BERA LIBRARY CONTAINS MANY GOOD BOOKS

"The Bulletin Board"
has no literary critic on
its staff, yet the urge to
tell BERA members about
the good books on the
shelves of the Library is
too strong to resist.

The writer recently read
"The Young Lions" and
thinks that this book and
"The Naked and the Dead"
are two of the best books
that have been written
about World War II.

"The Naked and the
Dead" traces the course
of a small group of G.I.'s
on a special mission on
one island in the Pacific.
Flash-backs detail the
events in the lives of the
members of the group and
reveal many of the causes
for each individual's ac-
tion in conflict. It will be
enjoyed more by the male
animal, as it uses pretty
rugged language through-
out.

"The Young Lions", on
the other hand, follows
the fortunes of three main
characters: a Nazi youth
who had been a ski in-
structor before the war;
an American who had been
in theatrical and movie
work, accustomed to the
nicer things in life that
money can buy; and an
American youth of poor
parentage.

The book describes the
effect of mass living
(Army life) on the char-
acters of all three and
follows them from their
induction to the war's end.
From the first page to the
last, it is packed with ac-
tion, on the beach at Nor-
mandy, through France
and across the Rhine into
Germany, with descrip-
tions of individual battles
and an amazing under-
standing of military tac-
tics. A splendid book,
recommended for all.
