GOLF TOURNAMENT SATURDAY, MAY 21

The second BNL Golf Tournament of this season will be held Saturday, May 21, at the Bellport Country Club. Teeing-off time will be 9 a.m.

An entry fee will not be required, but a greens fee of \$2 must be paid to R. L. Vogt before teeing off.

Prizes will be awarded in the following contests:

1. Hole-in-one contest at the 4th hole. Two balls allowed. Prizes will be awarded to the winner and runner-up. The first ball played will count towards total 18 hole medal score. 2. Blind bogey event, where the players estimate their own net scores before leaving the first tee. Player closest to blind bogey figures selected by committee (generally between 70 and 80) is the winner.

3. Fewest putts - Keep a record of all putts made during your round. Shots outside the lippped surfaces of the putting greens are not considered putts. Prizes will be awarded to the winner and runner-up.

4. Driving contest at the 18th hole. One drive, drive used for medal score, and must remain on fairway.

5. Square hole contest -On the 11th hole there will

be a square defined near the green and all contestants whose drive stops within the confines of this square will win a golf ball.

"Murder for the Millions - edited by Frank Owens -

Described as a Harvest Horror and Homicide, this book contains more than 30 short stories that will delight the who-dun-it fans. Stories by such well known writers as Wilbur Daniel Steele, Mignon Eberhart, Damon Runyon, James M. Cain, Ellery Queen and others, contain many strange and gory methods of eliminating unwanted persons.

Chemists will enjoy Freeman Will Croft's story of a chemist who had planned the perfect crime but was trapped by a clue that developed from one of his own scientific instruments. The story of the old lady who was robbed of a valuable gem and murdered serves as further proof that it is next to impossible to plan a crime without leaving a clue.

Constant readers of mystery stories will probably find some in this book that they have read previously but most of them are worth reading again.

The advantage of short stories is that the reader need not stay up all night to find out how they end. Mystery stories are the hardest kind of tales to put aside before you find out whether the criminal gets his just deserts and "Murder for the Millions" fills the need for something to read when time is short.
