STAFF MEMBERS CLEAR GROUND FOR SABINES HOUSE

More than a dozen staff members were on hand Saturday, January 8, at the site where the house will be built for George P. Sabine, Laboratory patrolman, whose home was completely destroyed by fire.

The workers spent most of the day razing the chimney, removing charred wood and chopping down trees in preparation for ground leveling which will be done by a bull-dozer loaned by the Brookhaven Highway Department.

Offers for assistance in building the house are being received daily. Gus Schmidt's Paint Shop of Patchogue has donated 10 gallons of paint. The Surdi Electric Company of Holtsville has offered to do all of the house wiring without charge and Mr. Peter Snyder of the law firm of Pelletreau & Pelletreau has volunteered to make the title search.

The public has responded enthusiastically to the plan to provide a home for the Sabines and while many staff members have volunteered their services, there is still need for additional help and anyone who wishes to participate should communicate with Budd Pollock, Ext. 423.

WINTER DRIVING

The winter months bring hazardous driving conditions and the safe driver proceeds with caution on ice or snow-covered roads.

If the safe-driving rules listed below are carefully followed by all drivers, accidents will be reduced to a minimum.

- 1. Get the "feel" of the road before you start outyou can do this by trying your brakes while driving slowly and away from traffic.
- 2. Adjust your speed to road and weather conditions. Slow down on wet, snowy and icy roads so you can stop when you have to.
- 3. Use tire chains on ice and snow. They cut down braking distances as much as 40 or 50 per cent. Chains are not a cure-all for winter accidents, but they will help the careful driver.
- 4. Keep your windshield and windows clear of snow and ice, fog and frost. Be sure your headlights, windshield wipers, and defrosters are in good working condition. You have to see danger to avoid it!
- 5. When you have to stop, pump your brakes up and down--jamming them on may lock them and throw your vehicle into a skid.
- 6. Follow other vehicles at a safe distance remember that it takes from three to twelve times as long to stop on snow and ice as it does on dry concrete.
