## GOLF LADDER TOURNAMENT

The rules governing the golf ladder tournament announced last week, which will start April 16 and finish October 1, will be as follows:

A drawing will be made of all golfers for which a handicap is available from tournaments engaged in last year for places on the ladder. A challenge may be issued by players to anyone two places or less above them in the standings. All matches will be played on handicap basis. Three-quarters of the difference in handicaps will be used.

The challenged player must accept the challenge within a week and the match must be played off within the next succeeding week or a forfeit can be claimed by the challenger. Participants are only obliged to accept one challenge a week.

Players without an established handicap must submit three score cards to Dick Vogt and then start at the bottom of the ladder.

The following players are listed in the order shown below based on last year's records. The numbers at the left indicate the position, which was selected by lot, and the right-hand figures indicate the player's handicap.

## BOOKS ON BERA LIBRARY SHELVES

"The Big Fisherman" by Lloyd C. Douglas, one of the many current books on the BERA Circulating Library shelves, is the story of Simon called Peter, the most lovable and human of the Apostles and is recommended for everyone. It has been the sales leader in book stores throughout the U.S. for many weeks.

This reviewer, having read with great pleasure Douglas's "Magnificent Obsession" and "The Robè", regards "The Big Fisherman" as the best book of the three.

Perhaps others have been as impatient as I have been when attempting to read the Bible, and therefore found difficulty in translating Biblical language into every day words.

If so, "The Big Fisherman", Simon Peter's story written in narrative fiction style, will bring Peter and his associates to life in a pleasing fashion. In fact, Douglas's style of telling the story from the time of Simon Peter's life as a rough, profane, roistering fisherman in Gallilea through his acceptance of faith and his execution by the Romans is a revelation and an inspiration.

Reading this book again demonstrates that all of the stories ever written have first appeared in the Bible.
