BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"Hearth and Eagle" - by Anya Seton --

Only old timers will remember Mrs. E.D.E.N. Southworth, so for the benefit of the younger generation, let it be here recorded that in her books an expression like "the grim mask of passion" would pass unnoticed. Had it appeared in the early chapters of "Hearth and Eagle", this review would not have been written.

This, perhaps, is the worst expression used in the story, but in keeping with it there are outlines of seven births, one still-birth, five violent storms, two fires, three battles with the waves, one act of adultery and one coy suggestion of incest.

With these interesting (?) events, Anya Seton has put together (not in the best Joseph C. Lincoln style) a story of New England, which follows the life and fortunes of one Hesper Honeywood (male) who lived in Marblehead, Mass.

The story opens in 1846 with a flash-back to the 17th century, which brings in an interesting description of the first settlers of the town. Hesper's lifetime covers the period when the fishing industry as the town's died out main source of profit, to be replaced by shoe manuand then by facturing summer boarders and tourists.

A fairly interesting story with plenty of action, but Mrs. Southworth could have done a better job with the material used.
