SWIMMING POOL PASSES AVAILABLE

Swimming Pool passes are now available for members of the immediate families of employees of A.U.I., B.N.L. and A.E.C. (Brookhaven Area). These passes are for the purpose of making entry into and exit from the Site more convenient since they will replace the necessity of obtaining daily passes.

The passes are not transferable but the authorized holder may bring in two guests on his card. Each member of a family should have one. They are valid only when the pool is in scheduled operation.

A memorandum to the Security Office is all that is necessary to get as many passes as you need for members of your family. The pass will be laminated in plastic, just as your own I.D. card, if you wish. This is desirable especially when kids have pockets to stuff papers in.

The present pool schedule is as follows:

Mon. - 12 Noon to 7 p.m.
Tues. - 12 Noon to 9 p.m.
Wed. - 12 Noon to 9 p.m.
Thurs. - 12 Noon to 9 p.m.
Fri. - 12 Noon to 6 p.m.
Sat. - 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.
Sun. - Closed

A memorandum form is inserted in this edition for your convenience. Just fill it in and send it to the Security Office.

Note that the use of your own I.D. card is not affected. These passes are for members of your family.

BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"THE CHAIN" -

by Paul I. Wellman--

The text of the first sermon delivered by John Carlisle, hero of "The Chain", before the wealthy congregation of St. Alban's church in Jericho, Kansas, is "For ye make clean the outside of the cup and of the platter, but within they are full of extortion and excess." Not a new theme for a story but Paul I. Wellman has used it in a manner that shows at least that he has improved in his writing and grown up in his thinking since his last book, "The Walls of Jericho."

Many of the characters that appeared in the first book have a place in "The Chain" but the main concern of the story is the struggle of the young minister to make the church a place of worship for everyone and a refuge for those that need solace, regardless of their station.

The church, in a neighborhood once desirable, but at the time of the story surrounded by slums, is supported by a group of wealthy parishoners led by the meat-packing plant owner, Todd Westcott. Westcott's daughter, a bold divorcee, finds Carlisle desirable as does the daughter of the former minister, but he is devoted to his calling. Although he managed to defeat the Church Vestry in a manner that will delight any reader, the forces working against him are too powerful. He finally is the victim of the people he is trying to help when they are incited to mob violence by scurrilous arti- (Contd. on Page 4)
