DR. MILTON G. WHITE NAMED ACCELERATOR CHAIRMAN

Dr. Milton G. White of Princeton University has been appointed Chairman of the Accelerator Project, according to Dr. Leland J. Haworth, director. Dr. White succeeds Dr. M. Stanley Livingston, who was on leave from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Dr. White will supervise the design and construction of all Brookhaven accelerators including the 3-billion electron volt Cosmotron, which will take approximately three years to build at a total cost of about \$3,000,000. This huge nuclear machine, which will whirl protons at a speed sufficient to generate artificial cosmic rays, will be used to obtain additional basic information about the nature and structure of the atom.

Dr. White received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of California in 1931 and was a Teaching Assistant at the same University until 1922, when he became a Coffin Fellow. In 1935 he received his Doctorate and was then awarded a National Research Council Fellowship to Princeton University. In 1937 he became an instructor there and in 1938 an assistant professor.

While at Princeton, Dr. White helped design and build the University's first

BERA ANNUAL ELECTION IN DECEMBER

cyclotron, parts of which were eventually dismantled and shipped to Los Alamos for work on the atom bomb.

Dr. White spent the war years in radar research. In 1940 he helped to organize the Radiation Laboratory at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology where he became a division head and later worked in England. He received a Certificate of Merit for his war service.

In 1935 Dr. White married Miss Elizabeth Ann Highley, a classmate at the University of California. Dr. and Mrs. White now live with their three children in Princeton, New Jersey.
