FIRST GRAPHITE FUT INTO PLACE AT FILE

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 1948

The first block of graphite in the atomic pile was set into place Monday morning, November 8, before a small delegation of scientists and officials representing the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, Associated Universities, Inc., Brookhaven National Laboratory and The H. K. Ferguson Company.

Signifying the start of the final phase of the construction program, the graphite block--the first of more than 60,000 that will follow--was placed into the nuclear reactor by Wilbur E. Kelley, manager of the New York Operations Office of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission.

The blocks of graphite now being set in the pile will contain the actual chain reaction that will take place within the pile structure. In this process, the graphite serves as a moderator, and various instruments and moveable strips of a neutron absorbing material are used to control the reaction.

Among those honored in the brief ceremony in the pile structure was Dr. Lyle B. Borst, chairman of the Brookhaven Nuclear Reactor Project, under whose supervision the pile was designed. Included in the attendance were Eldon C. Shoup, vice-president of Associated Universities, Inc.; Dr. Leland J. Haworth, director of Brookhaven National Laboratory, and about 20 engineers and scientists directly connected with the pile project.
