In order that all participants will have an opportunity to win a prize, there will be a series of novel events, as follows:

CREDIT WHERE CREDIT
IS DUE

When Mr. Frank Murgatroyd and Mr. George M. Stoll, Jr. of the Utilities Maintenance Group, were called into the Laboratory to repair storm damage on the night of September 25, 1948, they had no idea of the amount of work involved. They found that the electrical storm had caused trouble in seven different places throughout the Site; the transformer supplying power to the Meteorology Building was burned out, street lighting and flood lights had been burned out in several sections, all the obstruction lights on both the steel weather towers were out and the control circuit of the siren was shorted.

To repair the damage, Mr. Murgatroyd and Mr. Stoll had to provide temporary equipment to operate the weather instruments, make repairs, including climbing the small tower, so that the obstruction lights would operate and also climb poles at various points throughout the Site to repair the street lighting system.

A great deal of the work was done while it was still raining and pitch dark, and it was 2 a.m. Sunday morning before they had completed their work and were able to go home.

These staff members are to be congratulated on the quiet and efficient manner in which they performed the extra duties.
