HOW MUCH DO YOU KNOW ABOUT YOUR FELLOW WORKER?

If a medal were to be presented to the individual with the longest term of service on the site, George C. Wagner would probably be the recipient. George was employed as a civilian employee, an architectural designer, by the U. S. Army and came to Upton before the first Army building was erected.

Born in Jamaica, L. I., George graduated from Jamaica High School and Drake Architectural College. After graduation he became a partner in his father's building construction business and continued his study of architecture for several years, attending night classes at Columbia University.

George assisted in the design of most of the buildings that were erected here for World War II and the buildings that were erected when the Camp was transformed into a rehabilitation center.

When Associated Universities was considering Camp Upton as a site for the location of Brookhaven National Laboratory, George was assigned the task of gathering details relative to facilities available in surrounding villages such as schools, etc., and also worked with an engineer from Stone and Webster investigating water supply and other matters necessary to the establishment of a laboratory at this point.

When representatives of Associated Universities

visited the Camp, George was one of the group that conducted them around the site. He is now an architectural designer in the AF and PM Department. George is married and lives in a house he built in West Yaphank. He has three children: Alicia, 8; Virginia, 6 and Linda, 3.

If staff members who know George don't recognize him when they see him it is because he has lost about 25 pounds in the last several weeks. He spent every week-end and many hours after work since the project was started, cutting the patterns and directing the construction of the Sabine house. After obtaining this information, the writer wisely refrained from asking George whether he had any hobbies.

BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"HIGH TOWERS" by Thomas B. Costain - This is an historical novel that sticks close to facts. It is a story of the French in Montreal and New Orleans and in novel form outlines the true history of the leading family in Montreal, the Lemoynes. There were 10 brothers in this family and they all gave their lives to the advancement of France and her colonies.

The book covers the history of the beginning of New Orleans and detailed descriptions of the layout of that city and of Montreal and even goes so far as to describe the kind of weather that prevailed during that period in both cities. Woven into the history is a love story that will appeal to the romantically inclined. The lovers in this case being orphans, naturally draw sympathy.

In the opinion of this reviewer the book is fairly well written, but unrealistic in parts although it does contain some interesting sidelights on French politics under a monarchy. Again in the opinion of this reviewer, this book is not as interesting as its predecessor, "The Moneyman".
