BOCKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"CHEAPER BY THE DOZEN" - by Frank B. Gilbreth Jr. and Ernestine Gilbreth Carey-

This is the saga of the Gilbreth family. Frank B. Gilbreth was father of time studies and, incidentally, of 12 children. He had no inhibitions, obviously. He was proud of his time studies and doubly proud of his 12 children and took every opportunity to exhibit both to any audience that would pay attention.

This is a hilarious book and it is the leading seller, non-fiction, according to the New York Herald Tribune and the New York Times.

It is difficult to pick out any particular passage in the book to highlight, but Father's attempt to make time studies through motion pictures of the operations of removing his childrens' tonsils is perhaps as amusing as any. Father's reaction to the same operation performed on himself affords laughter for the children and the reader.

The visit of the psychiatrist to the Gilbreth family is equally amusing, as the children, aware in advance of the visit, were primed with answers to every question. Needless to say, the answers were pat and the psychiatrist, a woman, finally exclaimed, "The hell with it!"

"Cheaper by the Dozen" is not the type of "joke" book that needs to be taken in small doses. Readers invariably start and finish the book the same day.
