BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"THE MAN WHO MADE FRIENDS WITH HIM-SELF", by Christopher Morley --

The best description of this novel was written by a reviewer who called it "A semantic love story of a couple who kept two volumes of the Shorter Oxford Dictionary under the bed."

Readers will find reference to the dictionary necessary to the full enjoyment of the story of Richard Tolman, a literary agent, and his mistress, Zoe, a psychoanalyst in the daytime and a delightful companion after working hours. Some words used will not be found in the dictionary but their sounds need no definition.

Tolman, a bachelor, lives in a small Long Island town called Wending Ways. The only other inhabitant of his domicile, besides the two cats, call ed Shall and Will "because so few people know them apart", is his colored maid, Mealie, who is fond of him because "he got no anti-Semitism for colored people.

His house provides a refuge for his two married nieces, twins who visit him once a year "when they get bored with their husbands, their parents, can openers, book clubs, rubber nipples and homogenized milk."

Tolman's thoughts, observations on life in general, are for the most part, amusing. He writes what he calls 1/20etry. Originally a typographical error, Richard and Zoe adopt the term to describe his "halfoetry" such as:

I used to burn But now I smolder That's how I learn

I'm growing older.

and

Most of what psychiatrists know

Was said to poets long ago

What mumble jumble they can make

Of what was plain to William Blake

Is there an analyst in the house?

Page Walter Mitty or Micky Mouse.

"Halfoetry" should become a part of the English language. There is more halfoetry written than poetry.

Among Tolman's few friends are the Cullens, members of the "electric" set of Wending Ways. The town is divided into two classes, those who use the electric railroad, the "electrics", and those who travel by steam train, the "steamers." Cullen, twice a grandfather, having reluctantly reached the autumn of life 🗠 is loth to admit it and makes a pass at Zoe despite his friendhsip for Richard.

reading this Anyone book for the story will be disappointed for it is, to use the words of Mr. Morley's Richard, "A deliberated arrangement of words to suggest the asdisarrangement of tute thought," but it is a pleasant literary discourse in the charming, whimsical and altogether excellent company of Christopher Morley.
