SIDELIGHTS ON GEN, EISENHOWER'S VISIT

Laboratoryites are still talking about the visit of the College Presidents and Trustees last Wednesday and especially about the friendliness of Columbia's famous president, General Dwight D. Eisenhower,

The visit was planned weeks in advance and numerous schedules were set up and revised in anticipation of the event. Some members of the staff worked on Columbus Day to formulate the final plans which enabled the distinguished visitors to see Brookhaven and Brookhaven employees to see the visitors with- . out undue confusion.

A burst of applause greeted General Eisenhower when he entered the gymnasium to meet the Brookhaven staff and again when he gave the "thumbs-up" sign as he left. Although he was sincerely impressed with seientific developments and plans at Brookhaven the General was also concerned about lunch. A most reliable source reports that he was as interested as any soldier you have ever heard in the answer to a most important question, "When do we eat?"

The protective helmets given the visitors at the pile were nothing new to the General, but commenting on his inauguration to the Presidency of Colum-

GEOLOGY PAYS OFF

The geologic observation well being driven north of the Apartment Area was down several hundred feet when "Joe" Puig conceived the bright idea of making up a pool on the depth at which they would strike bedrock.

All the geologists, the well-drillers, a few nurses from the Medical Department, and one or two other individuals, fifteen in all, each contributed \$1.00 and submitted their estimates.

Wallace deLaguna, head of the Geological Group, estimated a depth of 1560 feet, and was elated last week when the drill struck bedrock at 1562 feet. In fact, "Wally" stated that the fourteen tons of drill pipe had probably stretch ed two feet.

Having collected the \$15 in the pool, "Wally" was host at a party held at Miss Louise Ropp's apartment on the Site, and, at last reports, was some \$3.26 in the red.

The latest information is that the depth of the well is now in the neighborhood of 1,600 feet and the drill is bringing up fragments of Chinese laundry tickets.

bia University the day before, General Eisenhower questioned wryly--"Haven't you got a square one for me? I had a square one yesterday." After he listened intently to information about the pile, he asked Dr. Borst to tell him about heavy water and why it is so important. Then he spent a few intriguing moments shouting up the air stack and hearing the echo of his own voice.

After his visit to the Particle Physics Department, General Eisenhower was not to be deterred from discussing the Cloud Chamber because he couldn't remember its technical designation. He referred to it instead simply as the "thunder machine."

The General insisted on riding with a different chauffeur each time he and the other visitors went from building to building so he could meet each of them. He also stopped to talk with several of his "buddies", among old whom were ex-Lieutenant Hank Veillette and ex-Captain Eddie Downs of Nuclear Interaction. The three of them chatted for a few minutes about the old army days and then the General asked about their present work and how they liked it. He remembered the letter he had sent to Hank on a previous occasion and on a picture which Eddie asked him to autographs he wrote, "To Captain Eddie Downs, From a Comrade in Arms, Dwight D. Eisenhower''.

The General talked to ex-Captain Julie Burritt of Information and Publications for about ten minutes before leaving the site. His parting words to her might well have been the expression of our own sentiments toward him. "It's been nice meeting an old soldier again."
