A FEDERAL OFFENSE!

In any event, it was only a matter of hours before an investigation by the Laboratory and Security officers narrowed the probable thief down to one of two men and referred the case to the F.B.I.

On September 14, the F.B.I. issued warrants, and on September 20 advised that one individual had been captured and had confessed. He is now awaiting trial before a Federal Court.

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**BOATING COURSES
OFFERED**

Mr. George N. Coulter, Commander of the Great South Bay Power Squadron, has announced schedules for the free courses in Piloting and Small Boat Handling offered by the Squadron each year. This course, which is intended primarily for power boat owners and is a prerequisite to joining the Squadron, is nevertheless open to all men and women who are interested in any phase of boating. The course covers topics such as Federal laws, safety requirements, rules of the road, seamanship, adjustment and use of the compass, and chart reading.

This year the course will be taught in three sections, at Patchogue, Bay Shore and Babylon High Schools on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings. The same lectures are given at all three places so that a member of the Patchogue class, for example, who misses a Monday lesson, can make it up by going to Bay Shore on Wednesday or Babylon on Thursday. Registration will be held at Patchogue High School on Monday, October 4 at 8 p.m. and at Bay Shore the 6th and Babylon the 7th.
