BOOKS ON BERA  
RENTAL LIBRARY  
SHELVES

"WATCH THE NORTH-WIND RISE" by Robert Graves - With his tongue in his cheek, Robert Graves proceeds to dissect modern living, from home life to politics, in a fast-moving story that will delight Thorne Smith fans, and also interest anyone who thinks that many of our present day methods and modes are inadequate.

Graves' leading character is an English poet who is suddenly yanked ahead in time to a mythical settlement called New Crete, whose inhabitants have gone back to first principles. Money has been abolished because it had "misbehaved" in the past. Wars are fought without loss of life or suffering, a kind of rugby game, with the winner graciously conceding many disputed points.

Accustomed as we are to expecting a period of wild oats in our young people, the New Cretian idea of Nonsense Houses for the elderly, where they can cut up to their heart's content, has its virtues. The manufacture of paper has been stopped. Worthy writings are engraved on silver or gold. For the rest they use clay boards, slates, tally sticks or their memories--mainly their memories. In some respects New Crete compares favorably with Utopia.

The poet has difficulty at first, in accustoming himself to the many strange habits of the future world, but he finds the women beautiful, entirely uninhibited, and not too different from the 20th century women. He is somewhat embarrassed when he finds the the

ones that he is thrown with are witches capable of reading his mind. His romances are further cramped by the discovery that a girl from his flaming youth has preceded him onto New Crete and is still in the mood to pursue him.

A fantastic, amusing tale, that contains caustic criticisms, sugar-coated with satire, of present day man and his manner of living. BTM.
