HENRY GEORGE BREWER, JR.

Staff members were shocked and grieved at the news of the sudden death early Sunday morning, August 14, from polio- myelitis, of Henry George Brewer, Jr. of 30 Park Avenue, Babylon, associ- ate electronic engineer in the Instrumentation and Health Physics Dept.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, August 17, at Germantown, Pa.

Mr. Brewer was born in Philadelphia, Pa. in 1918. He graduated from Germantown High School in 1936 and received a B.S. in physics from M.I.T. in 1940. During World War II he was em- ployed first as a physicist for the U. S. Government and then in the Radiation Laboratory of M.I.T., where he was engaged in work on toss bombing and on the designing and engi- neering of automatic air- borne gunlaying systems. He was also project engi- neer for AGL-1, AGL-2, APG-1 and APG-2 radar sets.

After the War ended, Mr. Brewer joined the Sperry Gyroscope Com- pany as a project engi- neer. In June, 1947, he entered the employ of the Laboratory, where he worked on special pulse amplifiers and was in charge of testing com- mercial counter equip- ment.

Mr. Brewer is survived by his wife, Ruth, and two daughters, Susan, 3 and Deborah, 5.

"LET LOVE COME LAST" by Taylor Caldwell --

In "Let Love Come Last", her latest book, Taylor Caldwell has spun a grim tale of a lonely, embittered man. William Prescott was born on the wrong side of the tracks in a small midwestern city and the deprivations he suffered as a child colored his whole life.

Returning to the town of his birth as a wealthy man, he ruins the man who had employed him at starvation wages as a young man, and enters the city "society" through the power of his money and his marriage to Ursula, who loves him dearly.

William trusted no one, and thought that his marriage was merely a business arrangement that would provide him with children who would return the love that he was ready to extend to them.

His efforts to buy his children's love through indulgence and utter lack of discipline were fruitless and the children came to hate the man who satisfied their every whim. Accepted as one of the city's leading men, William knew that his friends were friends in name only, and did not realize until he was dying that his wife's love was his most precious possession.

It is his wife, Ursula, and his adopted son, Oliver, who save him from defeat at the hands of his children and his business
