader of Maintenance Utilities Group offered to have the necessary repairs made on the transformer immediately, if they were considered necessary. In order to avoid the night work the Meteorological Group decided to use the portable units. On Sunday, the technicians and Mr. Daniel Mazzarella spent several hours in maintaining the service and according to the Group Leader, they deserve considerable credit forther ingenuity and resourcefulness.
