DRAMATIC CLUB PRESENTATION JANUARY 13 AND 14

The BNL Dramatic Club announced today that its presentation, "Life and Half-Life", written by Saul Harris and John Karas, will be shown in the theatre on January 13th and 14th. Tickets will be on sale at an early date.

"Life and Half-Life", a travesty on life at Brookhaven in three acts and eight scenes, has a cast of thirty-five and contains fifteen original musical numbers composed by George Cox, Balfour Golden, Roy Sutter, Saul Harris and Leonard Heyman.

Under the direction of Leonard Heyman, the cast has been enthusiastically rehearsing every week since early in September. Roy Sutter has been directing the rehearsal of the musical numbers and George Cox has been designing and constructing the sets. John Weil will be in charge of stage lighting.

DR. FACKENTHAL NAMED AUI PRESIDENT

Dr. Frank D. Fackenthal, until recently Acting President of Columbia University, New York City, has been named President of Associated Universities, Inc., the management corporation which operates Brookhaven National Laboratory. Dr. Fackenthal will remain Chairman of the Trustees' Committee on Education, of Columbia, and will continue to keep an office at the university.

The announcement of Dr. Fackenthal's acceptance of his appointment was made by Mr. Edward Reynolds, administrative vice-president of Harvard University, who is retiring as President of Associated Universities. He said, "Associated Universities, Inc. is most fortunate to be able to entrust supervision of the continuing development of Brookhaven National Laboratory to a man whose administrative experience has been so thoroughly tried and proven. Dr. Fackenthal's willingness to volunteer his services is further testimony of the great opportunity which all of us see in the program of scientific research which Brookhaven is undertaking under the directorship of Dr. Leland J. Haworth."

Mr. Reynolds has been President of Associated Universities from the beginning and has held two

one-year terms. He will continue service with A.U.I. as a member of the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Fackenthal served for three years as acting president of Columbia, from September 30, 1945 to June 5, 1948, until General of the Army Dwight D. Eisenhower succeeded him as chief executive. He was provost of the University from 1937 to 1945.

In 1948 Dr. Fackenthal was the recipient of the Alexander Hamilton medal awarded annually by the Association of Alumni of Columbia College for "distinguished service and accomplishment"-a tribute to his devotion to his alma mater since 1906 when he joined the University organization.

He has been accorded many honors by American institutions including honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws, awarded by Princeton, Syracuse, and Rutgers Universities, and Franklin and Marshall College, as well as the honorary Doctor of Letters from Columbia. He recently received the Netherlands decoration of officers in the Order of Orange-Nassau.

As provost, and later as acting president, Dr. Fackenthal assumed heavy responsibilities in guiding Columbia University through the war and post-war periods. Under his leadership the post-war years were made vigorously successful. New schools and departments were established in keeping with Columbia's role as an all-embracing educational institution.
