"The value of science to humanity has never been more striking, nor have the dangers of misuse been greater. The special knowledge possessed by scientists accentuates their responsibilities concerning the interaction of science with social and political organizations. In recognition of these responsibilities the Association of Brookhaven Scientists is formed to promote the attainment and use of scientific and technological advances in the best interests of mankind.

ELEPHANT AND CASTLE

This book should be a textbook for the impatient reader who likes to skip detail. Not that the thread of the story is lost when descriptions and character delineations are avoided, but because the story is so interesting and the style so intriguing that you want to go back and read each word.

The story of a young cultured Englishwoman who becomes interested in the welfare of a boy from the slums of London, to such an extent that she finally marries him, provides an excuse for character studies of people from all walks of life. Both the young lady and the boy have characteristics that the other lacks and needs. They supplement each other and primarily are a good match. Strangely enough, the young man in the end proves to be the strongest character and the gradual understanding of this fact carries the reader from page to page with never abating interest. This is the only book that announces the climax, a murder, in advance, that this reviewer has enjoyed.

Elephant and Castle, which incidentally is the name of an inn frequented by some of the characters, is available at the BEKA rental library in the gymnasium.

take; to study the implications of scientific discoveries and developments which appear likely to influence the general welfare of mankind; to work for widespread utilization of those that are beneficial and adequate control of those that may be dangerous or harmful; to promote conditions in society under which science can flourish; to disseminate facts necessary for intelligent conclusions concerning the social significance of knowledge in science, and counter misinformation with scientific fact; to keep its members informed of national and international developments which affect the realization of its basic purpose, and to cooperate with other organizations in achieving it.

"The problems which society must solve in order to achieve efficient utilization of its scientific knowledge are many. The atomic bomb and bacteriological weapons have made the elimination of war a necessity for the survival of civilization. In the particular field of nuclear energy, an effective and workable system of world control based on full cooperation of all nations must be achieved. For the future of science, the spirit of free inquiry, free interchange of information, and international cooperation traditional among scientists must be promoted. For the future of society this spirit must be extended to wider fields of mutual understanding among men. It is toward the solution of these and other similar problems that the main effort of the Association of Brookhaven Scientists will be directed."
