CHILDREN'S SWIMMING CLASSES START

The walls of the swimming pool echoed the sound of many youthful voices last Wednesday morning, as amid a great deal of splashing and cries of "who has my bathing suit" the first of a series of swimming classes for children got under way.

About twenty five children were on hand and Mrs. Marjorie Moog, A. R. C. Instructor, who will conduct the classes, formed them in groups according to their knowledge of swimming.

The beginners, starting at about five years old, were instructed from 9:00 to 10:00 a. m., learning to overcome f.ear of the water, buoyancy, position in the water, balance and coordinated stroking. Between 10:00 and 11:00 a.m. the older children were instructed in the proper arm and leg strokes, underwater swimming, div ing and rescue skills.

Many of the children show great promise of having their names added to the list of BNL championship swimmers.

BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"PRAIRIE AVENUE" by Arthur Meeker

Prairie Avenue is a story of the men of great wealth who made Chicago, and of their wives, children and grandchildren.

Ned Ramsey, whose father had periods of afflu ence followed inevitably by long dry periods when only the bare necessities of life were available, is twelve years old when the story opens in 1880. His father is on the verge of another time of needed economy and his parents have decided that Ned must live with his mo ther's brother, Uncle Hiram Stack, a wealthy lumber yard owner.

Uncle Hiram and his wife, Aunt Lydia, live on Prairie Avenue where all the wealthy families reside, in a house that once belonged to Ned's father, and it is with a feeling of utter lonesomeness that Ned arrives there on a winter night and is escortted to bed without having seen his three young cousins.

Before the first winter has passed, Ned has ad justed himself to the family ways and has grown fond of his cousing Alimirawho is six months younger.

The tale of Ned's fortunes from 1880 to 1919 is a small part of the book. Aunt Lydia, a charming woman, dominates the story as well as the characters and her love affairs, which never are publicly disclosed, the tragic death of Uncle Hiram after an unexpected return home from a business trip, and her social NEW BOOKS IN LIBRARY

Meeker with his out lines of the modes and manners of the times and his descriptions of the houses and furnishings, provides a lifelike picture of Chicago in the early days. Altogether, an enchanting novel.
