Two balls will be played at fourth hole. First ball played will count towards total 18 hole medal score. Prizes will be awarded to the winner and runner-up.

Event #3 - Fewest Putts

The contestant with the least number of putts for 18 holes will receive three golf balls. Shots made any where outside of the clip- ped surface of green will not be considered putts.

BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"BEAU JAMES-The Life and Times of Jimmy Walker" by Gene Fowler -

This is the story of James J. Walker, one time mayor of New York City. Written by Gene Fowler, and colored by his friendship and liking for the former Mayor, the hectic days between the end of World War I and Roosevelt's first election are fully recorded.

Walker, possessing a magnetic personality that attracted both men and women, rode into the mayoralty of New York City on a wave of popularity that few candidates can command. With every opportunity, as mayor of the largest city in America, for fame and future political success, Walker, who really wanted to be an actor or song writer, proceeded to become more of a figure in the night life of the city than an able executive. His alienation from his wife and his romances with two actresses were known to his constituents but they were inclined to laugh off his escapades and he was elected to a second term.

Devoting little of his time to his administrative duties, Jimmy was warned by his political supporters that he must mend his ways, but he was inclined to pass off criticism with one of the wise cracks for which he was noted. The inevitable end of such a career could not be other than it was, and Jimmy, who never was convicted of accepting graft, was proven to have accepted favors from men who could profit by having a friend with power in the administration of the city's

affairs.

Finally brought up before Governor Roosevelt on fifteen charges of non-feasance, misfeasance and malfeasance, Jimmy retired under fire and for many years after was an unwilling resident of England, reluctant to return to America and face income tax investigations and lawsuits of creditors. His final return to New York and the ending of his romance with his last love, Betty Compton, are all a part of a life story that reads like fiction.

Only in America could a man of Walker's type be successful in reaching a position with responsibilities second only to those of the President, and Gene Fowler, who was as close to Jimmy as anyone could be, has faithfully set down all of the known facts of a career that is almost unbelievable.
